9 a.m. Harold and Lercy Wing farm at 5335 Dexter Road half way between Dexter and Ann Arbor will be the first stop. This is a very good commercial flock. There are 270 corralled breeding ewes; 35 ewe lambs; 335 cross bred feeder lambs; good feeding and housing facilities.

10:30 a.m., Allen Faulhaber farm at 18424 W. Austin Road, on the West edge of Manchester. Al has a good flock of feeder lambs. The main feature at this stop will be a dipping demonstration.

12:00 Noon Lunch on your own.

1:30 p.m., Phillips, farm; Warren, Earl and Lloyd, on the North side of Blissfield on Ifland Road. This stop will feature 1200 head of lambs on feed, automated feed handling, year around program, sorting and dipping equipment.

3 p.m., Arthur Goetz farm at Blissfield. This stop features year around feeding program. Feeds out 3,000 to 4,000 lambs per year.

REGULATIONS ON SEWAGE SYSTEMS

Regulations governing the installation of private sewage disposal systems in Washtenaw county were stripped of their most controversial features and adopted by the Board of Supervisors.

Eliminated from the final version of the controversial set of regulations were the proposal that no new septic tank and disposal field be allowed on a parcel of land less than an acre in size.

Dr. Otto K. Engelke, director of the county Health Department said that the objectionable feature was removed because some supervisors felt that it conflicted with the zoning ordinances in their townships.

Zoning ordinances of a number of townships allow homes to be built on lots of less than an acre.

The new regulation gives the health committee of the board the power to hear appeals and to grant individual variances from regulations where it is determined no substantial health hazard is likely to occur and unnecessary hardship might result from strict compliance with the regulations.

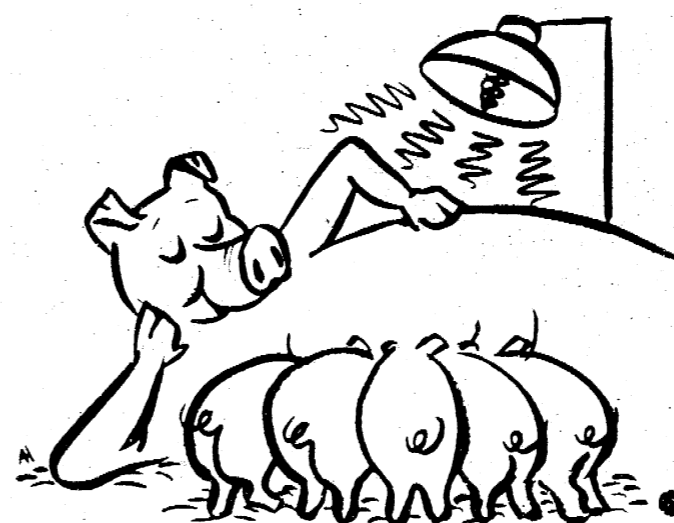

FARM PROFIT



Save An Extra Pig Per Litter

On the day they are farrowed, each litter of newborn pigs already has cost you approximately \$35. That's money you have spent to feed the sow, pay a share of boar cost, and provide housing. Since each pig in a seven-pig litter is worth \$5, that little extra effort to save every one is really worthwhile.

A Massey-Ferguson research report shows that it isn't hard to step up the average number of pigs saved by one or two per litter. Tests at several state universities, for example, have demonstrated that heat lamps and farrowing stalls cut losses materially.

High-powered rations help too. Start pigs on a pre-starter as soon as they will eat. Pigs fed 35 to 40 pounds of starter should weigh 40 to 50 pounds at weaning and continue to make good gains thereafter. A power-packed ration with vitamins and antibiotics checks disease and helps pigs get a good start.

In Georgia test pigs were eight pounds heavier when they were weaned at three weeks. And they gained faster on less feed all the way to market. Sows didn't lose as much weight and were worth more when sold.

THE STAGGS BALLOT

Manchester village had 2 party tickets voting in the Village Elections, when I became a voter in 1894. The Citizens and Peoples Party. The Citizens party has continued to operate to the present day, but the Peoples party fell by the wayside in 1909. A dozen of us young men organized the young mens party, the reason was the Citizens party was dominated by the Saloon Element of which Manchester had 8 and called the wet party. The Peoples party consisted of the Church going people and called the Dry party. I can recall at some of the Elections in my teen age, the voter was handed a marked ballot on the street and escorted to the polls to see the vote was registered. In those days the Australian system was not known. By the domination of the Wet Element the Peoples party was helpless and seldom elected their candidates. The Young Mens Party was short lived. In 1919 women were given the right to vote. I conceived the idea to have women on our ticket did not make it a young mens party and came to the next caucus to change the name. There was a nice crowd at the caucus and when I suggested to change the name to the Progressive Party I found opposition in my friend Fred Blosser son of the Editor of the Manchester Enterprise. The topic was discussed pro and con. When it was put to a vote the opposition was defeated by 11 votes. At one of the spring elections 2 of my close friends were put on the tickets for 1st councilmen, opposite each other. I had promised each one I would vote for them before the caucus but when they appeared opposite each other on the ballot I was confused and only had one choice. As time went on and still confused I was inspired with a plan which looked plausible. One day I wrote to the secretary of the State at Lansing for an audition which was granted, after some discussion I was told, it was out of his jurisdiction and referred me to the Prosecuting Attorney of Washtenaw County at Ann Arbor.

My hopes began to rise as it gave the approval from Lansing. I then contacted Albert Rapp Prosecutor at Ann Arbor and told him my experience at Lansing. After going over my plan I was told it was out of his jurisdiction and referred me to my council at Manchester. There was no question in my mind when I felt Prosecutor Rapp and was elated to the utmost. At the first village election the plan was put in operation. At first it caused some confusion and a number of ballots were thrown out. You now have a choice from 6 candidates for councilmen and not 3 in the old system. In my 55 years as a commercial salesman and selling in many of the villages from Detroit to Calumet I have the first village to know to use my plan in electing councilmen.

In the past I have known people to speak about the Stagger Ballot at election time and take this opportunity to enlighten the citizen of its origin.
