I would like to make a report on some of the past and present activities of your village. We certainly congratulate Walter W. Schaible on the beautification of his clothing store, with a new front and remodeling of the interior. The various committees of the council have been very busy this summer and fall. A new well No. 1 has been completed at a cost of \$7,660.94. On Division St., and Madison, asphalt has been laid at a cost of \$1,271.60. On parts of Territorial, Union, Duncan and Vernon, seal coat was applied at cost of \$3,149.81. Nearly 4,200 feet of curb and gutter was installed at cost of \$8,327.90, several blocks of sewer has been cleaned by a firm from Kalamazoo. Applications for extension of water mains have been read and are under consideration (financing being the big bug-a-boo). We trust you will enjoy the Christmas tree on Main Street and the Christmas decorations in the business district. The beautiful tree was donated by Mr. John J. Pipping, many thanks John. The J C's installed the decorations on Main St., the cost of which was taken care of by the J C's, Optimist and the Village. A parting thought—

Last Sunday, the Manchester Jaycees placed the Christmas decorations along Main Street of the village. Putting up and taking down the decorations is one of the annual activities of the Jaycees. This fall the Village Council called upon the Jaycees to select new ornaments. Tom Marshall and Bill Baker represented the Jaycees in making the purchases. The red foil stripe on the poles and the star and bells assemblies at each end of the business district were obtained for this year in addition to the tree the village put up. Each of the across-the-street decorations cost \$190.00. The purchase of one was financed by the Village, the other purchase was made jointly by the Manchester Optimist Club and the Manchester Jaycees. The Jaycees have a study committee to make suggestions for long range planning and purchasing of Christmas Decorations for the Village. One possibility is a Nativity scene, life size, to be placed in the park near the churches. A starter set would cost between \$300 and \$500.

