Manchester School Notes

The addition to the Pleasant Lake school is nearly completed. The building includes two special education rooms, two lavatories two storage rooms and a main lobby. Eighty percent of the cost of this building, plus all of the equipment, is financed by the Washtenaw County Board of Education. The remainder of the cost will be covered by the moneys accumulated in the building and site fund from the Pleasant Lake school and the first Nellie Ackerson school. Together with the addition the Pleasant Lake school is being brought up to state fire and electrical standards. The addition is planned in such a way that it can be converted into regular class rooms when the need arises.

There are 124 children in the Pleasant Lake school from the kindergarten through the fifth grade. In the entire Manchester school system there are 1030 children with 270 in the 9th through the 12th grades; 231 in the 6th through 8th grades and 387 in the Nellie Ackerson school from the kindergarten through the 5th grades. There are 18 special education students.

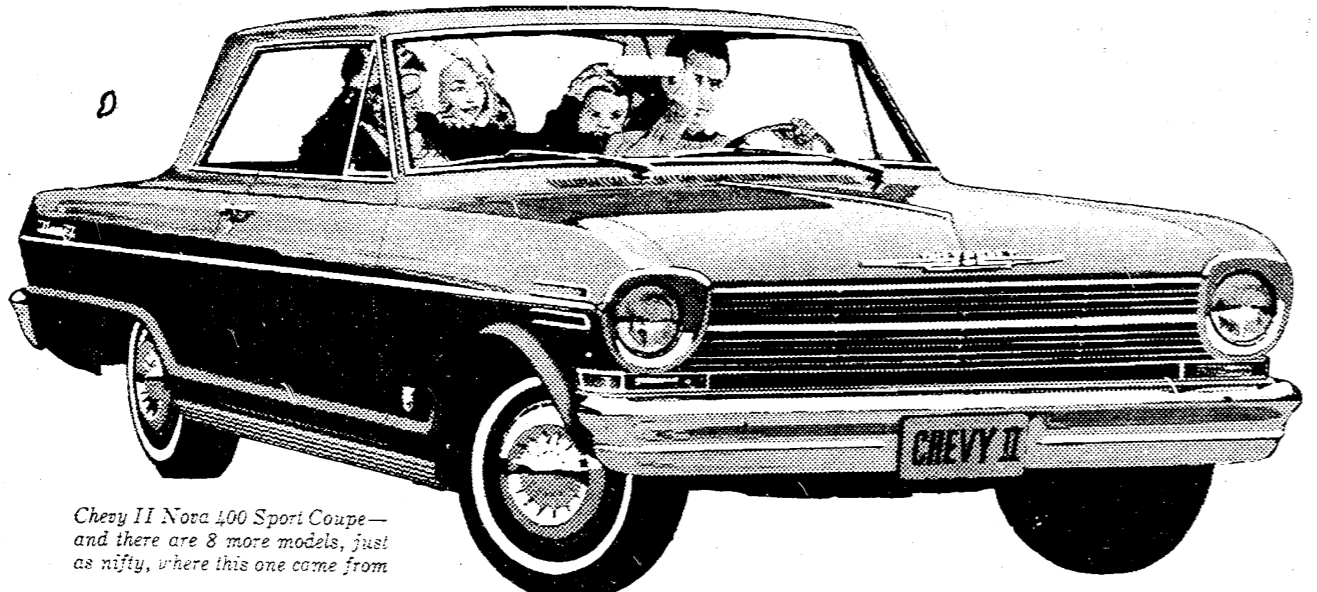

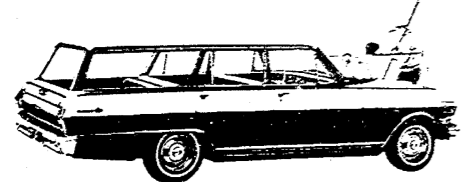

Receives Bronze Vail Medal

The Michigan Bell Telephone Company has bestowed honors of a hero on one of its Battle Creek employees who saved the life of a five-year-old girl. William D. Yeager, 25, a telephone installer for the company and the father of twin boys, was awarded the Bronze Vail Medal for the act of valor in saving the life of little Kathleen McKendrick whose clothing caught fire. The incident occurred last May while Yeager was replacing a telephone line at a Battle Creek residence near which the McKendrick girl and other children were playing. Hearing the shouts of neighbors, Yeager looked up to see Kathy running down a nearby driveway with her clothing and hair ablaze. He rushed to her, put the flames out with his bare hands, and administered first aid. The burns on Kathy's arms and back would have been fatal, doctors said, were it not for Yeager's action.

