

NEW YEARS EVE SMORGASBORD



This New Year's Eve, serve a buffet supper with an international flavor—Swedish Smorgasbord. The recipe below for Swedish Meat Balls is from the Smorgasbord spread in the January Ladies' Home Journal:

12 lb. ground beef 2 lb. ground pork le lb. ground veal 2 c. soft whole-wheat bread

2 c. milk

chopped 10 T. butter


4 t. pepper 3 eggs, beaten 1 c. flour a c. nour I T. tomato paste I onion, peeled and finely

2 t. paprika

1 can (10½ oz.) condensed 1. c. commercial scur cream

1 t. poultry seasoning 1 t. dry mustard

Have your butcher grind beef, pork and veal together twice. Soak bread cubes in milk. Squeeze dry and add to beef, pork and veal. Add onion which has been sauteed in 2 T. butter, salt, papelled and proper and agg. Mir well. paprika, poultry seasoning, mustard, pepper and eggs. Mix well-Form into about 100 small balls. Brown meat balls in a skillet, Form into about 100 smail balls. Brown filed balls in a skiller, a portion at a time, using ½ c. butter. As they are browned, a transfer them to a bowl. When all meat balls are browned, stir the flour into the pan drippings. Blend in tomato paste and bouillon mixed with enough water to make 2½ c. Stir over low bouillon mixed with enough water to make 2½ c. Stir over low heat until sauce is thickened. Put the meat balls back and heat for a few minutes. Just before serving stir in the sour cream, blending well. Makes 12 servings.






