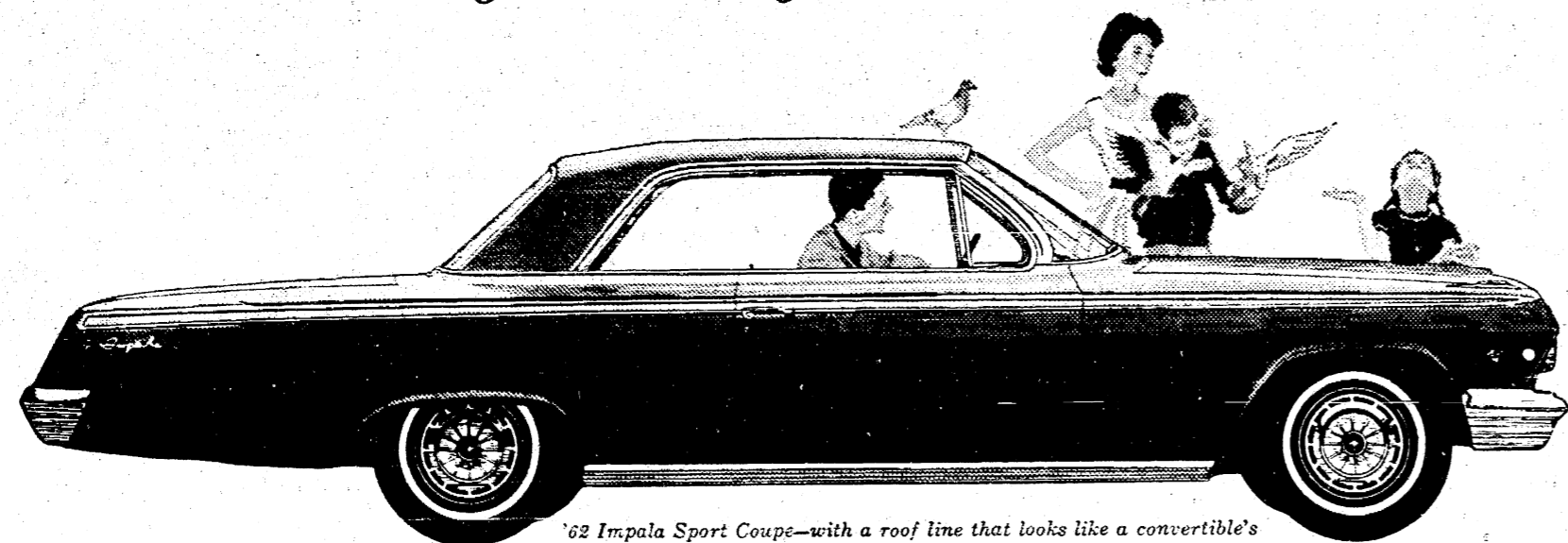

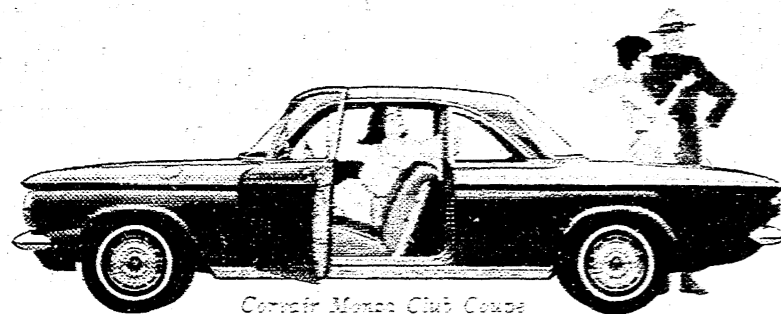

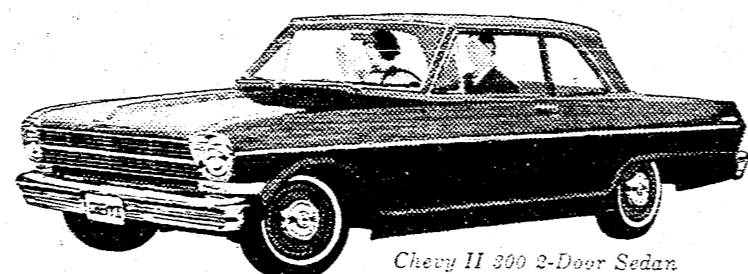

OFFICIAL REPORT FOR 1960-61

Manchester Public School organized as a fourth class district operated for the first time with a seven member board. During the year the district became a registration district and a secondary guidance program was established with the help of federal monies.

A full time Special Education Program was established in cooperation with the Chelsea Public Schools. Manchester administered an Intermediate Room with Chelsea maintaining the Junior High School and High School Program. Plans were made with the County Board of Education to build two Special Education Rooms at Pleasant Lake. This construction was underway by the end of the school year.

The residents of the area provided enough money to pave the driveway around the high school and to rewire most of the lights on the football field.

With the help of the area Citizens Committee the board presented a budget to the public which was put into operation by a special four mill operational millage accepted by the local tax payers.

Together with the Citizens Committee, it was decided to study the schools instructional program during the next year.

The school accounts were audited monthly by Paul V. Engstrom and Company and the following is a composite of their report for the 1960-61 school year.

