### Swedish Skanska Limpa

- 1½ cups warm water (not hot—110 to 115°)
  - 2 pkg. Fleischmann's active dry yeast
  - ¼ cup molasses
  - ½ cup sugar
  - 1 tsp. salt
  - 2 tbsp. soft shortening
  - 1 tsp. anise seeds or finely shredded rind of 1 to 2 oranges
  - 2½ cups un sifted\* rye flour
  - 2½ to 3 cups un sifted\* GOLD MEDAL "Kitchen-tested" Enriched Flour
- \*To measure flour, dip nested dry measuring cups into flour. Level off with straight-edged spatula.
- In mixing bowl dissolve yeast in warm water. Stir in molasses, sugar, salt, shortening and anise seeds. Add half of flour, mix with spoon. Add rest of flour, mix with hand. Turn dough onto lightly floured cloth-covered board. Cover and let stand 10 min. to tighten up. Knead until smooth and elastic. Place in greased bowl. Cover with cloth and let rise in warm place (85°) until double in bulk, about 2 hr. (If kitchen is cool, place dough on a rack over a bowl of hot water and cover completely with a towel.) Punch down. Round up and again let rise in warm place until not quite double, about 45 min. Punch down, divide into two parts. Roll each part into a 12x8" rectangle. Cut through center lengthwise. Cut in thirds crosswise, forming 6 squares. Cut squares diagonally forming 12 triangles. Place 1" apart on greased baking sheets and let rise until double, about 1 hr. Heat oven to 400° (mod. hot). Bake about 10 min., or until nicely browned.

### NEW SENIOR TRIP POLICY

At a regular board meeting the final discussion concerning senior trips was first on the agenda. The board had considered all opinions registered on questionnaires sent out last spring. They had compared with various class sponsors comments after accompanying a class on a trip. Also under consideration was the money available in Manchester for such a trip. It was decided that certain trips had enough educational value that they should not be eliminated. It also seemed evident that recent trips were becoming too much of a burden in many ways. The following is the policy adopted. It shall be strictly adhered to in the future.

### SENIOR TRIPS

In the spring of 1961 questionnaires were sent to 100 parents who had children entering High School. After consideration of all opinions, recommendations and problems incurred, it was decided that a Senior Trip with limitations as to time, money and projects would best satisfy the majority of students, parents and school employees.

**POLICY ADOPTED SEPTEMBER 1, 1961**  
The senior trips are to be as follows: The trip should be planned to Washington. If for some reason, the class would rather go to some other place of comparable or shorter distance special school board approval will be necessary before plans can be made. The school board will also approve the travel agency. As of this date, Teen Tours are the approved travel agency.

**CLASS OF 1962**  
A maximum of four days out of school week. Money spent not to exceed \$100.00 per pupil going on trip. All money may be raised by class projects.

**BEGINNING WITH CLASS OF 1963**  
A maximum of three days out of school week. Money spent not to exceed \$90.00 per pupil going on trip. Total amount spent from projects not to exceed \$5,500.00.

**APPROVED PROJECTS:**  
**OUT OF SCHOOL SALES—APPROVED**  
Sophomore Class-Winter magazine sales. Senior Class-Fall Christmas cards and wrapping paper (these two items only). Other projects such as car washes, bake sales, pancake suppers, entertainments, etc., that do not entail solicitation to be permitted by school faculty and administration consent.  
**SUMMER PROJECTS STARTING JULY 1962**  
Seniors - 2, Juniors - 1, Sophomores - 1, Freshmen - 0.  
Class sponsors are not contracted for the summer months. Summer projects must be supervised by Adults approved by the Administration.

**SCHOOL BOARD POLICY CONCERNING SCHOOL ACTIVITIES**  
The following is a policy regulating the scheduling of school activities.

It is hoped that other community organizations may find this helpful when scheduling their activities.

- ACTIVITY SCHEDULE POLICY**
- There will be no school activities scheduled on Sundays, Good Friday or Christmas Day, with exception of Baccalaureate, unless activity is scheduled by State organization.
  - There will be no student activities scheduled on Thursday evenings with the following exceptions: Basketball tournaments, 1 Jr. High Operatta, Graduation.
  - Student activities will be held to a minimum on Wednesday evenings.

**ADULT ACTIVITIES**  
The School Board shall impose no restriction upon adult activities that take place on school premises. The board encourages adults to take part in Church activities in the Church of their choice.

Adult activities scheduled by the school will not be scheduled Thursday nights with exception of the Lenten season. At this time school shall schedule events on Thursday nights and avoid Wednesday evenings so adults may attend special church services.

There's Alice Jones, for instance—quiet and eager to join the Future Teachers, yet whose parents insist she come home immediately after school because she has enough to do at home. If they can only know the inspiration Alice would have in joining such a group and see the values involved, they'll give permission.

And Tom, who always loiters after school and seems unwilling to go home and wears unhappy eyes—now maybe Mrs. Gardner can help a bit if she just understands.

