Referral Center To Help Problem Drinkers

A letter from the Washtenaw County Council of Churches to the Reverend Jesse D. Epps announces the opening of a Referral Center for problem drinkers at their office in the Parish House at St. Andrews Episcopal Church, 306 N. Division St., Ann Arbor, each Tuesday 7:30 to 9:30 p.m.

Dr. Robert Moore, M.D., and Director of Adult In-Patient, Neuro-Psychiatric Institute at the University of Michigan Hospital, is the director of the center. Information can be obtained by calling NOrmandy 5-0476 for referral help.

The Center is set up for the Washtenaw County Committee on Alcoholism, a non-profit organization composed of representatives from thirty welfare, social, law enforcement and medical agencies in the county as well as interested individuals. It is affiliated with other similar organizations under the Michigan State Board of Alcoholism. Its major functions are community education and the care of persons afflicted with alcohol. The need for the Center is indicated by the fact that there are about 5,000 alcoholics in this county.

Returned From Guatamala and Mexico

Mr. and Mrs. Franklin M. Reck returned from a two weeks trip to Costa Rica, Guatamala and Mexico on Saturday. Mr. Reck represented the Ford Motor Company at the Rural Youth Group meetings (similar to the Club Congress in Chicago each fall) in San Jose, Costa Rica, and Guatamala. He also collected material for the "Suplemento" and "Anuario Ford Para La Juventud Rural de las Americas" which are published by the Ford Motor Company International Group.

English Have Long Observed New Year

Prior to September 14, 1752, England and her colonies regarded January 1 with indifference. New Year's Day was observed on March 25, and, of course, New Year's Eve was March 24. But, the English have never been indifferent about observance of the New Year holiday, whether before or after adoption of the Gregorian calendar.

The Puritan government abolished Christmas and outlawed any observance of the holiday, so the people vented all their holiday spirit on the New Year. Restoration of the Stuarts brought about a revival of Christmas customs and traditions, yet the return of this great holiday did not dim the people's enthusiasm for the New Year observance. Adoption of the Gregorian calendar in 1752 likewise only changed the time for celebrating from March 24-25 to December 31-January 1.

Michigan Education Association Reports

More than 150 teachers and administrators from throughout the state will attend the fifth annual conference of the Teacher Education and Professional Standards (TEPS) Commission of the Michigan Education Association which will be held in the Jack Tar Hotel, Lansing, Jan. 4-6.

In the decade of the 60's, the population of this country will increase to 214 million. The overall increase is expected to be 19.1 percent. But within this framework, the percentages vary widely. For instance; There will be a 57 percent increase in the college-age group, a 43 percent increase in the high-school group, but only a 12 percent increase in the 22-64 age group, which constitutes our working group.

The education of teachers may soon resemble the education of doctors and lawyers in length and high standards. After many years of disageement among influential education leaders, there are now emerging two convictions; the only route to higher quality education is through higher quality teachers, and that drastic changes need to be made in teacher education programs. One important change, most feel, would be the requirement that prospective teachers be well educated in the sciences, humanities, social sciences, as well as trained in the methods of teaching. This would take five more years of preparation, but it would make teaching more attractive as a profession. These and other new directions for education are shown in a book "The Education of Teachers; Consensus and Conflict," by T.M. Stinnett, well-known education reporter.

Keeping Time With Sun is Old Problem

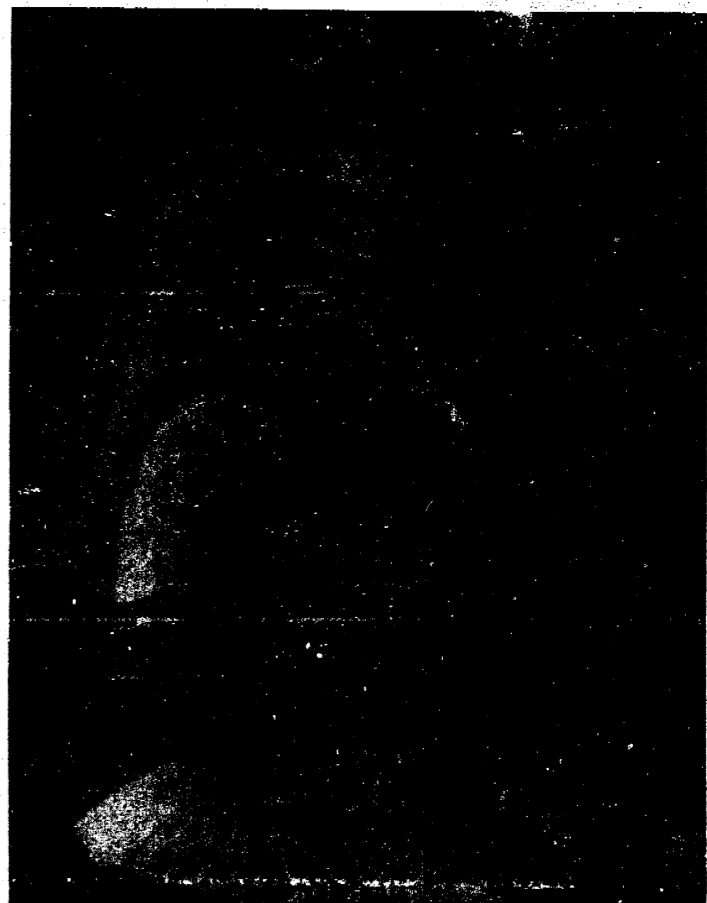

Mummer's Parade Began At Turn Of Century

The first formal Mummer's Parade in Philadelphia took place January 1, 1901. Before the Civil War, Philadelphia families generally held parties on New Year's Eve. Sometime in the 60's, a group of families made the parties a masquerade and walked through the streets in fantastic costumes, extending the mummery into the next day.

