The following includes all necessary information for beginning of school and other related materials. Because space is limited it is hoped that you will be able to find the answer to any question you may have.

NEW STUDENTS

Any student that is enrolling for the first time may register the first day of school. To facilitate more time for such students K-8 may register at the Intermediate School and 9-12 at the High School on Friday of this week.

STUDENT FEES

BOOK FEES payable at the beginning of school are as follows: Kindergarteners payable to teacher \$1.50 First through Eighth payable to teacher \$3.75 Locker fees 7th & 8th payable to teacher \$5.00 Towel rental 7th & 8th payable to teacher \$1.50 Eighth Grade Home Ec payable to teacher \$5.00

High School towel rental, lab & shop and Home Ec fees payable to the High School Office first week of school.

It is recommended that parents of students K-8 make a separate payment for every child by check to the teacher. The above fees do not include dues, weekly readers, party funds, etc.

High School Book Store will be open 9:00-12:00 and 1:00-3:00 Thursday & Friday. It will also be open noons and after school the first week of school. The high school does not handle used books.

NAPOLEON'S NEWEST INDUSTRY GETS OK TO BUILD AIRPLANES

The wheels are beginning to turn at Napoleon's newest industry--an airplane factory at the J.D. Maule Airport. After 4 years of plowing through governmental testing, owner B. D. Maule of Napoleon has begun production of a 145 horsepower high wing plane which he'll name the "Big Dee M 4".

During the four-year span in which he applied for the certificate to produce the plane Maule said he spent about \$50,000 in carrying out load and flight tests and in complying with numerous FAA regulations. A complete set of blueprints for each part of the airplane also had to be completed.

Maule, along with 5 other workers has already manufactured landing gear and wings for 10 airplanes along with fuselages. He hopes to produce from 15 to 20 of the planes the first year of operation and maybe 100 by next year. The plane will cruise at 150 miles per hour and have wing span of 29 feet 8 inches, a length of 22 feet and a gross weight of 2,100 pounds. The craft will carry 42 gallons of gasoline and will sell for \$8,500.

The Clinton State Police post gets a new corporal and a command officer who has been in Clinton for five years leaves. Stanley E. Gibbard, who became a trooper in 1949 was moved to Clinton from the Jackson post on August 13. On the same date Cpl. Harold Simmons became a sergeant and took over the Alpena post. He joined the local post in Clinton in 1956, and has been a trooper for 20 years.

Cpl. Gibbard, a father of five children, was first stationed at Marquette and then at Jackson. He is a native of Antrim county and a World War II veteran.

### FIRST WEEK SCHEDULE

School will begin at 1:30 Tuesday. All busses will run their schedule with 1:00 p.m. replacing 8:00 a.m. on the time schedule. Bus routes will be approximately the same as last year with minor changes being made for new students. School will be in session for full days Wednesday and Thursday with school in the morning only Friday. Faculty meetings are scheduled Tuesday A.M. and Friday P.M.

### STUDENT INSURANCE

Student insurance will be available the first week of school. The cost will be K-6 \$1.50 and 7-12 \$1.75. This is accident insurance that covers the student in direct route to and from school, during the school day and all school supervised extra curricular events. It also covers the child in the same manner for church events.

It will also be possible to insure your child for accidents on a 24 hour basis, year around, for a fee of \$10.00. All of this insurance pays in addition to any other policy.

### KINDERGARTEN SCHEDULE

The schedule for this year will be approximately the same as last year. All village children will attend in the P.M. and all rural children in the A.M. with the exception of one area where we will pick up rural students for afternoon sessions. These parents will be notified if they are on this route. Afternoon Kindergarten will meet at 1:30 Tuesday. There will be Kindergarten in the A.M. only on Friday.

### SPECIAL EDUCATION

Special Ed students will attend school in Chelsea and Manchester Wednesday and Thursday with full schedule beginning Monday. The new elementary room at Pleasant Lake will not be completed until October. Elementary classes will meet temporarily in the Intermediate Building.

### BOARD STUDIES SENIOR TRIPS & ACTIVITY SCHEDULES

Questionnaires sent out to 8th & 9th grade parents have been under study by the school board throughout the summer. The consensus of opinion seems to be that the seniors should be allowed to take a trip. Problems that are quite evident are being taken under consideration such as the length of trip, the cost of the trip and the number of extra curricular activities necessary to finance the trip.

Many schools have eliminated senior trips, however the local board does not believe this to be necessary but do feel limitations are needed.

A policy concerning senior trips will be decided in the near future.

Another questionnaire sent to area ministers is being studied. It is hoped that the board can formulate a policy that will reduce conflicts between school and church activities.

