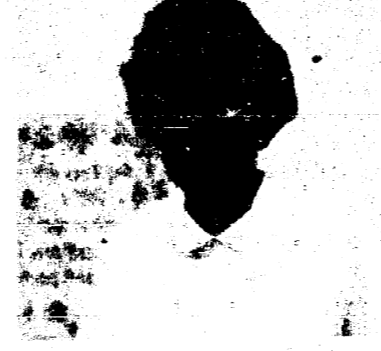

#### MOTHER'S MARCH DRIVE NETS \$435

The Manchester March of Dimes Mothers' March netted a \$435.44 profit to the month long campaign. Twenty nine mothers under the direction of Mrs. Hollis Walker worked in the village campaign.

In other smaller but also successful drives 4-hers collected \$124.52. Mrs. Bernard Kemner's Jolly Farmerettes totaled \$60 and Mrs. Robert Kirk's Hills and Valley 4-H group realized \$64.52. The 4-Hers sold balloons on the streets. The Manchester Drug Store collected \$17.63 in their annual donut and coffee sale.

Mrs. Ray Kerr, village drive chairman and Mrs. Walker believe that Manchester people have been very generous in spite of the fact that employment is down throughout the area. Mrs. Kerr says that the canisters will be left in the stores a short time longer to give the people in the outlying areas a chance to contribute if they care to. There was no rural drive in Manchester this year due to lack of help in getting solicitors.

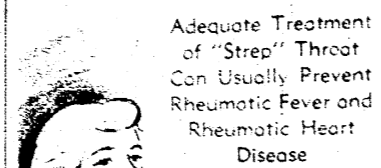

### ABOUT YOUR SOCIAL SECURITY

Some farmers' income tax returns are due February 15, 1961; others on April 15, 1961. No matter what date they are due, you must make a return if you clear \$400 from your farm operation in 1960. Robert A. Kehoe, District Manager of the Ann Arbor Social Security Office, stated that this report will give valuable social security credits to protect your family and provide for your retirement.

Mr. Kehoe stated further that young farmers sometimes overlook the requirement that social security reports provide them and their families. Some young farmers in Washtenaw County are now receiving disability payments because they complied with the law and reported their earnings each year.

Social Security Credits do not just happen; to get them, work and earnings must be reported. Payments for social security are based on these reported earnings, and to make sure that social security payments will be right, farmers should keep accurate records and make reports promptly.

Mr. Kehoe also stated that there is a pamphlet available at the district office and at most post offices entitled "Self-Employed Farmers—Are you getting the Social Security Credit Due You?". This pamphlet explains clearly just what forms are needed and how to complete them to report farm earnings. Call or write to the Ann Arbor District Office for a copy of this pamphlet.

**DOLLAR and SENSE FARMING.**

**PLAN YOUR SOW HERD** around lower prices this fall through 1962. Farrows this winter are up about 8% in the Corn Belt and the total spring pig crop is expected to top year-ago levels by 5%. Farrow all sows which are now bred. But select only the better ones to re-breed. Those which fail to farrow 6 pigs or more will not generally be profitable during the period ahead.

**CHECK CATTLE FOR LICE.** If treatment is necessary, use a dust unless a warm day should come along to permit spraying. Beef cattle can be treated with such materials as Co-Ral, malathion, toxaphene, lindane, methoxychlor and Karlan. Follow precautions on the can.

Many of these materials cannot be used within one to two months of slaughter. Only rotenone and pyrethrins are recommended for dairy cows.

**TANDEM HOOK-UP OF SMALL TRACTORS** can increase their pulling power by as much as 35%. Hooking smaller tractors in tandem will permit you to do the heavy work of plowing and disking while allowing you to keep your tractor investment down. Most economical hook-up is attaching one tractor in front of another. This can be done for a cost of \$150 to \$200.

**CONTROL WILD OATS IN SMALL GRAINS** by using either Avadex or Carbyne. Both are commercially available for the first time this year. These chemicals have improved yields as much as 8 to 10 bushels where wild oats were a problem. Avadex is applied ahead of planting by disking it into the top one to two inches of soil. Carbyne is applied to grains when they reach the two-leaf stage.
