But there are some good reasons why families who want to enjoy a room air conditioner this summer and for many years to come should buy it now.

1. The unit will be in place and ready to begin serving on the first uncomfortably warm day.

2. Appliance dealers and department stores are receiving fresh new stocks of room air conditioners now. The wide choice of styles and sizes available make it easier for a family to find the unit to fit their needs exactly.

3. Planning to buy now gives home owners and apartment

dwellers ample time to study their requirements for room cooling and to select the air conditioner that will give them maximum comfort at the lowest operating cost.

4. Waiting until a heat wave strikes may mean making a hasty, unstudied decision. Today's electric room air conditioners are finely-engineered instruments, designed to give years of trouble-free service. For this reason, its selection should not be made in haste.

Today, families are aided in selecting the right size room air conditioner for their needs by standards of the National Electrical Manufacturers Association, which provide that the unit's cooling capacity (Btu's per hour) be imprinted on the data plate. Btu ratings are the only accurate ones.

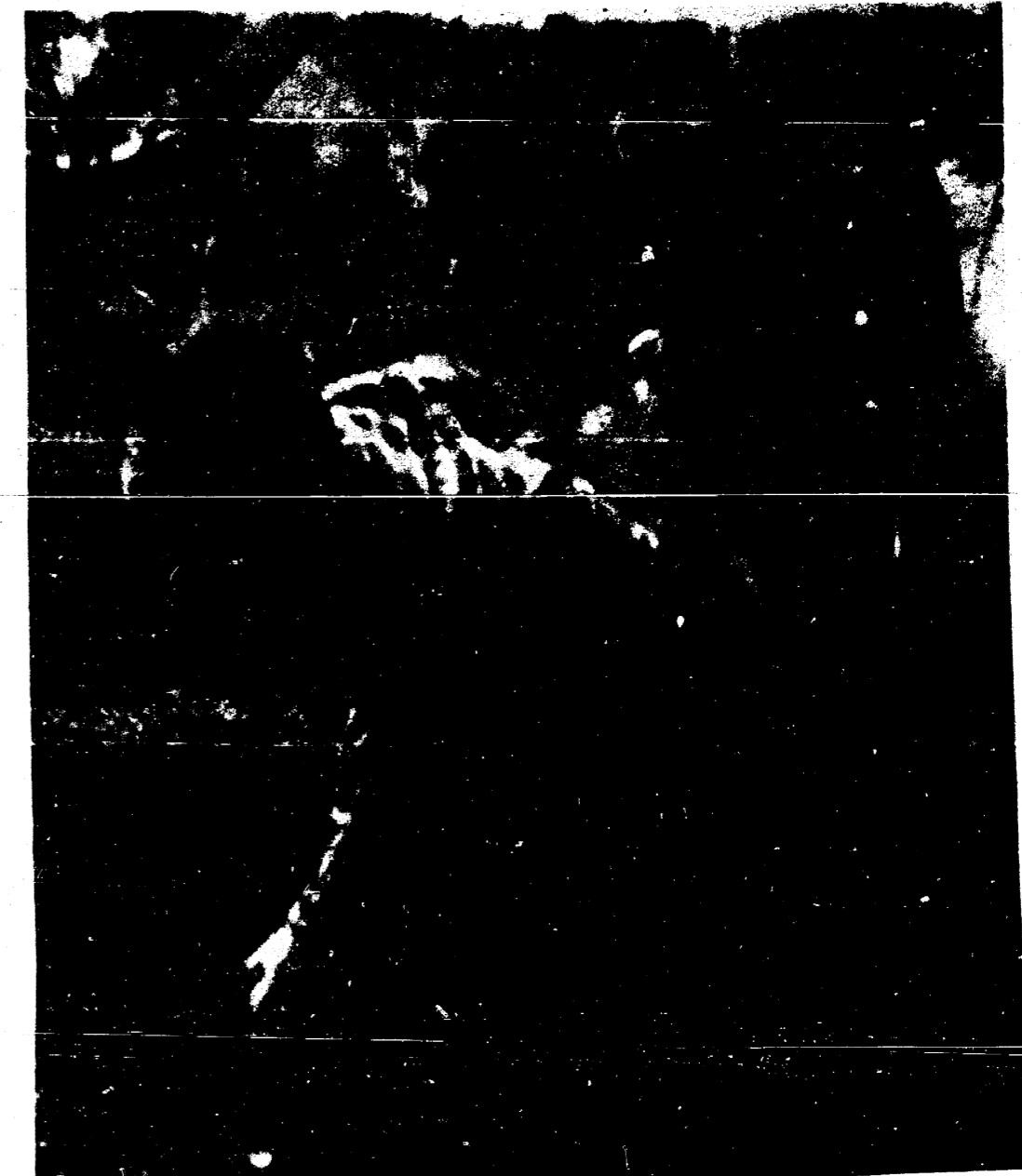

