He has seen the bank grow from a \$750,000 institution employing four people to the present six million dollar bank with eleven officers and employees. During Mr. Haeussler's Bank Board terms, the bank building has expanded from the original small quarters surrounded by the Gus Breitenwischer store to its present spacious building, including the former Joe Seckinger restaurant building, and the property now includes the former Heimerdinger property which has been converted to a parking lot for building and bank employees.
