Highest 'Pass' Yet Skydivers Make Trade at 6,000 Feet

Doug Dailey, 1949 Ackerson Lake Rd., passed a one-foot-long, rubber-tipped baton to his buddy, Ed Green of Manchester, out around Napoleon Sunday afternoon and set a first for Michigan.

Nothing, really except that the baton passed from hand to hand while Doug and Ed were falling free at a speed of 174-feet-per-second and were 6,000 feet above the ground after jumping from an airplane.

Seconds after they passed the baton the pair maneuvered away from each other and then about 22 seconds later they pulled their ripcords and floated safely to earth.

It was the first time that anyone in Michigan has successfully pulled the baton-pass act although it has been tried many times, according to members of the Jackson Sport Parachute Club who said the feat represents the ultimate in sky-diving maneuverability.

Skydivers are people who like to jump from airplanes and then do tricks and maneuvers while plummeting towards the earth before they pull the ripcords on their chutes at the very last minute. There's a good sized group of them living in the Jackson area and they spend weekends when

weather permits in the sky above Maule Airport at Napoleon gliding about, doing loops and barrel rolls and dives, in short playing like they were birds while all of the time they are heading for a very hard earth at that 174-feet-per-second speed.

they reached 2,200 feet they had room for both to open their chutes and come safely to earth. During their maneuvering they were at times as far as 50 to 60 feet apart. Although Sunday's feat was a first for both, Ed has 96 jumps in his record and Doug 71. "WONDERFUL FEELING."

They jump from airplanes presumably for the same reason that people soar off ski jumps and climb mountains—because they find it challenging and thrilling. "It's the most wonderful feeling I've ever felt," Doug said, adding, "I can give no further explanation of why I do it."

"You feel as free as a bird and for a few seconds you really are," Ed chimed in.

Both men seemed surprised when they were asked if there weren't times when they got just a bit frightened when they were up there speeding towards earth.

"No, of course not," they both answered. "What's to be frightened about. You have a 'chute, you know?'"

"Well don't they ever wonder if the 'chute might not open?'"

"Oh no. You make sure that everything is in order before you go up."

"Why if I ever once worried about the 'chute opening I would never jump again but I can't see why I would ever worry," Doug said.

STANLEY WHITE TO REPRESENT MANCHESTER AT UNITED FUND MEETING

Mr. Stanley White of Route 2, Manchester, will again represent Manchester Community Chest at the annual Admissions and Budget Conference of the Michigan United Fund. This is the 2nd year that Mr. White has attended the budget conference in East Lansing.

The two day conference to be held on May 2 and 3 at Kellogg Center at Michigan State University in East Lansing, will have more than 100 Michigan citizens hear the financial needs of the 34 health and welfare agencies which are supported through the Michigan United Fund. The members of the Budget Committee represent all areas of public interest and every geographical area of Michigan.

In 1960 the combined requests of the 34 agencies exceeded four million dollars, but were reduced by the Budget Committee to \$3,300,001. As the financial needs of the 34 agencies are determined each community in Michigan is asked to accept its fair share of these needs and include this amount in their united campaign in the Fall.

The Michigan United Fund are state-wide or national agencies, such as the Michigan Heart Association, an affiliate of the American Heart Association; the Michigan Chapter of the Arthritis & Rheumatism Foundation; the Multiple Sclerosis Society, and other agencies which in other states campaign independently for financial support.

In Michigan, because of the Michigan United Fund, the opportunity to support these well known health and welfare agencies in the fall united campaign is available to each Michigan community. Because the Michigan United Fund is the largest and most inclusive state fund in the nation, united fund leaders from throughout the country point to the annual Admissions and Budget Sessions as one of the outstanding examples of united funds meeting agency needs on a state-wide basis.

The Michigan United Fund is the only state fund where many of the large national health agencies, such as the Heart Association, annually submit a budget for review.

Each of the 15 state-wide agencies submit a detailed budget, outlining exactly where each dollar received from the Michigan United Fund will be spent. Items such as research, professional education, direct services to the public, public education, medical grants, scholarships, educational and public information costs and administrative costs, will be discussed and their value to the community and their value to the state determined.

The national agencies included in the Michigan United Fund were reviewed at the national budget conference in New York City in March.

