Guide lines from NACCA



Junior and his kid sister may see the inside of a first-class station before they see the moon on their toy rocket if some of the tricky small-space age toys are not improved by their designers. This warning has been issued by the National Association of Claimants' Counsel of America, a nationwide group of attorneys who are launching a new program of consumer protection throughout the U.S. The NACCA Bar Association has urged makers of mechanical and chemical toys to use "almost care" so that fun-time toys does not become a painful weapon. Real court cases have shown that toy airplanes powered by carbon dioxide gas pellets cause injuries and toy airplanes and catapults featured in many suits in the past. Those involved with manufacturers' playthings may remember that engineering failures of three can't read, even if they could, would use the same common sense.

Melva Strang has been named the 1961 Betty Crocker Homemaker of Tomorrow at Manchester High School. Having received the highest grade in a written examination on homemaking knowledge and studies taken by graduating girls in her school, she comes a candidate for the state Homemaker of Tomorrow award which will be announced in March.

Each school Homemaker of Tomorrow will receive an award pin, manufactured by Owens and representing the slogan, "Home is Where the Heart Is." The examination papers of school Homemakers of Tomorrow will be entered in competition to name the state's Homemaker of Tomorrow.

The \$110,000 homemaking education program sponsored by General Mills offers a \$1,500 scholarship to the first ranking girl in each state and \$500 scholarship to the state's second ranking participant.

State Homemakers of Tomorrow and their faculty advisors receive an expense educational tour to New York City, Colonial Williamsburg, Va., and Washington, D.C. April 8-13, the trip culminating in the announcement of the All-American Homemaker.

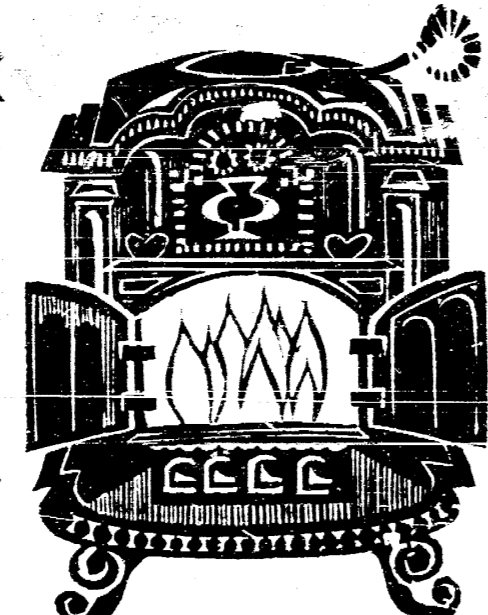

**1960 WOOL PAYMENTS APPLY TO SALES BEFORE APRIL**

Wool growers were reminded today that the 1960 program payments, to be made this summer, will be made only on wool and unshorn lambs which are marketed before March 31, 1961. That is the closing date for the 1960 program. Mrs. Carolyn Stump, Office Manager, Washtenaw County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Office, also pointed out that applications for such payments under the 1960 wool program must be filed before the end of April 1961. Mrs. Stump emphasizes that adequate records on the sales must support the information on the payment applications. For instance, producers' sales records for shorn wool should show name and address of producer, net weight of wool sold, and net proceeds to producer after normal marketing deductions. Payments to producers for 1960 marketing year will follow the same methods of the 1959 year. Shorn wool payments will be equal to a percentage of each producer's cash returns from wool sales. The percentage to be announced later this year will be that required to raise the national average price received by all producers for shorn wool during the marketing year up to the incentive price of 62 cents per pound. Lamb payments will be made to each producer who sells lambs that have never been shorn. The payments will be at a rate per hundred-weight of live animals marketed to compensate for the wool on them on a basis comparable to the incentive payment per pound of shorn wool.

Under the 1959 wool program, growers in Washtenaw County last year received a total of \$113,201.26 in incentive payments earned under the marketing year which ended March 31, 1960.

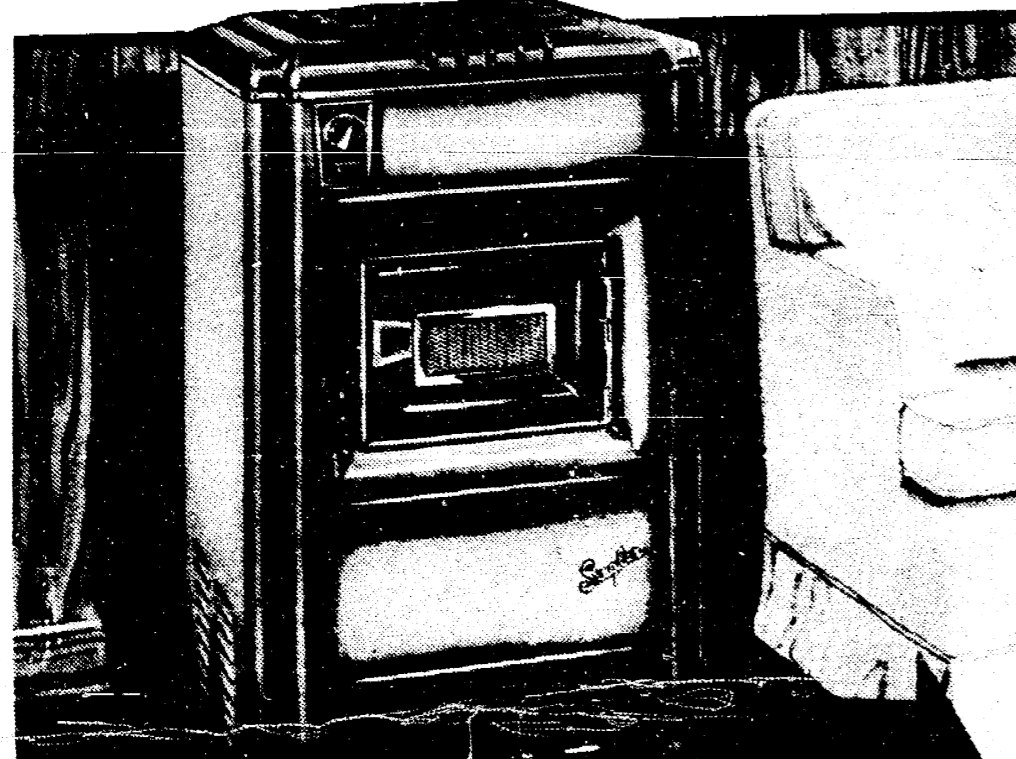

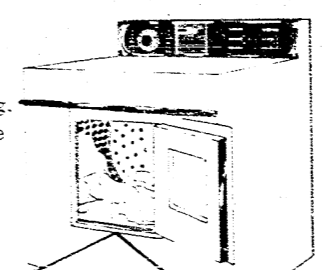

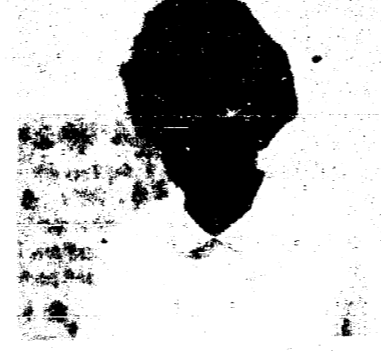
