**PROVIDE PLENTY OF PIG FEEDER SPACE.** You should have enough feeders so there are no more than four pigs per feeder hole. If you're finishing in confinement you may also want to house fewer pigs per pen in winter. Too many pigs in a pen along with too few feeders can cut gains and feed efficiency considerably. A recent test showed that pigs given 13 square feet of floor space gained 11% faster with 65% less feed than pigs limited to 9 square feet of floor space.

**NOT MUCH CHANGE IN FARM INCOME IN 1961.** But the best farm prices will come during the first half of the year. Increasing slaughter during the later months will force hog and cattle prices lower. Farm costs will hold steady—with the possibility of discounts, some items may even slip off a bit. The current general economic recession will have little or no effect on farm prices.

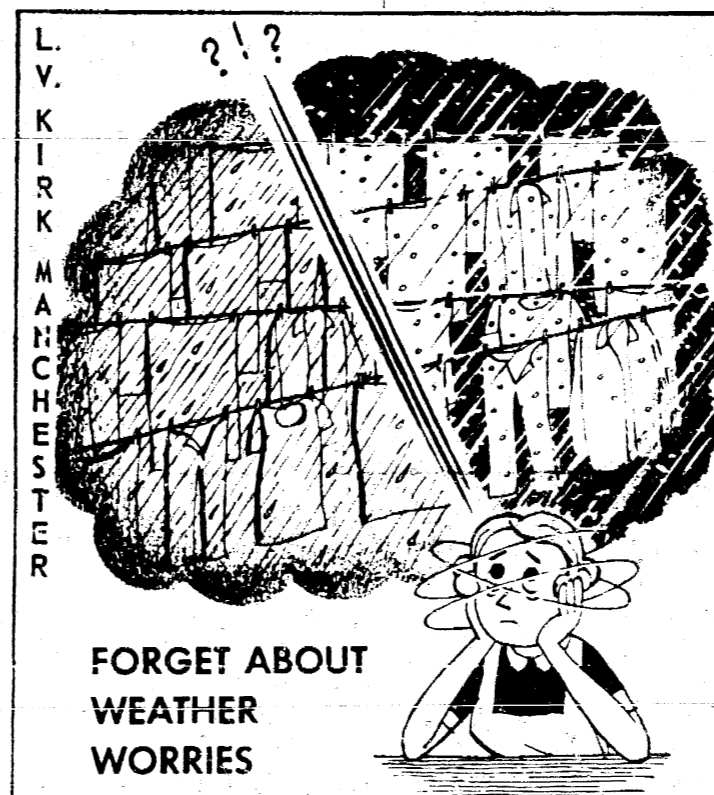
**USE HEAT LAMPS SAFELY.** Plug no more than 7 bulbs in a No. 12 wire circuit having a 20 ampere fuse. Always use heavy duty cords with porcelain rather than metal or composition sockets. Hang the lamps by a chain rather than by the electric cord. When using heat lamps for brooding purposes, place the bulb a safe distance above animals—18 inches for chicks; 24 inches for pigs; and 30 inches for lambs.

**PROTECT YOUR SILO UNLOADER FROM OVERLOADS.** When silage is frozen it's rather difficult to tell how fast you can lower your unloader without pushing the motor beyond its rated capacity. One way of making sure is to wire an ammeter in the circuit. This will tell when the rated full load of the motor is reached and you can operate it accordingly.

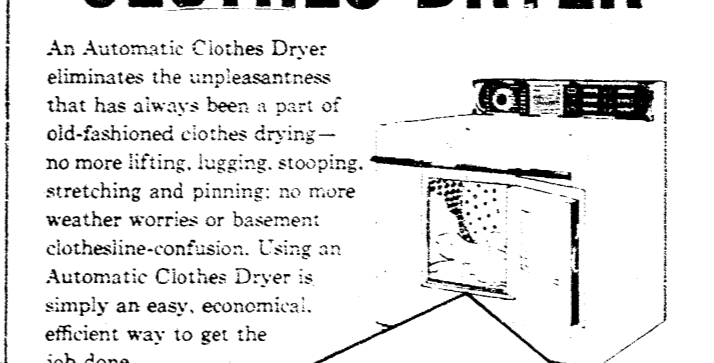
