### Last Call For Refund

Time is running out for motorists who want a 35¢ refund credit for reflectorized plates they never received. The legislative act which authorizes these credits sets a deadline which makes these refund cards apply only on purchases of 1962 plates and then only if they are used before the February 28 deadline. Persons eligible for refunds are urged to mail their credit application cards to the Department of State in Lansing not later than February 15, 1962. When these cards are received in Lansing, they are checked with the master record and refunds of 35¢ or more are authorized. Credit refund cards are available in all 300 branch offices of the Department of State. Motorists can mail in their own cards or give them to their local branch manager who will send them to Lansing for validation. This process takes from two to four days, depending on the work load at the time, plus the days the card is in the mail.

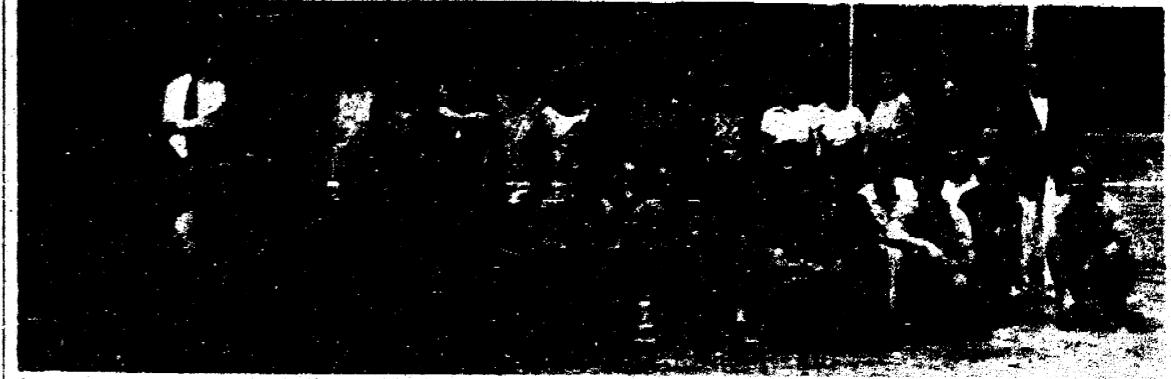

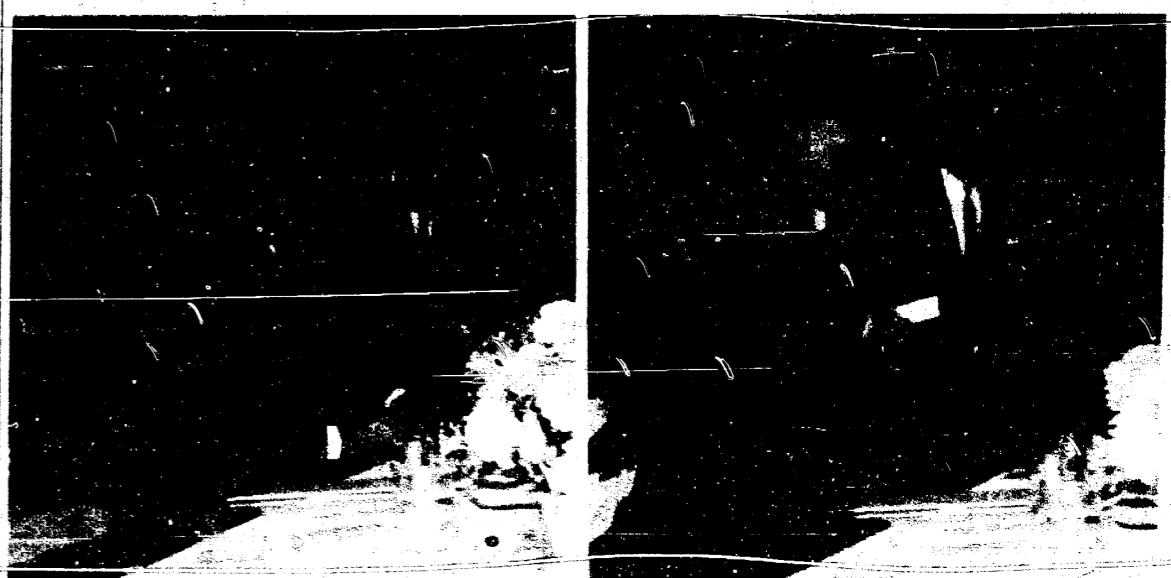


A group of Double A employees in 1940.

