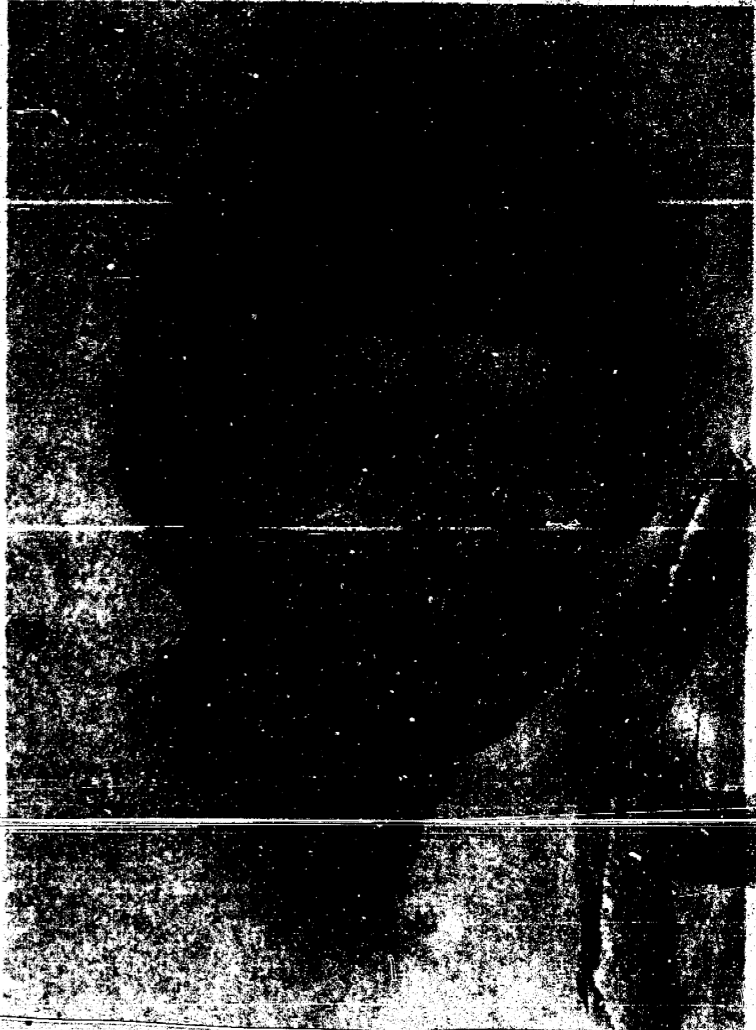

Eligible for Scholarship



Susan Carol Schied is a winner from Manchester High School, in the 1962 Betty Crocker Search for the American Homemaker of Tomorrow, thus becoming eligible for one of 102 scholarships which total to \$110,000.

Having received the highest score in her school in the knowledge and attitude test on homemaking given senior girls Dec. 5, the winner now will have her paper entered in competition with those of winners in other high schools of the state for state honors.

The State Homemaker of Tomorrow to be named in the spring, will receive a \$1,500 scholarship from General Mills, sponsor of the program. A \$500 award will go to the second highest ranking state Homemaker of Tomorrow.

Later, State Homemakers of Tomorrow with their advisors will enjoy an expensepaid educational tour of New York City, Washington, D.C., and Colonial Williamsburg, Va., to culminate with the naming of the 1962 All-American Homemaker of Tomorrow May 3rd at a banquet in Williamsburg.

The national winner's scholarship will be increased to \$5,000 with second, third and fourth place winners receiving \$4,000, \$3,000 and \$2,000 scholarships, respectively.

The homemaking test, prepared and scored by Science Research Associates, Chicago, provides the basis for selection of local and state Homemakers of Tomorrow, with personal observation and interviews as added factors in national judging.

The 1962 Betty Crocker Search reached another all-time high in enrollment, with 406,132 girls in 12,874 schools participating. In the eight years since the program started, more than two and a half million girls have enrolled, and, including this year, scholarship awards will total more than three quarters of a million dollars.

Voters to Decide Liquor By-the-Glass Issue

Voters here will be asked to decide whether liquor should be sold by the glass in Manchester at the same time they cast their ballots for village officers on March 12.

Marx has certified that a petition circulated by Mrs. Ada H. Shannon and Fred Rumler, co-owners of the Rumler and Sharron Tavern, bore an adequate number of signatures of qualified electors to place the issue on the ballot.

The petition, filed with the clerk in January, bore 105 signatures. The law requires signatures of 35 percent of the number who voted for all candidates for the office of village president in the last election, to place a question on the ballot by petition. The liquor-by-the-glass petition would therefore have had to have been signed by at least 94 electors.

The by-glass liquor issue was defeated in a Manchester township election last fall, and it was defeated in a village election about 12 years ago.

Also on March 12 ballots will be candidates for the offices of village president, clerk and assessor and for three Village Council seats.

Marx said the candidates will be chosen by party caucuses, probably on Feb. 19th.

The Progressive Party and the Citizens' Party are expected to offer a full slate of candidates.

Manchester would be eligible for one liquor-by-the-glass license if the ballot proposition is approved by the voters.

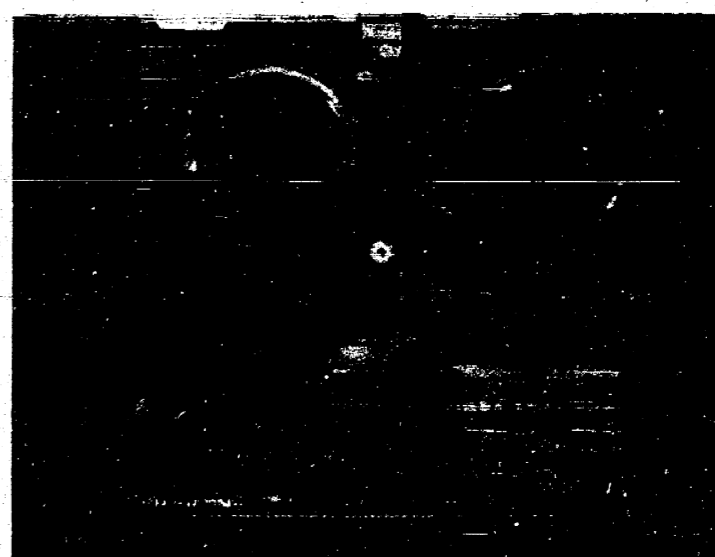

Methodist Churches to Launch A \$3,000,000 Fund Campaign

A \$3,000,000 Capital Funds Campaign to provide financial assistance for urgent church extension and pressing higher education needs will be conducted by the Methodist churches of Michigan, February 25 - March 18, it was announced by Bishop Marshall R. Reed, resident bishop of the Michigan area.

Two million dollars of the overall goal, according to Bishop Reed, will be used to help finance building programs for 60 Michigan communities requiring new churches and 132 present congregations in need of enlarged facilities.

Albion and Adrian Colleges will receive equal \$400,000 shares of the \$1,000,000 in funds earmarked for higher education. By agreement with the churches, earnings on the gifts will be used for scholarship purposes to help meet the increasing need for student financial assistance. The remaining \$200,000 will be dedicated to the building program of Garrett Theological Seminary in Evanston, Illinois.

On February 18 ministers of both the Detroit and Michigan Conferences will participate in a state-wide exchange of pulpits with sermons devoted to the importance of the Methodist colleges and Church Extension Campaign.

The Manchester Methodist Church has by vote of the Official Board placed their apportionment of this campaign in their budget and will raise their part by the month, the pastor, Rev. Jesse D. Epps, said.