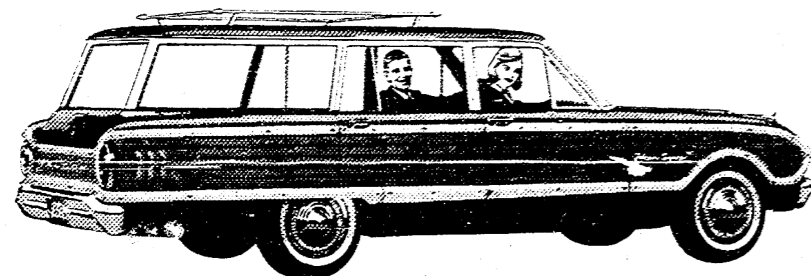

HERITAGE OF HISTORY

Established in 1938, the Michigan Historical Collections contain research materials on all phases of the history of Michigan, its people, and its institutions. The Collections include over 20,000 volumes of books and pamphlets, 1400 maps and more than 1,000,000 letters, diaries, account books and other manuscript materials. Some of the manuscript collections reflect the careers of men and women who have been prominent leaders in their chosen fields. Other collections contain letters and diaries written by men and women who were unknown beyond their communities, but their papers, too, are useful sources of information about social, political, and economic activities.

In a fireproof modern building, trained staff members sort, clean, repair, catalog, and file such papers and books so that they may be used for research. Anyone who is interested in the history of Michigan or of his own community is welcome to use them in our reading room in the Rackham Building, Ann Arbor.

If you have papers like those mentioned above, or if you know someone who has, please write or phone the Michigan Historical Collections of the University of Michigan.

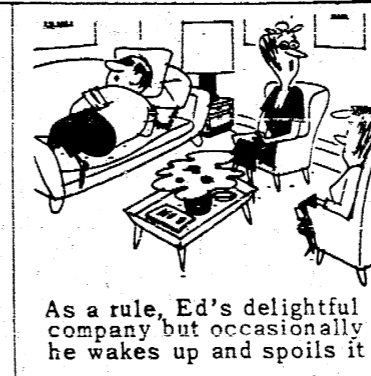

My stay in the Philippines is just beginning. Everyone is so cordial I know I'm going to enjoy the rest of my stay.

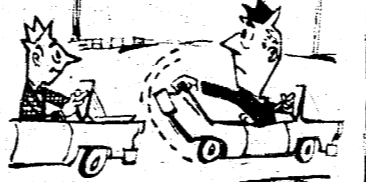