Vail medals are awarded to Bell System employees for heroic and outstanding acts of public service. A medal presentation ceremony will be held for Mr. Yeager at a future date.

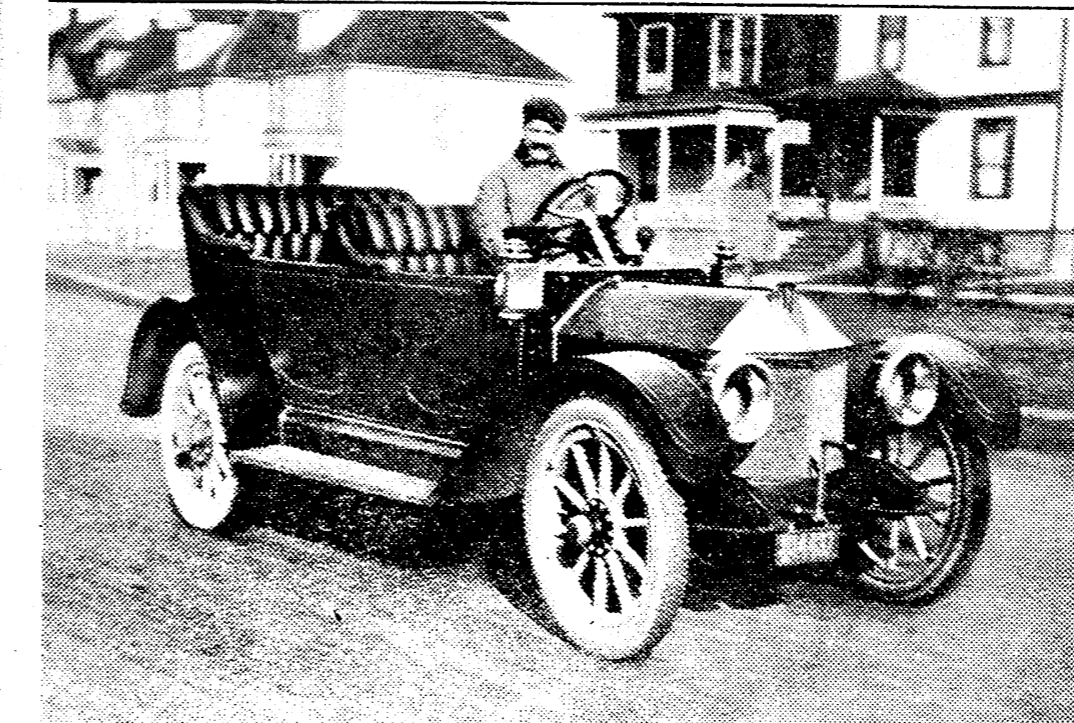

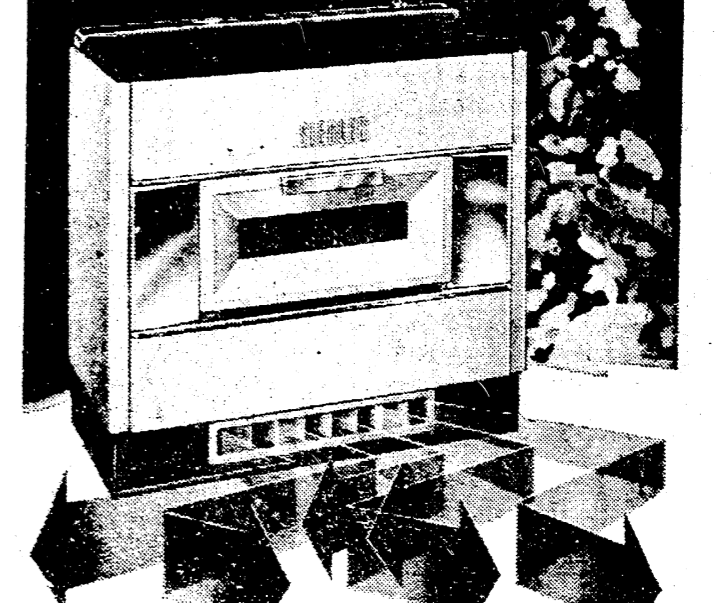

Nan Johnson, daughter of the famous Texas oil millionaire, Mr. Johnson, revealed her secret engagement to Mr. Donald Doss.

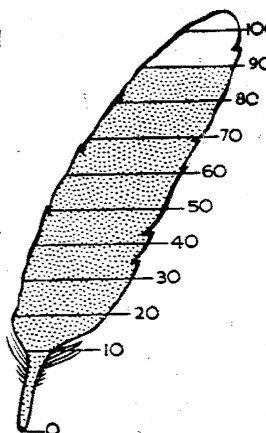