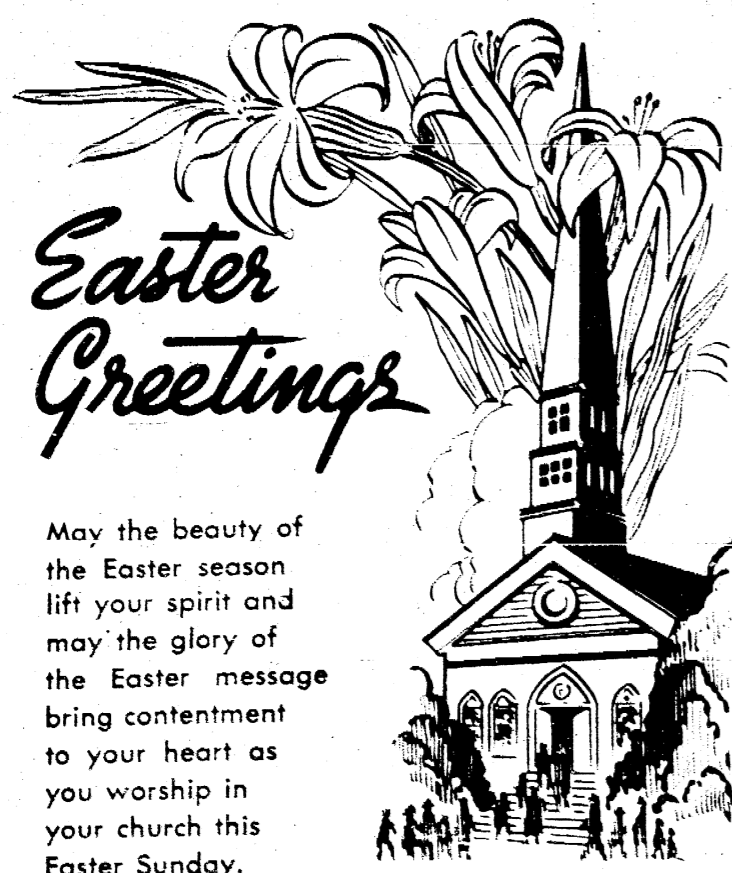

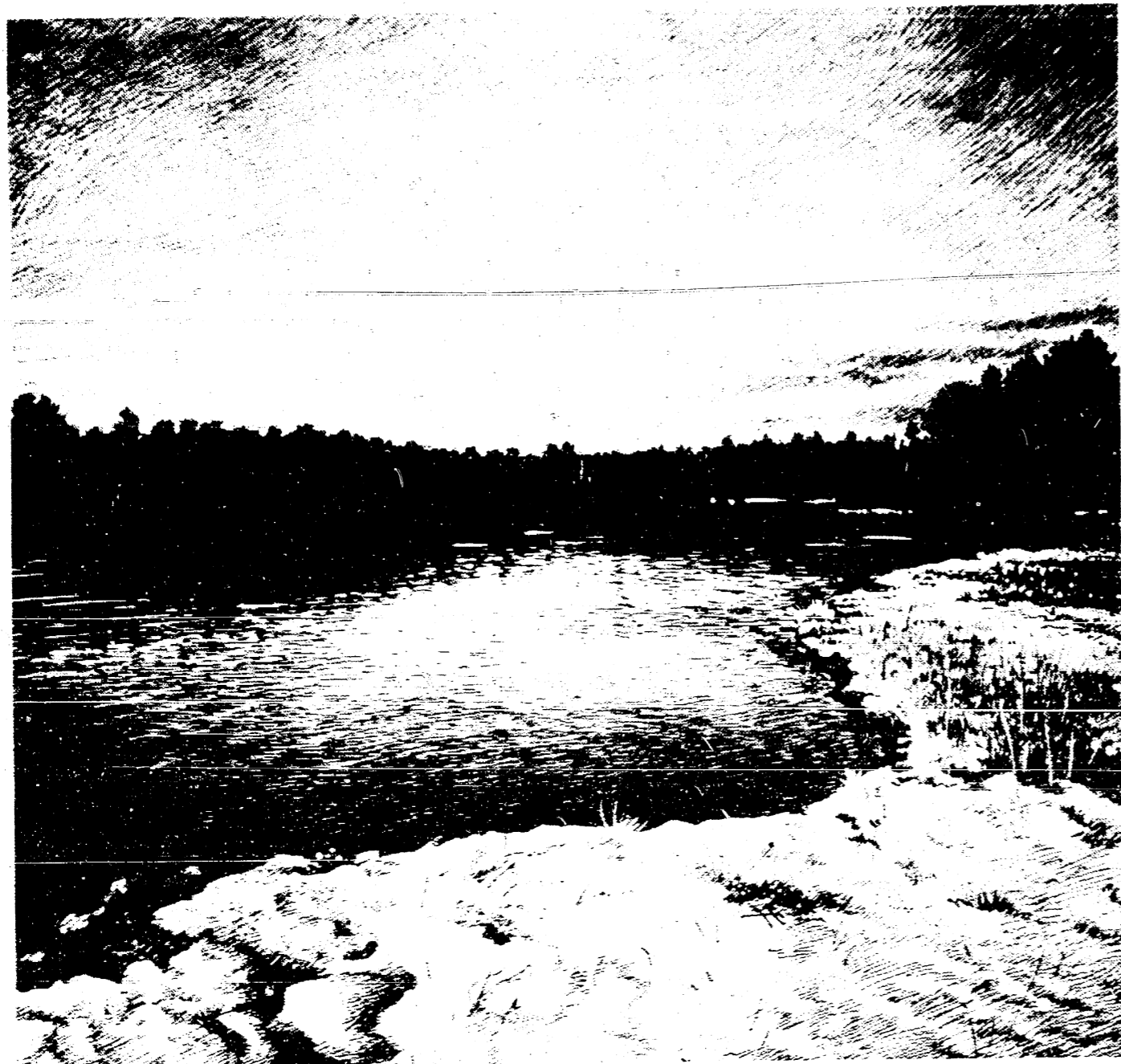

March 24, 10:15 p.m.

RESOLUTION OF THE COUNCIL OF THE VILLAGE OF MANCHESTER TO INITIATE A CHANGE IN ORDINANCE NO. 45, "VILLAGE OF MANCHESTER ZONING ORDINANCE."

WHEREAS, The Council has recognized that the present zoning ordinance does not carry out the master plan for the village of Manchester in that it does not provide for the conversion of large single dwelling homes into multi-family dwellings, it is

RESOLVED: That the Ordinance Committee is directed to prepare an amendment to the Zoning Ordinance which would give the right to owners of existing dwellings to convert such dwellings into dwellings of more than one family, under such conditions as may seem appropriate.

Moved for adoption by Trustee Pippenger supported by Trustee Galloway, the foregoing resolution was adopted by the following vote: Yeas: Clark, Pippenger, Vogt, Galloway, Grossman and Wurster. Nays: None, this day of March, 1961.

Moved by Clark and supported by Wurster that we accept the bid of Marshall Schaible, Inc. for tires on police car at \$15.00 each. All yeas, Carried.

Moved by Grossman and supported Clark we adjourn. Carried.

OBTAIN YOUR FREE FIRE PERMITS

Another spring has rolled around, and the desire to clean up brush piles, trash, and fields may result in a lot of unnecessary fire runs. Not only is this costly, but it can be avoided by a few precautions.

Take time to call your Fire Chief or Conservation Officer and talk over your burning problems with him. For Manchester residents a free burning permit can be obtained by contacting the Fire Chief or Asst. Fire Chief. Call GA 8-8311.

The Michigan Department of Conservation warns that these permits are required by law to burn grass, trash, and brush, outside of City limits, and when the ground is snow covered.

The Department stresses care in burning and proper

precautions must be taken to control the fire. A fire out of control does untold damages to our wildlife, especially in the spring when the young are born. Plow a line around the material to be burned, if possible. Tend the fire until it is completely extinguished.

Many of our fire runs result from homeowners burning papers in open containers. Think fire prevention before you burn.

Burning without a permit or carelessly allowing a fire to spread out of control is contrary to Act 143 P.A. 1923, and upon conviction can be assessed a fine up to 100 dollars and costs of prosecution, or imprisonment for 90 days, or both such fine and imprisonment.

