# Highest 'Pass' Yet

Skydivers Make Trade at 6,000 Feet

Skydivers Pose To Show How It's Done

Doug Dailey, 1949 Ackerson Lake Rd., passed a one-footlong, rubber-tipped baton to his buddy, Ed Green of Manchester, out around Napoleon Sunday afternoon and set a first for Michigan.

What's so unusual about

Nothing, really except that the baton passed from hand to hand while Doug and Ed were falling free at a speed of 174 feet-per-second and were 6,000 feet above the ground after jumping from an airplane.

Seconds after they passed the baton the apair manuevered away from each other and then about 22 seconds later they pulled their ripcords and floated safely to earth.

It was the first time that anvone in Michigan has successfully pulled the batonpass act although it has been to members of the Jackson Sport Parachute Club who said the feat represents the ultimate in sky-diving manueverability.

Skydivers are people who like to jump from airplanes and then do tricks and manuevers while plummeting towards the earth before they pull the ripcords on their chutes at the very last minute.

There's a good sized group of them living in the Jackson area and they spend weekends when weather permits in the sky above Maule Airport at Napoleon gliding about, doing loops and barrel rolls and dives, in to earth. During their manuevering short playing like they were birds while all of the time they are heading for a very hard earth at that 174-feet-per-second

SOUNDS EASY.

Doug and Eddie have been doing this kind of thing since 1959 and like the other members of the club they can do all kinds of tricks in the sky by manuevering their hands. But Sunday they reached

their peak when that baton passed between them. Here's how they did it.

They went up in a plane piloted by Al Greenwood of Manitou Beach.

At 7.800 feet Ed jumped out and quickly rolled onto his back and spread out his arms and legs in spread eagle

An instant later Dolg dove out head first and swept his arms down and behind him so that they resembled a sharp V or Delta wing. He caught up with Ed within seconds after leaving the plane and then rolled over and spread-eagled himself and flat in the same position as Ed.

Then by manuevering their hands and while still plunging downward they came close enough together so the baton could be passed. Then by more manuevers they separated so

when they reached 2,200 feet they had room for both to open their chutes and come safely

they were at times as far as 50 to 60 feet apart. Although Sunday's feat was a first for both, Ed has 96 jumps in his record and Doug 71. WONDERFUL FEELING.

They jump from airplanes presumably for the same reason that people soar off ski jumps and climb mountains-because they find it challenging and

thrilling. "It's the most wonderful feeling I've ever felt," Doug said, adding, "I can give no further explanation of why I do it." "You feel as free as a bird and for a few seconds you really

are," Ed chimed in. Both men seemed surprised when they were asked if there weren't times when they got just a bit frightened when they were up there speeding towards

"No. of course not." they both answered. "What's to be frightened about. You have a 'chute, you know?"

"Well don't they ever wonder if the 'chute might not open?" "Oh no. You make sure that everything is in order before

you go up.
"Why if I ever once worried about the 'chute opening I would never jump again but can't see why I would ever worry," Doug said.

15.02 (e) The additional right to convert or alter existing dwellings into dwellings of more than one family is hereby granted, provided, that such conversion or alteration shall not require any major structural change in the exterior of the structure other than required or desirable for ingress and egress to each apartment or dwelling unit to be created.

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

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