The Silver Crown Club marched Jan. 1, 1877, and two other such clubs were already in existence. One band was led by Eph Horn, a minstrel singer, and part of the routine was "shooting away the old year" at midnight, hence the name "shooters." Business firms began offering prizes to clubs passing their places and eventually the parade became a city function.

Haiti Remembers First Day of 1804; Independence Day

January 1 is more than New Year's Day for Haiti; it is also independence day. On the first day of January, 1804, Jean Jacques Dessalines declared the island's freedom from France, making Haiti the second nation of the Western hemisphere to win independence.

Independence and adoption of the Indian name of "Haiti" came after a bitter two-year revolt led against the French initiated by a former slave, Toussaint L'Ouverture. A man of great ability, L'Ouverture rose from slavery to the colonial governorship and to great fame as a soldier and statesman. He called the island's first constitutional assembly and organized an army of slaves in defiance of the mighty Napoleon.

Bonaparte sent an expedition of 70 warships and 25,000 men to Haiti. L'Ouverture was captured and sent to a French prison and the revolt seemed to be ended. But, while L'Ouverture sickened and died in prison, Dessalines rallied the people of Haiti and the French forces were defeated by November, 1803.

The United Nations Declaration was signed Jan. 1, 1942; the U.S. Strategic Air Forces in Europe was formed Jan. 1, 1944 and Japan's Emperor Hirohito disavowed divinity, Jan. 1, 1946.

Rose Bowl Oldest Holiday Classic

Quick now, how many football bowl games will be played during the holiday season? Rose, Sugar, Orange, Cotton... can you name all of the post-season contests?

Probably not. Chances are someone is starting a new bowl game and the word hasn't gotten around yet.

You should know, however, that the "daddy" of all the bowl games is the fabulous Rose Bowl game, which started as a supplement to the Tournament of Roses, way back in 1902. On January 1 of that year, barnstorming Michigan overwhelmed Stanford 49 to 0.

This lopsided conquest of the west representative may or may not have had anything to do with it, but the following year chariot races were substituted for football and it was not until 1916 that collegiate football returned to the Tournament of Roses via a contest in which Washington State defeated Brown University.

Since that time, the Rose Bowl has gained in prestige and annually attracts crowds in excess of 100,000.

Holiday Season Time For Ulcers

The holiday season approaches and with it come toys, candy, fun and merriment for children. For adults it usually brings over-indulgence in rich foods and spirits, shopping worries and bills. While the total effect for children is the happiness-highpoint of the year, for many adults the holiday season means tensions, gastric distress, and debt.

It is not coincidental that the incidence of peptic ulcers takes a

gradual upturn in October and remains higher than normal through the holiday season. There is little doubt in the minds of many medical investigators that the excesses of the winter holidays are contributing factors in the seasonal bumper crop of ulcers.

Hard To Control

Many holiday ulcers could be controlled if the victim were to restrict his diet to bland, uninteresting foods—a task most difficult to achieve when the rest of the family is enjoying those huge and spicy Thanksgiving, Christmas and New Year feasts. Another preventive measure would be a slow, relaxed pace—almost an impossibility when Christmas shopping must be done and bills must be paid. Instead, most ulcer patients will turn to medical help.

Consequently, doctors will be

prescribing more drugs to cure and relieve ulcers in the next four months than at any other time of year. Some of the most useful new drugs in ulcer treatment are tranquilizers to calm people down, nerve-blocking agents which slow the secretion of acid in the stomach, and antacids, to neutralize or deactivate the acid.

Old China Celebrated

In old China, New Year's was a 15-day affair which began on the First Day of the First Moon and climaxed with "Teng Chieh," or the Feast of Lanterns. Family gatherings were traditional throughout the New Year season and the exchange of gifts and all sorts of entertainment filled the days until "Teng Chieh."

In Northern China, lanterns were hung in doors and windows, symbolizing the advent of longer days. In Southern China, spectacular lantern-lit parades, featuring huge fire-breathing dragons (supported from within by many men) would wind their way through the crowded streets.

FEED SOWS FOR LARGE LITTERS. For best litter size, sow gains should be held to 50 to 60 pounds and the ration should contain sufficient amounts of vitamins, protein and minerals. Gilts can be allowed to gain 80 to 100 pounds. Any sow ration can be self-fed by replating 30% to 50% of it with alfalfa hay to provide bulk. If you hand feed, limit corn to about four pounds and feed one to one and one-half pounds of a 36% sow supplement per sow per day.

INSIST ON WELL-ADAPTED, RECOMMENDED STORAGE LEGUMES when purchasing your spring seeding needs. Supply of legume seed is shorter this season so it may not be as easy to buy what you want. But you'll be better off paying more to get the seed suited for your area than to settle for less adapted strains. Better plan to buy needs soon—you're more likely to get what you want. Besides, prices are likely to be higher if you wait until next spring.

BRING YOUR RECORDS UP TO DATE. You will be needing them soon to figure your income tax returns. But that's not all. Careful study of your business this past year may show you what changes might prove helpful in improving your income situation in the year ahead. Furthermore, good records can be very helpful in determining credit needs for the coming year.

LOWER TEMPERATURES DON'T INSURE HIGH EGG QUALITY. Cold, dry air can be as damaging to egg quality as high summer temperature. Humidity is more important than temperature in maintaining egg quality. Even in winter, you'll want to maintain the egg holding room at 70% to 80% humidity.
