Preparations for the feast begin early on Thursday. No women take part in the event. Some 200 men, including all members of the two sponsoring organizations, Optimists and Jaycees, go into action, setting up blocks for three above-ground charcoal pits totaling 150 feet in length.

Two baseball games, one a hard-ball game between Little Leaguers and one a softball game between two outstanding League teams, will entertain spectators during and after dinner.

Tickets may be obtained in advance from any Optimist Club Member or Jaycee, from most Manchester stores, or they may be bought at the gate. Price is the same as always: adults \$1.50, children \$1.00, take-outs \$1.50.

NEED RAIN BADLY

Washtenaw County farmers need rain badly, according to County Extension agent Wilbur Dexter, but the dryness has had no really adverse effects yet.

In fact, he said, the weather, during the past three weeks has been almost ideal, but now rain is needed or the benefits will be lost.

This has been good haying weather, Dexter said, and some farmers are ready for their second cutting. Continued dryness could cut back the yield. It could also reduce the yield of wheat, oats and other small grain.

The ground has been warm so the corn growth has been good, but moisture is needed too, he said. He added that there is not much likelihood of burning except in cases of heavy fertilizing, especially with nitrogen.

### EMANUEL EVANGELICAL AND REFORMED CHURCH EXPANDS FACILITIES

Construction on the Emanuel Evangelical and Reformed church of Manchester, which began in the first part of June, is well under way.

The new educational unit consists of 12 class rooms, an enlarged kitchen, parlor, study, office and nursery.

A basement to the church, when completed, will give access to the church from the parking lot.

New sanctual furniture will be part of the new interior decorations.

There will also be new pews and the floor will be refinished. The interior redecoration will begin some time in October or November 1961.

Reuben Finkbeiner is the general contractor of the project, which will cost approximately \$125,000 at the completion. The whole construction is expected to be completed in the first part of 1962.

A pledged campaign was held in early December of 1961. The 575 members of the congregation are voluntarily paying for the remodeling by these pledges.

The ground breaking ceremony was held on June 4. Linda and Billy Walters participated along with Willard Mann-congregation president, Herman Wiedman-building committee chairman, and Rev. Kuether.

The church congregation was founded in 1862, and the present church building in 1882. The present remodeling is the third renovation of the building.

The Emanuel Evangelical and Reformed Church legally merged with "The United Church of Christ" at a recent general synod meeting in Philadelphia. The United Church of Christ consists of the Evangelical Church in United States, Christian Church, and Congregational Churches.

### RECEIVES CERTIFICATE

Ken Heiber has been presented with a Certificate of Merit in Farm Mechanics, awarded by the Thor Research Center for Better Farm Living, Huntley Ill., for showing the greatest farm mechanics ability among the graduating seniors of Manchester High School, Manchester, Mich.

Neil C. Hurley, Jr., founder of the Thor Research Center, a non-profit farm research organization located in northern Illinois, established the Farm Mechanics Award to honor the member of each senior high school class deemed most outstanding in his proficiency to the effective use of farm shop equipment and tools, in the maintenance of farm machinery and in building projects to provide improved farm living and operating efficiency. The selection is made by the student's vocational agriculture teacher.

Recognition of outstanding high school vo-ag is part of the Thor Research Center's program for honoring leading vo-ag teachers, outstanding agriculturists, and others who have contributed to farm progress. The Center also works closely with high schools, colleges, 4-H Clubs and Future Farmers of America groups in seminars and is the site of a Model Farm Shop which features more than 2,500 tools.

The Thor Research Center devotes much time to the study of new methods in mechanization of the farm. Hurley, board chairman and president of Thor Power Tool Company, founded the non-profit center in 1956.

ADOPTS NEW POLICY

The Board of Supervisors has adopted a sweeping new policy for the recruitment and training of deputies for the Sheriff's Department. The plan is the result of a four-month study by board members and inspections of officer training facilities at various law agencies throughout the state.

The program to which the sheriff agreed includes the adoption of personnel standards for the hiring of new officers which are "representative of leading police agencies." These standards will include background investigations of officer applicants, an interview by a recruitment board, age limit of 21 through 35, a high school education and a "personality evaluation" to be given by a "competent medical authority."

The most drastic departure from former training policies for new deputies was a recommendation that all new officers be required to complete successfully a recruit training course "at an established police academy such as the Detroit Police Academy, the Michigan State Cont'd on Page 4