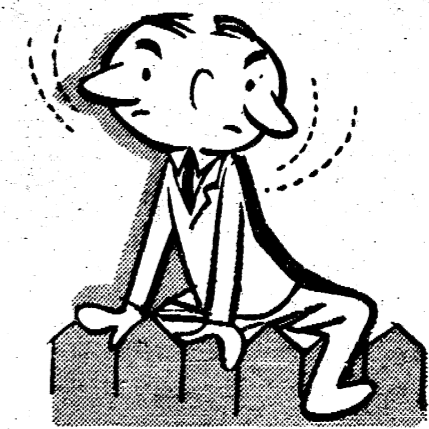
## Shorty Made No "Bones" About it

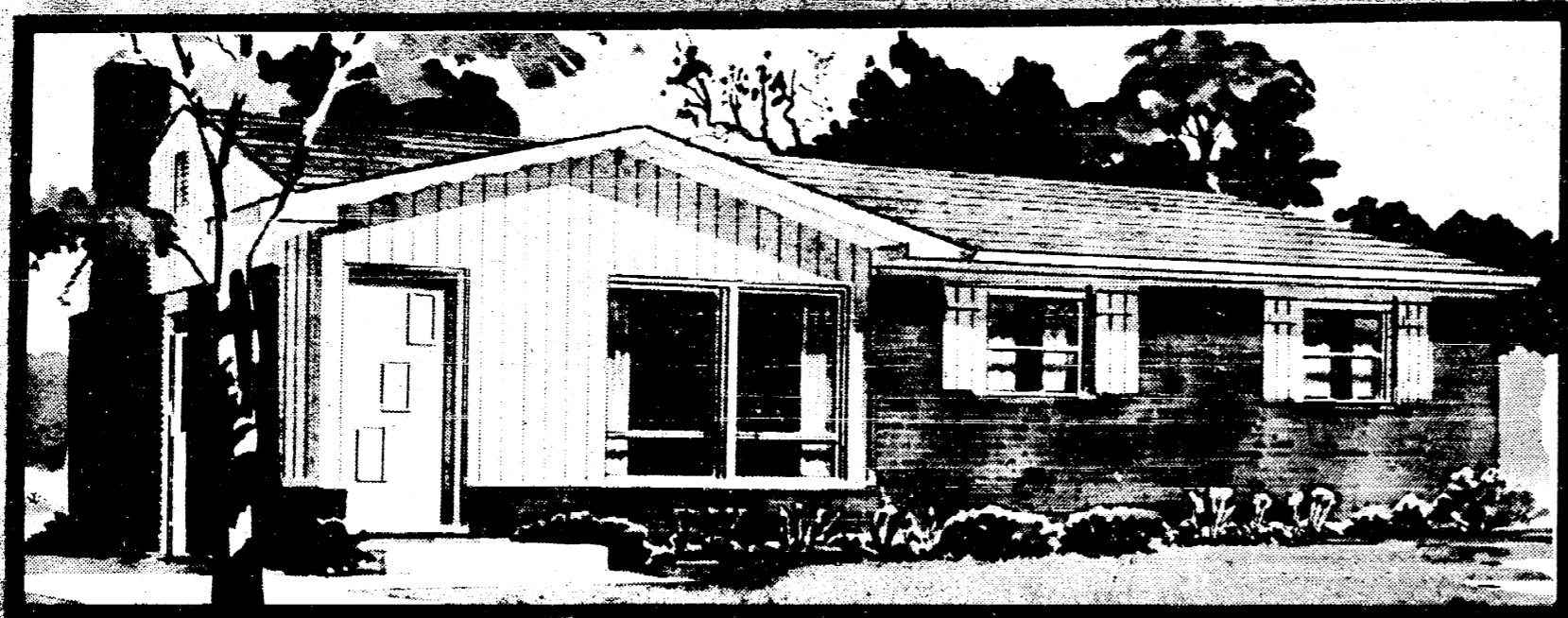

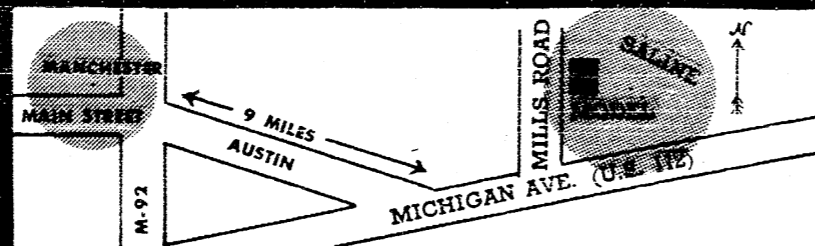

### VOTE TUESDAY, SEPTEMBER 12TH

The Democrats are: Allan W. Grossman, county candidate; Robert Carr, First district; and E. Eugene Sutter, Second district; The Republicans are; Roscoe O. Bonisteel, Sr., county; James K. Pollock, First district; and J. Don Lawrence, Second district.