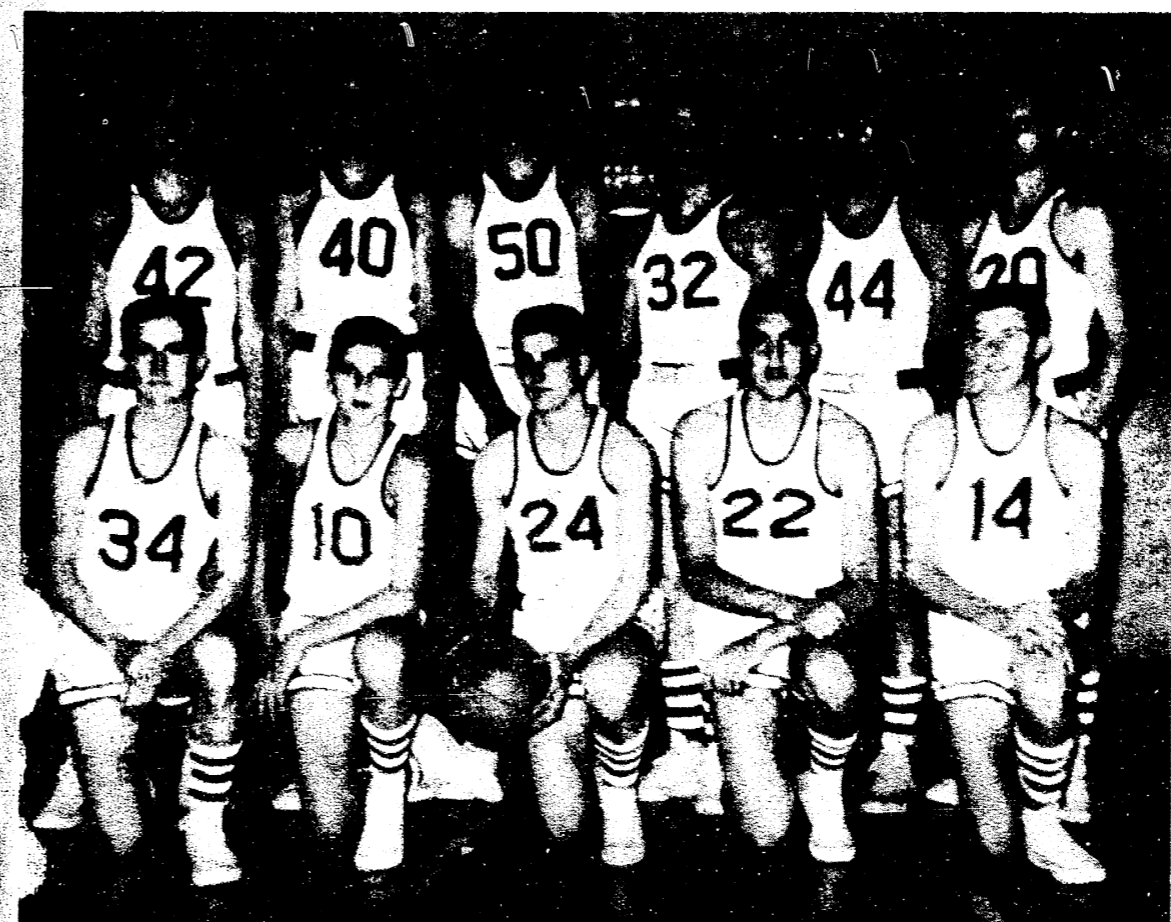

Dutchmen Launch 61-62 Basketball Season With Two Victories

Friday night contest was a right step to the Washtenaw Conference Title with a win over Pinckney by posting a score of 49-28 in favor of the Dutchmen.

Gary Pniwski, 6-4, center led the scoring by firing in 8 baskets and 4 foul shots, giving a total of 20 points for his nights work. Brokaw followed with 9 points, Kuebler 8 points, Weidmayer 4, Schaffer, Short, Weir, and Mann each with 2 points, a successful start for the whole team.

Tuesday night the Dutchmen swept their second victory, defeating their arch-rivals, Clinton, by the tune of 46-27.

Manchester's Ken Brokaw was the high point man for the Dutchmen firing in 20 points followed this time by Gary Pniwski with 11 scoring points, for the second night Brokaw and Pniwski have run one two in scoring. This may be a beginning of 1-2 punch that the Dutchmen are looking forward to.

Darrell Harper, former University of Michigan football player, had a happy debut as a basketball coach Friday night and Tuesday night as his Manchester High School team posted victories over Pinckney and Clinton.

Farmers Share Corn Through CROP

During the past few weeks more than a dozen men of the Saline, Manchester, Bridgewater area have had periodic meetings in the Washtenaw County Farm Bureau building to plan for collection and shipping of a carload of corn for CROP. More than a dozen Farm Bureau discussion groups have agreed to help—most have pledged at least 100 bushels per group. Corn is to be delivered to the Saline elevator December 12 and 13.

The corn will be shipped to the Staly Corporation and exchanged for corn oil. Each bushel of corn provides from 1/2 to 3/4 gallon of high quality oil. CROP is essentially the only source of fats for most overseas church feeding programs.

"Most Americans get all the fat our bodies need in the lean meat we eat, but people you help through CROP seldom or never get meat", Mr. Russell M. Hartzler, Michigan CROP Director, told the group. He said that according to church relief workers overseas, "corn oil has almost medicinal value and helps greatly in clearing up skin-sores caused by malnutrition".

wishing to make contributions of corn may call on any of these men for information.

Also sharing in the shipping of this carload are: Horace Whitney, Floyd Chamberlain, Francis Wheeler, Walter Zeeb, Don Zeeb, Ralph Wheeler and Walter Mast, in the Whitmore Lake area, and Laurence Boettner and Victor Haussler of Bridgewater who joined FRIENDSHIP ACRES last spring, agreeing to give an acre of corn (or its equivalent in cash) to help feed needy people overseas.

People who receive CROP food know that it comes from the people of the U.S.A. that it comes out of hearts of love and generosity—that it is voluntarily shared. And the voluntarily given CROP food often makes "Government surplus" more acceptable.

When you give corn you give people food they need—you create good will—you save Government-paid storage costs—you strengthen the hands and make glad the hearts of those who hand out the food for you.