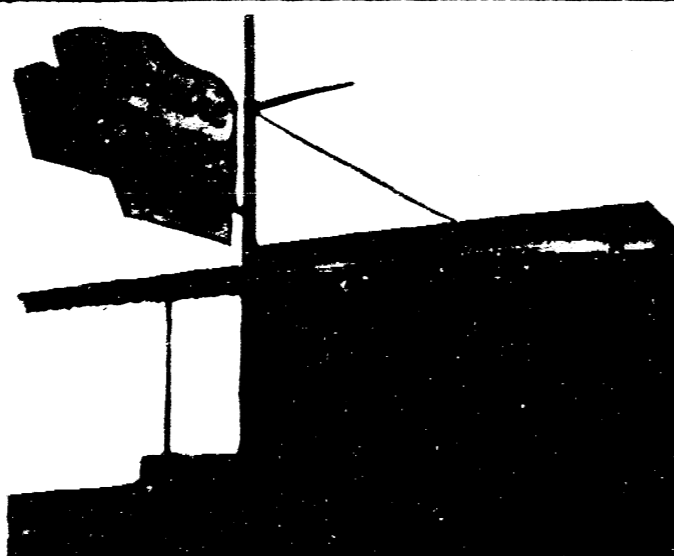

LIBRARY BOARD ELECTS OFFICERS

Manchester Township Library officers will remain the same for the coming year as all were elected to a second one year term of office at the board meeting Monday night. The president is Mrs. Franklin M. Reck; the vice-president, William L. Furgason; Secretary, Mrs. James C. Hendley, and Treasurer, George Johnston.

Mr. Johnston and Mrs. Richard A. Kutz were each elected at the Manchester Township Board meeting on Saturday to three year membership on the Library Board. Ray Tibb was the retiring board member who has served for the past year but did not seek reelection.

Committee appointments for the year included: Building and Maintenance, Mr. Furgason and Mr. Johnston; Books Mrs. Kutz and Miss Ackerson; Public Relations, Mrs. Hendley and Mrs. Reck.

Mrs. Lorna Smith, librarian, reported an accurate circulation count of 4,797 books and 136 magazines from the library during the past fiscal year with 2,821 using the library. New library card holders numbered 238 between April 1, 1960 and March 31, 1961. (Up to April 15, 1961 there has never been an individual charge to obtain a library card at the Manchester Township Library. After April 15, 1961, the board has ruled, with the consent of the Township Board, that library users who live in neighboring townships that do not support the library service rendered will be required to pay \$2.50 per year per card holder. FREE LIBRARY SERVICE IS AVAILABLE TO ALL MANCHESTER VILLAGE AND MANCHESTER TOWNSHIP residents and residents of those townships which support the library.)

Mrs. Smith reported a total of 685 active library card holders as of March 1, 1961. The card holder file has been newly compiled since 1958 and has been rechecked each year.

Since April 1, 1960, 318 new books have been purchased and 290 usable books have been donated.

The library is the regular meeting place for the Manchester Adult Art Class every Monday evening. Mrs. Chester Turner is the instructor for this project. One group of Manchester Clovers also meets at the library every Tuesday after school. Numerous other groups have found the facilities of the library suitable for their special meetings.

COUNTY ASKS GROWERS TO FILE FOR PAYMENTS

Wool growers are urged by the Washtenaw County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Committee to file applications for payments under the National Wool Program as early in April as possible.

Mrs. Carolyn Stump, office manager for the county ASC committee, says information contained in the applications is needed to compute the local average price received by the growers before a payment rate is set.

The payment rate is the percentage necessary to bring the national average price received by growers before a payment rate set earlier if applications are filed well in advance of the April 29 deadline.

Growers receive payments for both wool and unshorn lambs sold within the covered period.

Under the wool program, incentive payments are used as a means to stimulate growers to increase production.

FUNDS AVAILABLE TO HELP ELIGIBLE FARMERS

Additional funds have been made available to help meet the needs of eligible farmers who need operating money to carry out their farming operations, Carl Robinson, county supervisor for Farmers Home Administration, announced.

Mr. Robinson said that a \$35,000,000 contingency fund provided by the 1961 Agricultural Appropriations Act has just been released to the Farmers Home Administration to meet the demand for credit.

This move was taken by the U.S. Dept. of Agriculture, in an effort to make certain, within the authorities and funds available, that no qualified family-type farmer will be required to give up farming because of his inability to finance his 1961 operations.

Most of the changes call for adopting better farming practices and improving the efficiency of their farming operations. Loans may also be made to qualified farmers who carry on smaller than family-type operations.

Operating loans help pay for equipment, livestock, feed, seed, fertilizer, fuel, including the refinancing of chattel debts. They are repaid according to the ability to repay over the period of up to seven years. The interest rate is five per cent.

Further information on these loans may be obtained from the county office of the Farmers Home Administration.

CANCER CRUSADE NOW UNDERWAY

Manchester Community leaders for the 1961 Cancer Crusade were announced by Loren W. Campbell, Washtenaw County chairman for the drive.

A county-wide goal of \$30,000 has been set for the campaign, which will begin this week and continue through April.

More of the Societies research money comes back to Michigan institutions that we contribute ourselves. Some of the most significant cancer studies in the world are right here in our State."