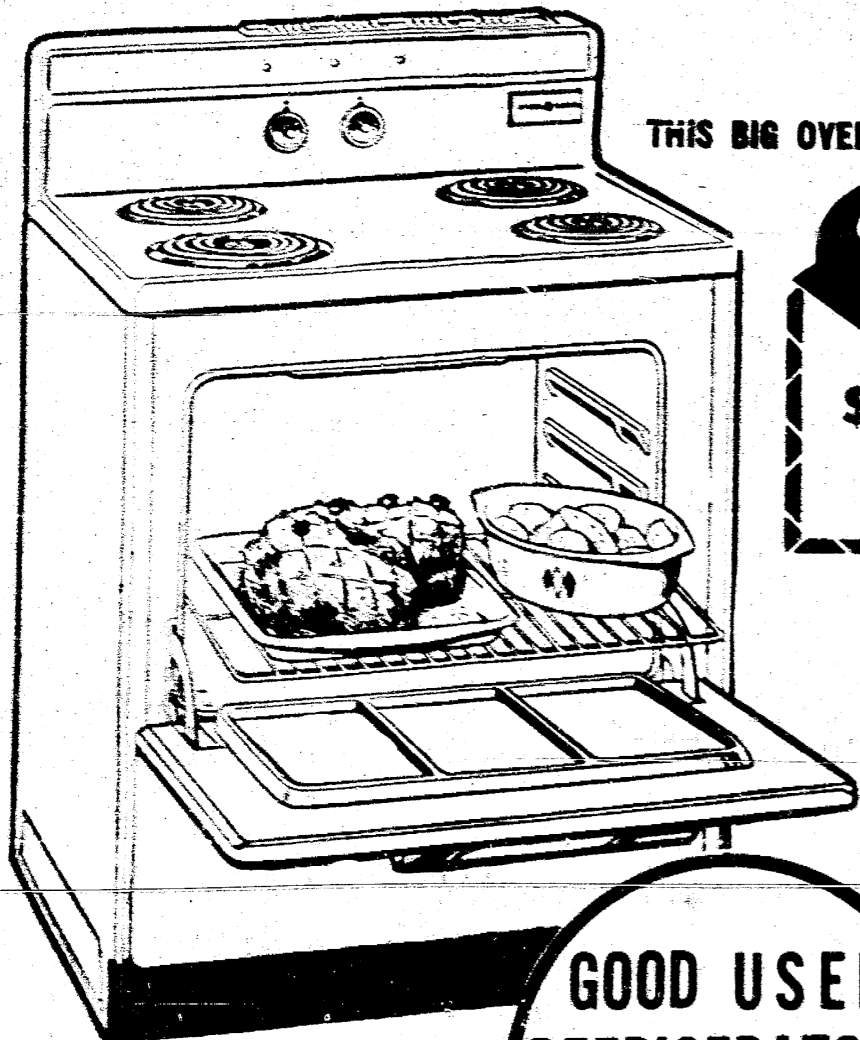

In addition to open house, the State flag, as well as the U. S. flag will be displayed all week at the post.

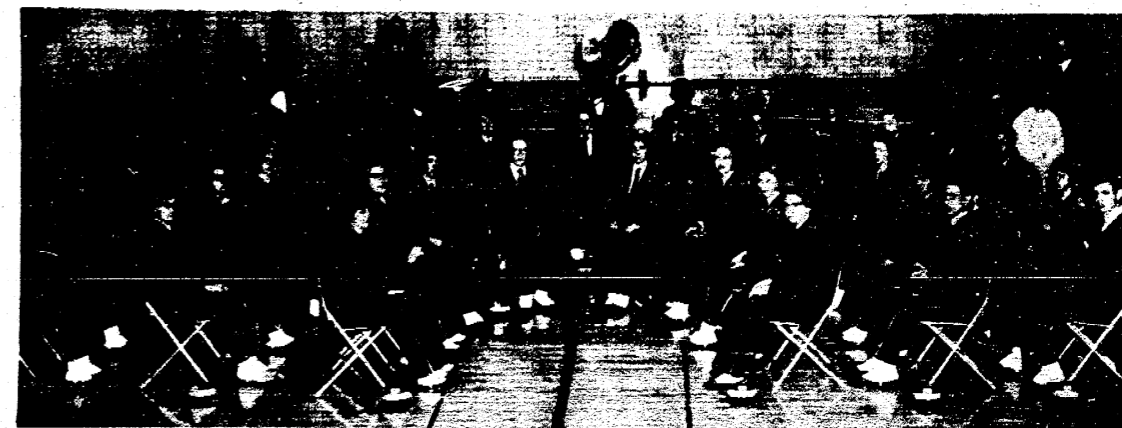
GET YOUR FLOWERING CRAB NOW