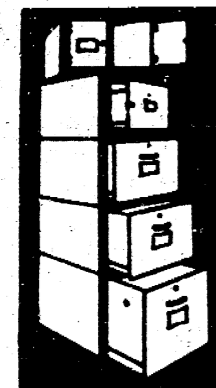
## 1962 A Final Tribute

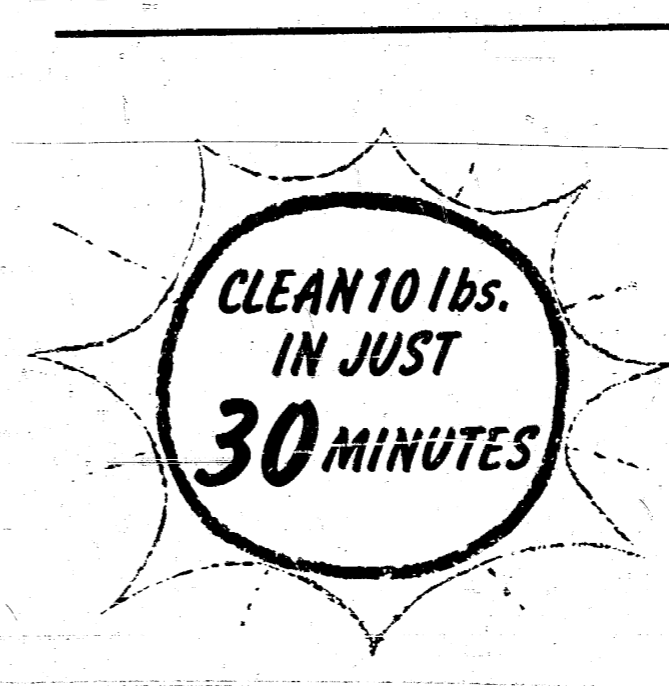

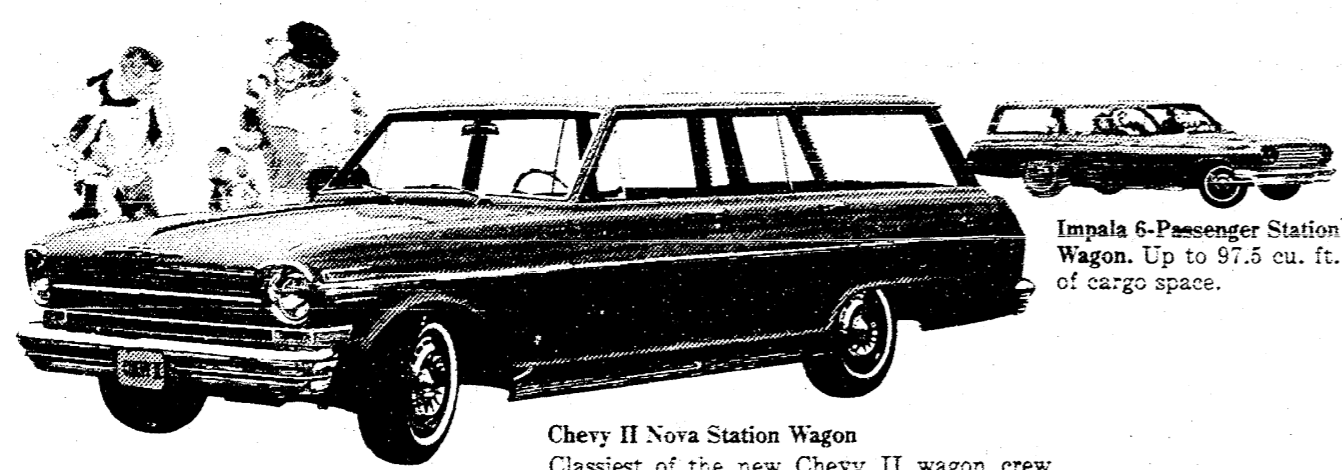

### APPLE CHEESE HOT BREAD ... for a Wintertime Meal



Here is a hot bread so good you'll be tempted to make a whole meal of it.

The bread itself is a good honest loaf, light, close crumbed and tender. But it's the topping that sets this loaf apart. A fragrant blend of canned apple slices, brown sugar and spices is spread thick over the top. Over that is sprinkled grated cheese, with just enough beaten egg and milk to bind the topping. Last touch... poppy seeds. Then into the oven to bake.

Served warm with a hearty meat, fish or chicken salad, or with a thick soup, you have the makin's of a fine satisfying lunch or supper.

It's a simple bread to make. Just allow for the time to rise all yeast breads demand.

- 1 package dry yeast
- 1 cup lukewarm water
- 1 cup milk
- 2 tablespoons butter
- 2 tablespoons sugar
- 1 teaspoon salt
- 2 1/4 cups sifted all-purpose flour
- 2 1/2 cups (1 can) sliced apples
- 1/2 cup brown sugar
- 1 teaspoon cinnamon
- 1/2 teaspoon nutmeg
- 1/4 teaspoon cloves
- 2 cups grated sharp cheddar cheese
- 1 egg
- 1/4 cup milk
- 2 teaspoons poppy seeds

Dissolve yeast in lukewarm water. Scald 1/4 cup milk; add butter, sugar and salt. Stir until butter is melted. Cool to lukewarm; add yeast. Add to flour and mix to a dough. Knead on floured board about 3-4 minutes. Place in greased bowl; cover. Let rise in warm place until double in bulk. Press out dough into greased 13" x 9" x 2" pan. Cover; let rise until double in bulk. Combine apples, brown sugar, cinnamon, nutmeg and cloves. Simmer 5-8 minutes until most of the liquid has evaporated. Cool. Carefully spoon over dough. Sprinkle with cheese. Beat egg; add 1/4 cup milk. Spoon over cheese. Sprinkle with poppy seeds. Bake in hot oven 400 degrees, 30-35 minutes, or until done. Serve warm. Makes 18 servings.

### County Hospital Request Trading Stamps

At the first meeting of the Executive Board of the Washenaw County Hospital for the year 1962 a plan was adopted for obtaining a station wagon for the use of the Auxiliary in their work for the patients.

Mrs. Clara M. Huston, Vice President, reports: "The need for an Auxiliary station wagon has been tugging for the attention of the Board for some time. If one were available many patients could come back to work in the shops, a thing they are eager to do. Rides for patients could be arranged, and when the shops have a sale the supplies could be easily handled, and many errands could be done. The car also could be used for some of the longer trips our members make in calling on patients in boarding homes. Are you a little stumped by this? Well—if 1000 filled Savings Stamp Books, ANY KIND, were sent to the Hospital by mail or left at the office, we could have a fine Station Wagon! Wouldn't this be wonderful? Will you help?"

Superintendent Reynolds reported on many changes in prospect. Pending the erection of a new building within the next two years—only the most necessary alteration will be made in the present building, including an addition to the kitchen area, a partition in the dining room so that both patients and staff may use this large area, releasing the present staff dining room for four more beds for patients.

There are two new registered nurses working at the hospital, and there will be a pharmacy with a part-time pharmacist, as the law requires.

