DOES THIS ANSWER YOUR QUESTION?

1. Is this four mills in addition to the two mills voted last year? (NO) The Manchester School Board asks only millage to balance the current school budget. The two mills is no longer effective. 2. Why do we need more extra Millage than last year? The valuation of the district has declined this year, therefore it takes more millage to obtain the same amount of money. The teachers salary schedule was not increased but it is necessary to add two teachers to the staff. Less valuation and two more teachers account for most of the extra money needed. 3. Is this 4 mills more than the 15 mills provided for in the operation of local units of government? (NO) There is eleven mills available for many of the schools totally in Washtenaw County. If we were one of these schools we could ask 1 1/2 mills additional to get the 12 1/2 needed. As we now stand we expect to be allocated 8.75 mills from Jackson County. This means 4 mills county tax, 8.75 mills allocated school tax and 4 mills additional tax or a total of 16 1/2 mills. As you can see this is only 1 1/2 mills over the 15 provided by law. 4. Why don't we get rid of the Jackson County portion of our district? 1. We have people in this area who have children in this system and would like to remain with us. 2. All this does is make the issue less confusing. We would still need the 12.75 mills we are asking plus that amount lost on the property transferred to another district. It does not seem wise to transfer property just to eliminate confusion.

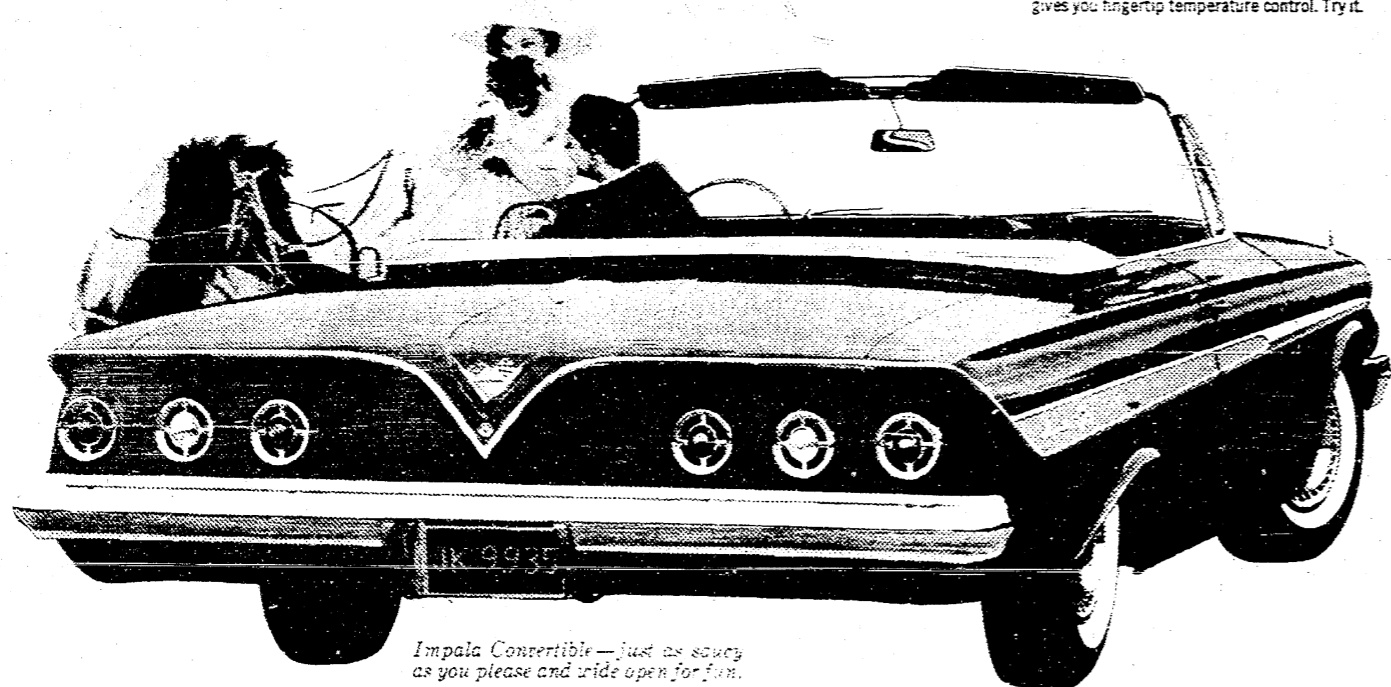

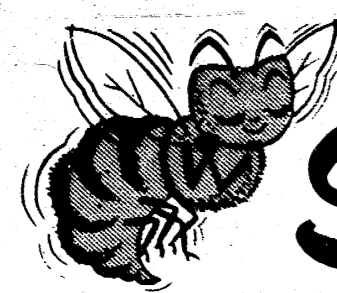

### NEW POLICE CHIEF, JULES VAN DE GINSTE



Manchester has a new police chief, according to village president, Harry Sutton, the recommendation of the police committee to install Jules Van De Ginste, has been accepted.

For the first time two Manchester boys have been chosen to represent Washtenaw County at the National 4-H Center in Washington, D.C. for the Citizenship Short Course. They are Ronald Mann and Carl Kemner. They will be joining 25 other 4-H representatives from counties in the state.

### OPERATING MILLAGE REQUESTED

The board of education is requesting approval of a one year special operating tax. This will empower the board to levy a 1 1/2 mills above the 15 mill limitation for school purposes.

Operation millage is planned as a one year request each year to balance the school budget. This differs from approaches of other school districts as it is an exact amount for an exact budget for one year only. It is not an estimate asked for over several years.

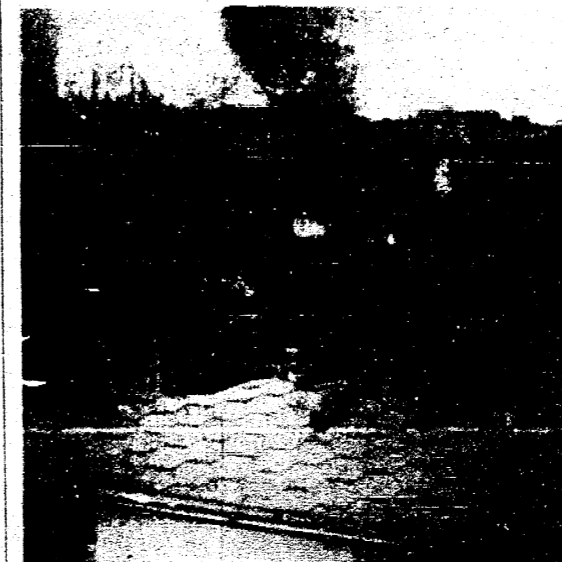
The amount requested will be four mills, but the largest part of this amount is to make up an uncollected tax that results because Manchester's district is in two counties. In reality, it will amount to only one and three quarters mills above what is available to most Washtenaw County Schools.

The School Board is asking for the support of the tax payers on this millage issue as a satisfactory program for the children of the area can not be maintained on less.
