RESOLVED, That the members of the Michigan State Fair Commission express their deep gratitude to Mr. Merriman for his exemplary service on behalf of the Fair and the people of the State of Michigan, and wish him every success in a long and pleasant life dedicated to service to others.

The resolution was signed for the Commission by Joseph H. Kurka, Jr. of Ovid, Chairman of the Commission and Peter L. Buback, vice chairman. Merriman was a member of all of the agriculture and livestock of the State Fair at one time or another during his 13 years of service.

CELEBRATES 101st BIRTHDAY



Mrs. Caroline Brunns celebrated her 101 birthday, August 3rd. She has been a patient at the Washtenaw County hospital since last April. She had worked hard all her life until 1952 when she decided she was getting too old to work any more.

Born August 3, 1860, in Schalla, Germany, she was the daughter of Bernard and Anna Elsie Kuhl. She came to the United States with her family in 1884 and on November 11, 1888 married Lewis Brunns at Green Garden, Illinois.

They moved to a farm in Sharon township on New Years Day, 1890. Her husband died in 1907. In 1920 following the death of her father, she moved to 223 Riverside Drive in Manchester and soon became a familiar figure.

Neighbors knew her for her unfailing warmth and good humor and for her music. She could be heard for hours of the day or night playing her organ and singing German hymns.

She lived alone, without "modern" conveniences and raised a small garden every year until September 26, 1957. On that date she fell while adjusting a window shade. Doctors said she would not have lived if neighbors had not heard her first calls for help. Then she moved to a convalescent home in Tecumseh.

Each year since her 90th birthday, the Sunday school class of Miss Amanda Lehman has visited "Grandma" on her anniversary to share cake and ice cream with her and sing. She is a member of the Manchester Emanuel Evangelical and Reformed church and the Women's Guild. She is the last surviving member of her family, which included three sons. Her father is the only member of the family who came close to matching Mrs. Brunns' age. He died when he was 99.

Mrs. Brunns is described by a nurse as being in very good health for a woman her age. She walks around the hospital unaided except for a cane what once belonged to her brother.

Some people tell me "I'll live right through," she said, "but everyone has to die sooner or later."

Miss Lehman and Mrs. John Below's Sunday school class were at the hospital to help Mrs. Brunns celebrate her birthday with a lawn party at which time "Grandma" sent her greetings and thanks to her Manchester friends who remembered her. There were two birthday cakes and ice cream for all. The children sang to grandma and she in turn sang for them. Others who went with the Sunday school class were Mrs. Paul Eisele, Mrs. Wilbur Frey, and Mrs. Clayton Gieske. Among her many birthday wishes was one from President Kennedy. She said she likes it at the hospital, "I don't have to work hard any more now," she said.

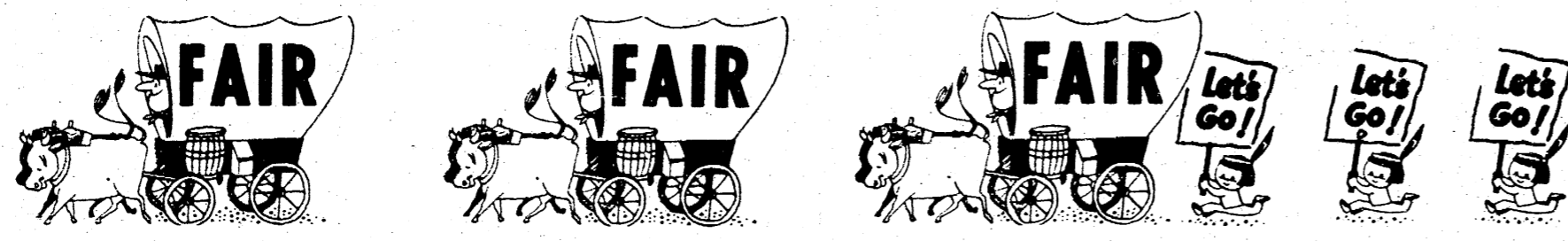

**MILKING EQUIPMENT MUST BE KEPT CLEAN.** Use of the new type chlorinated detergents along with good cleaning procedures, will do a good job of keeping the bacterial count down—so long as the wash water is kept hot. However, it's advisable to reduce wash water temperature to 110 to 120 degrees where you have problems with milkstone collecting in your tank and other equipment. Use a detergent that's high in water softening agents.

**SILOS TO BE USED FOR STORING HIGH MOISTURE GRAIN** need to be reinforced if they were originally constructed for silage. This means adding extra reinforcing rods. Need of the silo. Check with the manufacturer on the number and spacing of extra rods needed. This varies depending on diameter and height of the silo.

**BROADCAST SUPERPHOSPHATE** before seeding alfalfa this summer or fall to increase root development and top growth of young seedlings. Seedlings with vigorous growth going into cold weather will pull through with a lot less winter-killing. Broadcasting and disking the phosphorus into the soil will make it more available for plant use during dry weather. Apply a cording or testis and fertilizer used on previous crops.

**EXHIBITING ANY CATTLE AT THE FAIR THIS YEAR?** If you are, vaccinate them against shipping fever before you leave. Keep exhibited cattle away from the rest of the herd after returning home. Observe them for any signs of disease outbreak for about 30 days and have a brucellosis test run before you turn them with the other cattle.