And John, who wants to go to camp so badly with the group but who sadly says his father doesn't approve of things like that, that boys and girls should study regular books, instead of clouds and sky-why. Mrs. Gardner knows that Johnny's dad will even help if he can understand the program, but he didn't come to school the night it was discussed, and so he doesn't know.

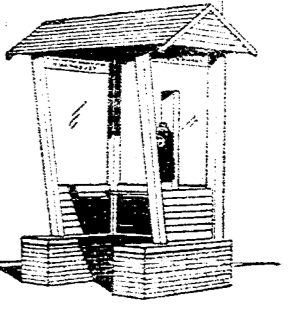

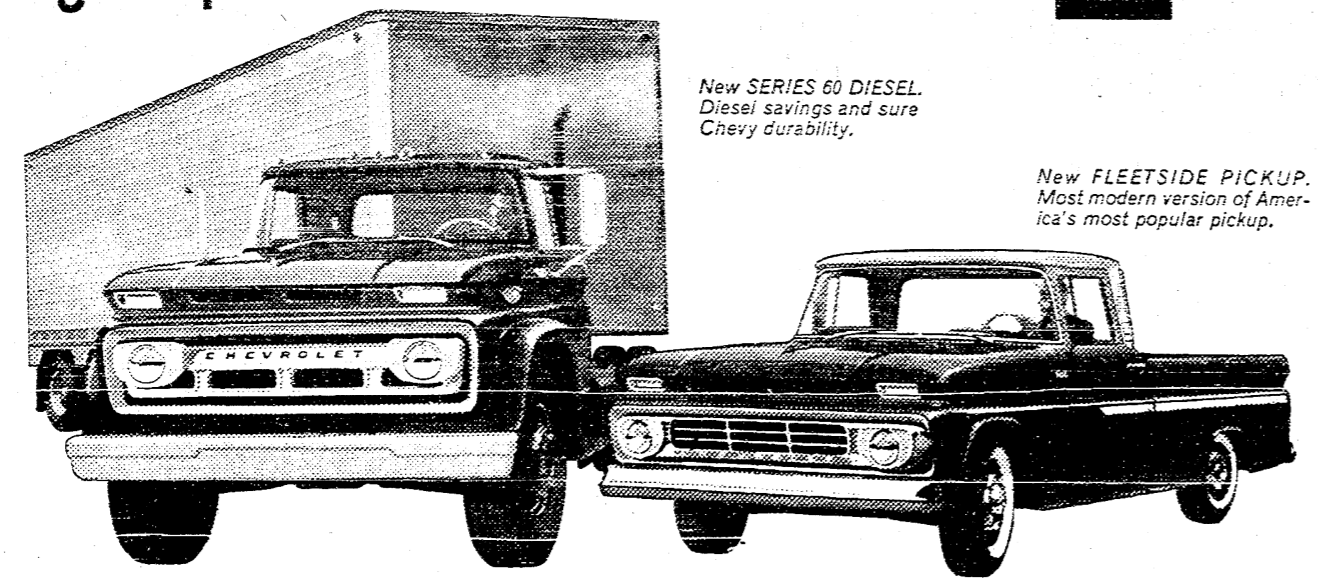

DOLLAR and SENSE FARMING. WONDERING HOW MUCH TO CUT YOUR WHEAT ACREAGE? Under the new legislation, you must cut acreage by 10 per cent to be eligible for loan or you can voluntarily retire up to 40 per cent of your acreage allotment. If chances are good that your yields will equal or exceed your normal yield, it will be most profitable for you to cut acreage by only 10 per cent. However, you should probably cut acreage more than the minimum 10 per cent if you're in a risky area. REDUCE CHANCES OF FOOT ROT occurring among cattle in feedlots. Start by cleaning up old sticks, stones, wire and nails which might cause injury to feet and allow entrance of the foot rot organism. Also clean lots regularly of manure. Another big help is pouring concrete slabs along feeders and water tanks. Healthy animals are most resistant to disease. So make sure you're feeding a well-balanced diet which includes plenty of vitamins and minerals. DRY COWS IN PLENTY OF TIME BEFORE CALVING. An adequate rest before calving will assure a higher level of production during the next lactation. Figure on drying off most cows six to eight weeks before calving—dry off cows in poor condition sooner than this. Cows in good condition going into the dry period will not require heavy grain feeding, providing the roughage is of good quality. Cows in poor flesh will need grain in addition to high quality roughage. DON'T GLEAN CORN FIELDS WITH YOUR EWE FLOCK. You can more profitably glean corn fields with hogs, that they may founder. 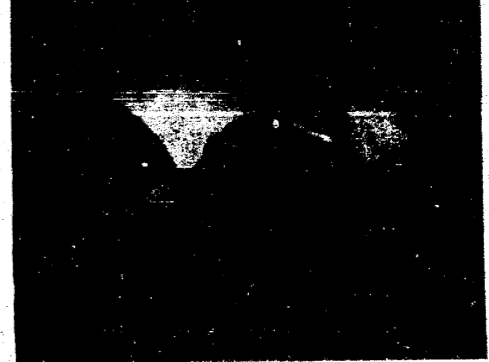
