At nominal "city and village" speeds of 30 mph, you will travel 77 ft. before stopping. Allow 128 ft. to stop your car traveling at 40 mph. Going 60 mph., you can stop in 5 seconds, but you've covered 263 ft. of pavement. At "super-highway" speeds of 70 mph., you need 346 ft. of precious stopping distance.

ANTI-RABIES DOG CLINICS SCHEDULED

Rabies vaccination clinics for dogs in Washtenaw County will begin next Thursday, the County Health Department has announced and will be held in 13 locations through Saturday, January 28.

A clinic will be held in Ann Arbor from 3 to 7 p.m. Tuesday, January 10, in the National Guard Armory.

A new vaccine which protects dogs for two years and which will cost \$2.00 will be administered at the clinics this year.

The clinics, according to Dr. Otto K. Engelke, county Health Department director, offer low cost vaccination to dog owners who might find it difficult to comply with the regulation requiring vaccination.

It was pointed out that the clinics are not the only means of securing rabies vaccinations. Veterinarians offer the vaccinations year around at their offices for a regular fee.

Sponsored by the County Veterinary Medical Association and the Health Department to keep rabies out of Washtenaw county, this year's clinics will be under the direction of Dr. George Bowler, veterinarian and meat inspector with the Health Department.

Practicing veterinarians in each community serve at the clinics without fee. The clinics have been held since 1948, when a county ordinance was passed requiring all dogs to be vaccinated before licenses could be bought for them.

Dr. Bowler said a representative of the various township clerks offices will be present at the clinics to issue licenses to all dog owners who wish to purchase one. The deadline for obtaining the licenses without a penalty is March 1.

Dr. Engelke said the \$2 fee will approximately cover the costs of the clinics but that the department would not know for sure until a few have been held.

The schedule for the townships are as follows: Superior township, 4-6 p.m. Jan. 5, Superior twp. hall Saline 7-9 p.m. Jan. 5 at the fire station; Ann Arbor, 3-7 p.m. Jan. 10, at the Armory; Ypsilanti, 4-7 p.m. Jan. 11 Ypsi twp. hall, Willow Village, 6-8 p.m. Jan. 13; fire station.

Other clinics will be held in Salem, 2-4 p.m. Saturday Jan. 14, at the fire station; Milan 7-9 Jan. 17, equipment building; Lyndon township hall Dexter, 2-5 Jan. 21; fire station; Augusta township 7-9 Jan. 24 Lincoln school garage; Manchester 7-9 Jan. 25, County Road Commission garage; Chelsea, 7-9 Jan. 26, town hall; and Whitmore Lake 7-9 Sat. Jan 28, fire station.

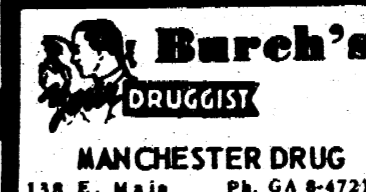