### From the Bookshelf

One of the newest books purchased by our Manchester Township Library is John Hughes' THE NEW FACE OF AFRICA SOUTH OF THE SAHARA. Mr. Hughes, African correspondent for the Christian Science Monitor, presents a first-hand, exciting account of the explosion that is sweeping the continent of Africa south of the Sahara. His objective, informed account is a remarkable expression of the atmosphere, spirit and significance of the African revolutions and the Africa with which we are living.

Some of the many other books found in the library's permanent collection are:

THE CHILD BUYER by John Hersey - a novel in the form of Hearings before the Standing Committee on Education, Welfare and Public Morality of an unnamed State Senate. A biting commentary on some aspects of American education.

LETTERS HOME by R. E. Bidlack - the true story, documented by a collection of letters, of the participation of Ann Arbor area residents in the California Gold Rush of 1849.

MINE EYES HAVE SEEN THE GLORY by L. M. Blackford - the story of a courageous Virginia woman who taught her sons to hate slavery and to love the Union.

ZEN SHOWED ME THE WAY by Sessie Hayakawa - an exciting absorbing book in which the author tells how he has found the way to the great wisdom and deep philosophy of Zen.

ELECTRONICS FOR YOUNG PEOPLE by Jeanne Benedick, a clear accounting of the latest techniques, equipment, and developments in electronics; this fourth edition retains the material on basic principles which has made this book a leader in its field.

THE STORY OF GEOLOGY by Jerome Wyckoff - from the Golden Book series - the pictorial history of our changing earth through the ages.

