United Fund Opens with Kick Off Dinner

Seventy-five volunteer workers for the Manchester United Community Fund and Red Cross Campaign received their materials and instructions for the 1961-62 Drive, Wednesday night, from Campaign Chairman, Clarence Fielder at the Knights of Columbus hall.

The brief program included introduction of campaign personnel and the aims of the drive by Chairman Fielder. Manchester's number one dance team "Braun and Burkhardt" demonstrated their talent show winning ability. The worth of a United Drive to the Community was pointed out by Mr. Charles H. Chaskes, of Lansing, Public relations director for the Michigan United Fund. Mrs. Louis Vogel cheered the solicitors into starting their work with gay hearts as she explained the intricacies of a Solicitor's Kit and the technique of meeting the public. Rev. Price presided at the meeting and Franklin Reck was master of ceremonies. Mrs. Glen Lehr was the Community Fund Board member in charge of program planning.

As the meeting concluded the church bells in the town welcomed the beginning of the annual campaign to raise funds for the local youth and recreational services, care of the ill, and unfortunate, disaster relief and research on disease—the humanitarian needs of the locality as well as people elsewhere.

The campaign goal set by the local Community Fund board this year is the same as last, \$8,500, for 46 agencies.

This voluntary civic project has already used many hours of time and effort. The Jaycees have put up the banners on Main Street—the banners were originally given without charge to the local Fund by the Ann Arbor United Fund when they changed their campaign insignia.
