There will be only two dispatches of mail on Sundays and holidays, at 11:25 a.m. and 5:20 p.m. in Saline.

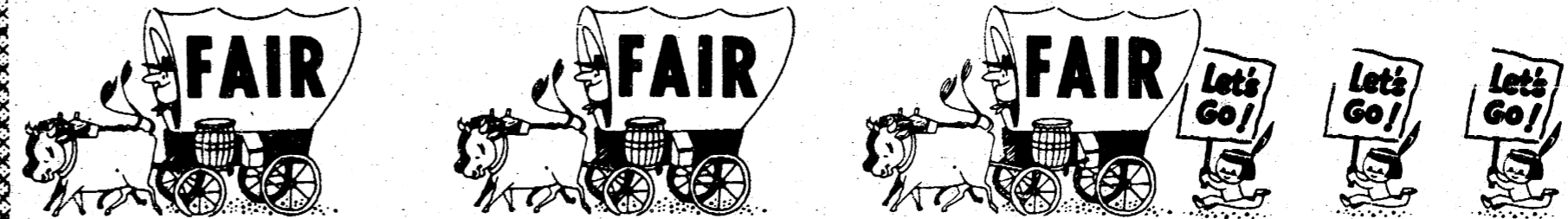

RED CROSS DRIVE FOR NEW BUILDING

Washtenaw County's drive to new headquarters for the Red Cross stands at \$20,000, according to Edward Adams Jr., drive chairman.

In the Manchester drive, limited to 80 members and friends of Red Cross, a total of \$279 has been donated by fifteen givers. Franklin M. Reck, Manchester chairman, urges all friends of Red Cross to send in their cash, pledges (or both) during the coming week.

The new headquarters being planned is centrally located for the area, on Packard Road next to Buhr Park. The building has been designed for utility, and will cost in the neighborhood of \$200,000. Three-fourths of the land cost has been donated, and it is expected that large donors will bear most of the cost. In spite of this, the showing in the advance campaign now being conducted among friends and volunteers of the Red Cross will have a great influence on the success of the campaign.

Manchester citizens are specially aware of the Red Cross Blood Bank, which has served Manchester citizens during the past ten years. The present international emergency, and the call for recruits to the Army and Navy, has given added importance to the building campaign. During the coming year, calls for Home Service will increase to the point where the inadequate offices in the Nickels Arcade will become a definite handicap to the performance of the many services demanded of the Red Cross.