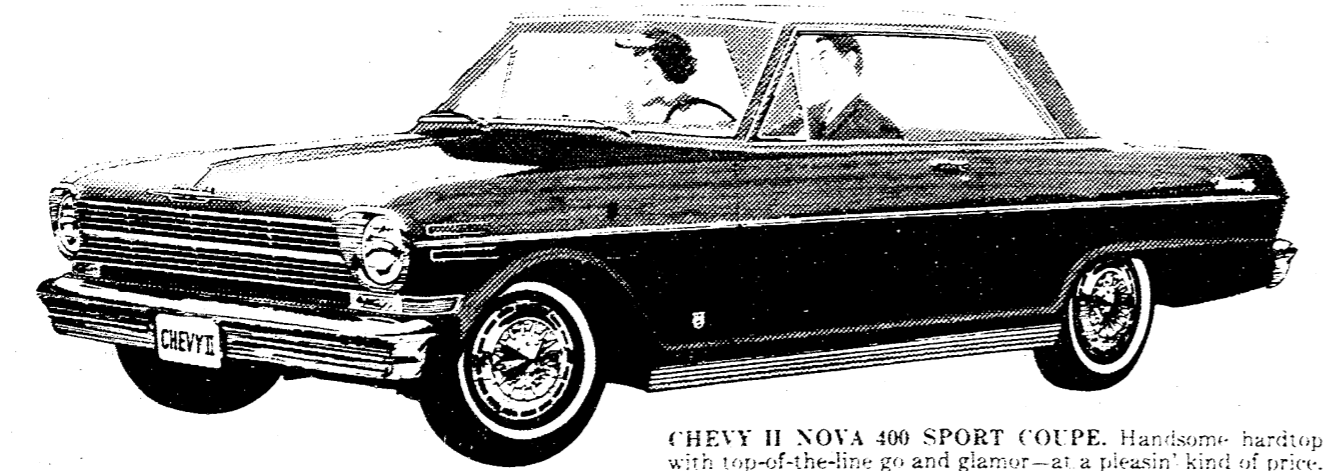

"If you are going to be big-hearted, do it on your own time... and don't wait for death to open up your heart to the needy and the sick.

"I believe flowers are proper and right at the time of death, beautifully symbolic of the brief human life, grown by God and thereby so precious to Him, even at its fading.

"So, no matter what others may say, send Me flowers. And don't use my last mortal remains as a charity income tax deduction."

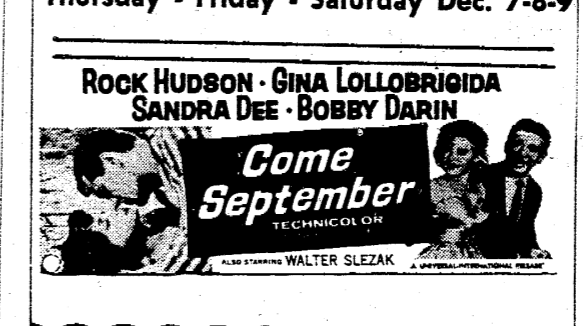

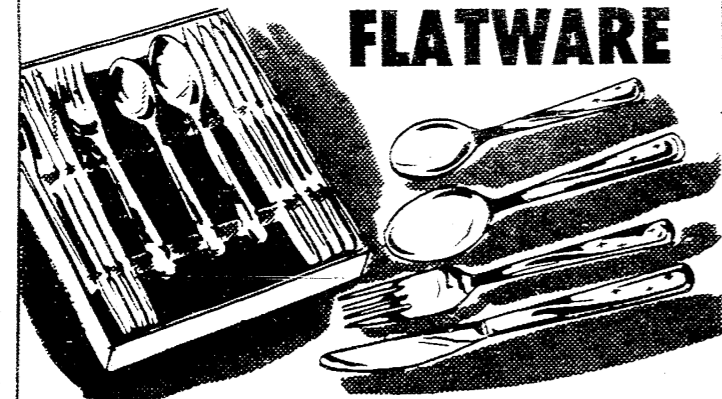

Saute onion and green pepper in butter or margarine until lightly browned. Add pimientos, olives, salt and oregano. Using 1 1/2 cups of noodles, place in layers the turkey, vegetables, ham and the noodles in buttered 2 quart casserole, ending with vegetable layer. Spoon apple sauce over top. Toss remaining noodles with 2 tablespoons melted butter; place in ring around edge of casserole and sprinkle with paprika. Bake in hot oven, 375 degrees, 25 to 30 minutes. Makes 6-8 servings.