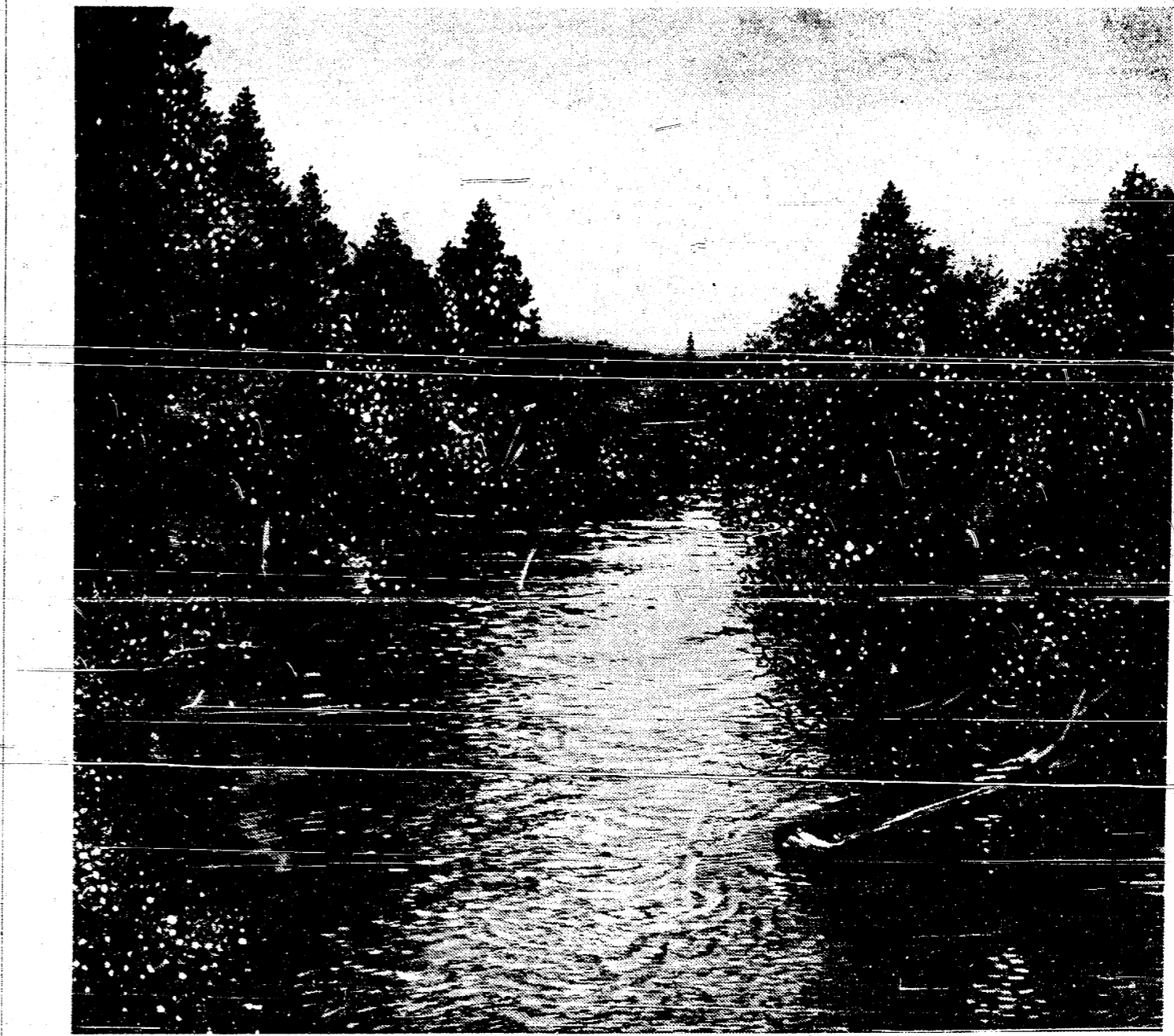

**BEST LITTER OF PIGS** result from improved breeding. Use of premium quality boars has guaranteed some hog men to realize \$1.00 to \$2 more profit per hog marketed. Most breeders now provide production information, established through testing stations, on boars offered for sale. If records of one boar show he has produced 100 pounds of gain on 30 pounds less feed than another boar, the improvement transmitted to offspring, can be worth about \$2 on every litter produced.

**PLAN A SIMPLE FORAGE SEEDING MIXTURE.** It's usually best to limit mixtures to one or two legumes and one or two grasses. By limiting the number of species in the mix, you're more likely to include the better adapted ones. Another problem of including too many species is that maturities may vary. Where one species may be just right for harvest, the others may be too mature or not mature enough.

**A LAYER WON'T PRODUCE LIKE A PULLETT forever.** It's best to replace old hens after about 14 months of lay with new pullets. After 14 months of production old hens will lay about 25% to 30% less than during their first year. Besides, they may set up to 1 1/2 pounds more feed to produce a dozen eggs and mortality usually increases. Hens that drop below a 1 1/2% rate of lay will barely cover their keep.

**INCREASE LIFE OF YOUR MILK HOSES AND INFLATORS** by alternating their use each week. Think about owning two sets. The week you are using one set, you can soak the other set in a 4% lye solution. Replace any indications having cracks or roughness - it will be cheaper in the long run.

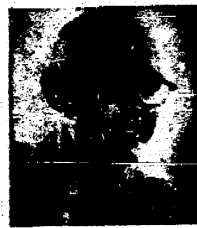

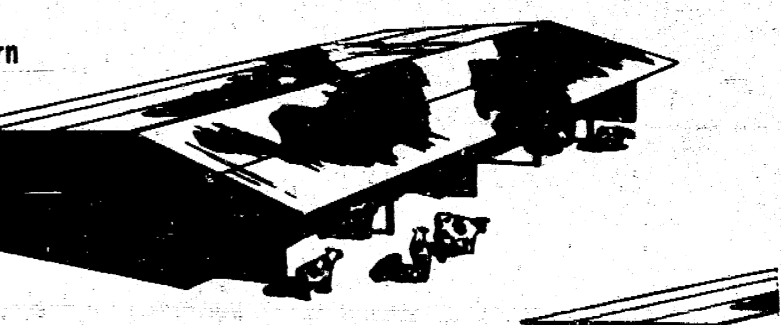
