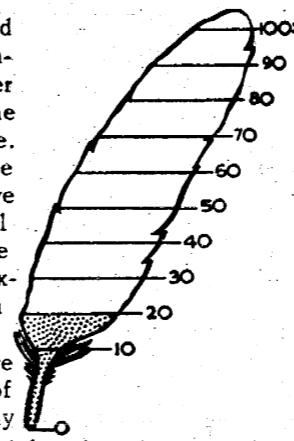

UNITED FUND GOAL \$8,500

This year's Manchester area United Community Fund and Red Cross Campaign should raise \$8,500 by October 30 to do its share in helping support the 46 agencies included in the local drive. Over 10% of the quota was in by the first report day, two days after the drive was opened, October 12. The School Division, Ted Tapping chairman, made a preliminary report of \$300 from approximately fifth percent of the division donors.

This year's quota is a minimum figure which barely meets the requirements of the area. Meeting it, means that many residents will have to set their sights higher than they were last year, when the drive failed by a few hundred dollars.
