## To Leave on South American Trip

Gretchen Hardenbergh, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Roger Hardenbergh, is one of 75 teenagers and sponsors who will leave June 29 for a seven-week concert tour of 15 Latin American cities. They will return on August 20.

Making their second trip to Latin America on their annual international concert tour, the chorale will leave Miami, Fla. by jet for the first stop at Bogota, Colombia.

The 51-day itinerary will include Rio de Janeiro, Brazil, and the Brazilian cities of Fortaleza, Belo Horizonte and Campinas. Then the chorale will fly to Montevideo, Uruguay. It will give concerts in seven of that country's cities before a two-day stay in Buenos Aires, Argentina.

The chorale is sponsored by the Youth for Understanding Teen-Age Program of the Michigan Council of Churches, Mrs. Rachel Andresen of Ann Arbor directs the program.

Chorale members live in the homes of Latin American families during their stay in each city. Chorale members were chosen from more than 300 students who auditioned in Michigan high schools representing 50,000 students.

## 72 REGISTER FOR SUMMER READING PROGRAM

Seventy-two Manchester young people have signed up for the Summer Reading Program at the Manchester Twp. Library and many more are borrowing books without joining the program.

## Recreation Committee To Hold "VISITORS' DAY"

The Manchester recreation Committee has designated Mon., July 17, as "Visitors' Day." This is a day which is set each year in an effort to get representatives from the organizations which finance the recreation program to visit the activities, and thereby get a better understanding of how their money is spent.

Only children who reside in the Manchester Public School District may take part in summer recreational activities, including Little League and Junior League baseball. However, if a boy who does not live in the school district is presently involved in Little League baseball program, he may continue to participate until such time as he becomes 13 years old, at that time, he will not be permitted to sign up for Junior League baseball or any future recreational activities.

The committee also approved the recommendation of Mr. Prediger, director, that swimming lessons be held twice a week at Wampler's Lake

However, if there is less than 20 children on any day that swimming is scheduled, the committee instructed Mr. Prediger to cancel swimming that day. They thus have had to cut a few items from the program to balance their budget. One of the means adopted was the elimination of the Bob-Lo trip. Another activity dropped from this year's program, due to finances and lack of interest, is baseball for the 16 to 18 year olds. The staff has also been instructed by the committee to be as thrifty as possible in the purchase of new equipment.

The committee will have its next meeting on Sat., July 29, at 10 a.m., in the teachers room of the Nellie Ackerson School.

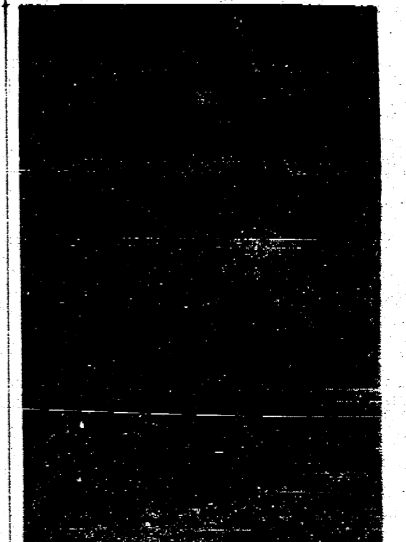
## Celebrate Golden Anniversary

**DAIRY PROJECT ENABLES 4-H'ERS TO LEARN AND EARN**  
June is just about as synonymous with milk as it is with moon because for the last 25 years June has been observed as Dairy Month in recognition of the dairy industry's important contribution to the health and welfare of the American people.

Progress of the industry during these years has been of particular value to thousands of 4-H Club members, points out the National 4-H Service Committee. Many former 4-H'ers are now among the nation's leading dairy farmers who credit their success to early training received in a 4-H dairy project, the committee reports.

Today, 4-H boys and girls in all 50 states are engaged in dairy projects which range from a single heifer to a registered purebred herd, a committee spokesman said.

Under supervision of the Co-operation Extension Service in a national 4-H dairy awards program arranged by the committee and supported by the Oliver Corporation, upward of 134,000 young dairy farmers are learning how to care for their animals, improve the herd, and use modern production and marketing methods.

Club members who have been enrolled in the project for several years have money in the bank as a result of their hard work according to the 4-H committee. Scores have put themselves through college with their dairy earnings.

As an incentive for 4-H'ers to broaden their knowledge, and also as a means of recognition, Oliver awards are offered to members having the best achievement records. Up to four dairy medals are provided in each county. The top-ranking member in the state will be delegate to the National 4-H Club Congress in Chicago next fall with all expenses paid. The highest award—a \$400 college scholarship will go to six national champions selected from among the state winners.

Last year the national winners were equally divided: three girls and three boys. They came from California, Maryland, Nebraska, North Carolina, Virginia and Wisconsin.

To be eligible for a state or national award, the 4-H'er must be over 14 years, and have satisfactorily completed three years of club work, according to the National 4-H Service Committee.

**THINGS IN THE NEWS**  
A law designed to increase sales of Michigan potatoes through improvement of quality levels and various forms of promotion has become effective, and it is expected a Potato Industry Council will be named in the near future to implement the statute.

The law was adopted by the legislature at the 1961 session. It results from a five year effort by the state's potato industry to increase the acceptance of the Michigan product and to stimulate sales. Cooperating with industry advisors were the Michigan Department of Agriculture and Michigan State University.

Both Maine and Idaho, which dominate the national potato industry, have had similar laws for more than a quarter century.

A law designed to increase sales of Michigan potatoes funds to develop and promote the state's potato industry will be derived from an assessment of \$1.50 an acre per year on all acreages with the exception of less than five acres. The law also permits growers to claim exemption and receive an assessment refund. Under the statute a third of the available funds must be used for additional potato research. Forms for reporting acreage which should be submitted by July 5 each year are available through county agents or the Michigan Department of Agriculture.

Affairs of the Council will be determined by 10 growers a processor, a shipper and a retailer, Michigan State University, Michigan Department of Agriculture, and the Director of Agriculture, who will serve as chairman. The latter two are ex officio and without vote.

Eight participating growers representing seven districts will be appointed with an additional two serving at large. Terms will be staggered and for three years with the governor making appointments subject to senate confirmation. Members will receive \$15 a day plus expenses for actual attendance at meetings.

## NEWS about 4-H Club Work

Dairy products ranked second on the list of foods consumed by the average American last year, according to the USDA. So it's not surprising that well over 230,000 young cooks whipped up tasty dairy dishes as part of the 4-H foods project.

These food specialists are 4-H Club members enrolled in a program which teaches how to demonstrate the making of nutritious, appetizing and attractive meals, snacks, drinks, salads and the like from dairy products.

During June Dairy Month, national emphasis is being placed on the value of dairy

foods in the daily diet. And in farm and city kitchens 4-H girls are perfecting skills and practicing favorite recipes. They work in two-girl teams and alone as well.

The more experienced are considering the possibility of competing for one of several awards provided by the Carnation Company, a long-time 4-H backer.

The Carnation awards are honor medals for county champions; an engraved 19-jewel wrist watch for state winner; and \$400 college scholarships for six national winners.

In addition, 12 girls will

be chosen on a sectional basis from among state winners to receive an expense-paid trip to the National 4-H Club Congress in Chicago. Carnation has sponsored the 4-H dairy foods demonstration program for the last 14 years, according to the National 4-H Service Committee, which makes program arrangements.

All project work is supervised by the Cooperative Extension Service with the help of volunteer adult club leaders. The winners also are selected by the Extension Service.