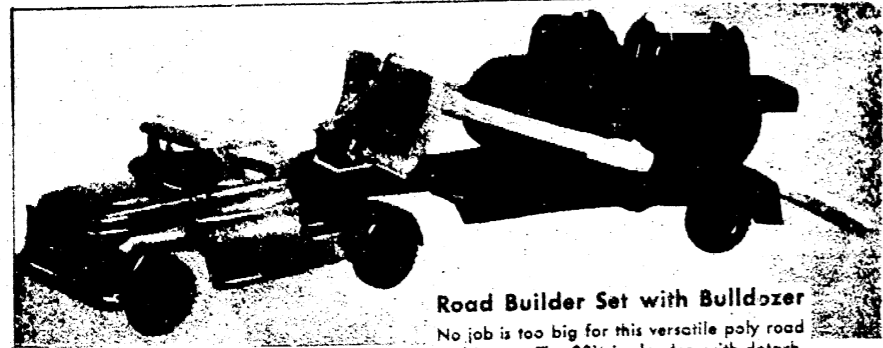

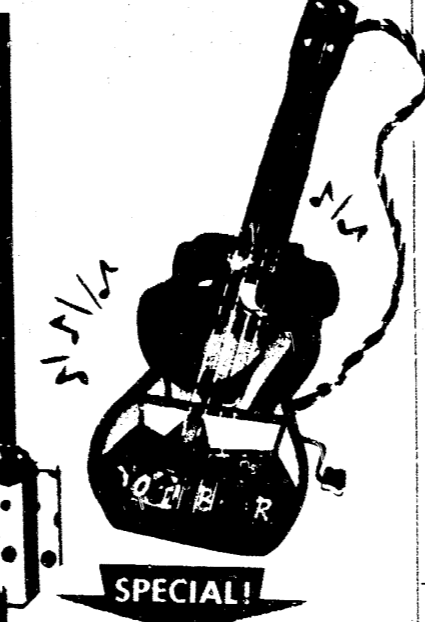

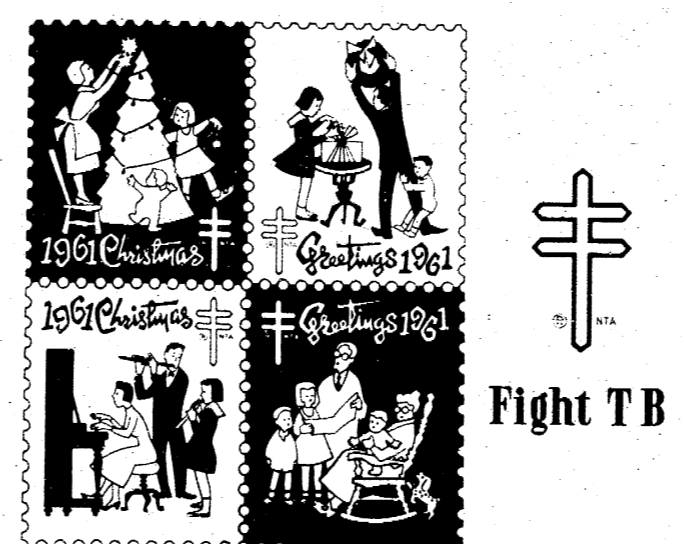

The old-fashioned custom of sending flowers to funeral, increasingly supplanted by a terse "Please Omit Flowers" in a death notice, is something worth preserving. Thanks Rev. W. Carter Merbeier, 34, of St. Matthews Lutheran Church in Philadelphia.

In this month's pastoral letter to his flock, he pleaded eloquently for flowers — at his own funeral, in any case.

"Don't paste my casket with certificates for charities, and professional chair endorsements, and the hundred-and-one do-gooder agencies goulshly squeezing through the door of the funeral parlor for a handout.

"If you are going to be big-hearted, do it on your own time. . . . and don't wait for death to open up your heart to the needy and the sick.

"I believe flowers are proper and right at the time of death, beautifully symbolic of the brief human life, grown by God and thereby so precious to Him, even at its fading.

"So, no matter what others may say, send ME flowers. And don't use my last mortal remains as a charity income tax deduction."

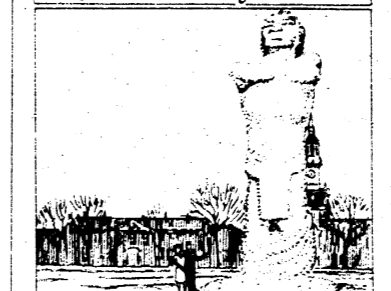
