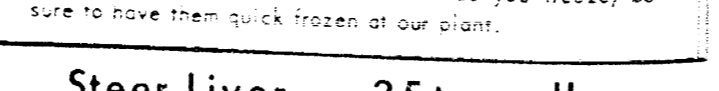
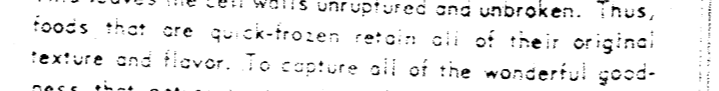

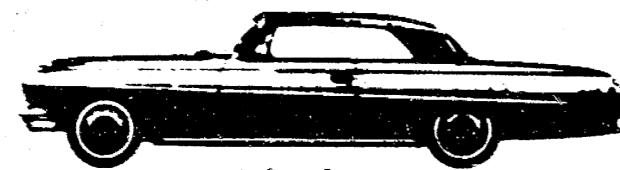

Problem Clinic Date Has Been Set

The 1962 P.T.A. Problem Clinic, sponsored by the Michigan Congress of Parents and Teachers and Michigan State University's Continuing Education Service, has been set for March 20 in the Kellogg Center for Continuing Education at Michigan State University, East Lansing. Dr. William E. Durr, Associate Professor at M.S.U. who is chairman of the Problem Clinic Committee, says the meeting will begin at 9:30 a.m. and end at 4 p.m. Participants will be registered between 8 and 9:30 a.m.

Local parent teacher Association members from over the state will have 18 clinic topics to choose from and the program is designed so each person can attend two discussion sessions. The topics represent a wide range of subject, including: Colleges for Tomorrow's graduates, Evaluation and Parent-teachers conferences, guidance services, planning P.T.A. programs, problems of adolescents and danger signals for parents and the effect of television on children.

Dr. Durr urges local Parent Teacher Associations to send at least one representative to this important annual clinic.

Federal Crop Insurance Expands Operation

The Federal Crop Insurance Corporation announced today that its operation is being expanded to offer all-risk crop protection to Washtenaw County farmers. Corn, soybeans, and wheat will be insured. The protection will start with 1962 on spring crops, and in 1963 on wheat.

Earl Wilson, State Director, stated that the Corporation has been in operation in the nation for two years and that the policy is presently being offered in twenty counties in Michigan. The Corporation is an agency of the United States Department of Agriculture. It offers protection to farmers on a non-profit basis. Protection is provided on the crop investment from planting through to harvest. The causes of loss insured against are excessive rain, flood, drought, frost, freeze, hail, insect infestation, plant disease, wildfire, lightning, fire, snow, hurricane, tornado, earthquake, and any other unavoidable cause of loss due to adverse weather conditions. In its 1960 Annual Report to Congress, the Corporation shows \$450,000,000 paid in indemnities resulting from over 100 different causes of loss.

The policy operates on the bases of a bushel guarantee determined by the past yield records for the county for each crop. The individual can select the amount of dollar-protection he desires. The selection figures on corn and soybeans are on an acre basis as follows: corn \$25.00, \$30.00, \$35.00, \$40.00, \$45.00, soybeans \$15.00, \$20.00, \$25.00, \$30.00. If a farmer produces 60% of his guarantee, his indemnity would be 40% of the dollar amount of protection he selected. The

selection on wheat is on a price per bushel basis of \$1.50, \$2.00, or \$2.50. The individual selects the amount per bushel he wishes to be paid when a loss occurs. If the production is 100 bushels less than the guarantee, and the farmer selected \$2.50, his indemnity would be \$250.00.

The policy contains a provision which takes into account poor-quality grain. If the production is poor quality, the amount which will be counted against the guarantee is reduced by relating the price received at the local market to the price of good grain. For instance, if the market price for good corn was \$1.00 per bushel, and the poor quality corn was valued at 50¢ per bushel, the production to be counted would be reduced by 1/2. Any grain which will not meet government loan standards is considered as poor quality.

A good experience discount of 5% starts after three years without a loss and increases 5% each year thereafter up to 25% after seven years. The insured can elect the crop he wants to insure. One, two, or all three of the crops may be insured under one policy. The policy is available to both land owners and renters, and each can insure his interest in the crop independently of the other.

Harold Willis, District Director, stated that the response to date is encouraging, and that many farmers will take advantage of the opportunity to help guarantee their security in farming. Future Role of Dairy Cooperatives

The most important future role of cooperatives will be to develop and guide programs on a regional or national basis which will improve prices and income received by producers. Cooperatives must reflect local market sentiment and contribute to shaping broader programs through recognizing the interdependence of markets. Milk producers are currently bargaining for higher prices in 28 out of the 82 federal order markets. Dairy men must rely on greater cooperative growth and strength for increased marketing power in the future. In spite of the consolidation activity among dairy cooperatives, non-cooperative dairy firms have tended to grow faster than cooperative firms.

Cooperatives must be able to control their supply better if they wish to bargain for higher prices. Production and utilization must be maintained and new sources of milk must not be attracted to the market, if higher blend prices are to result when new class 1 prices are negotiated.

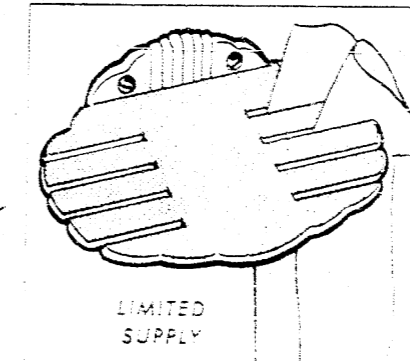

Immunization Clinic Scheduled

Dr. Scott Harris, President of the Washtenaw County Medical Society, announced today that booster immunizations against polio and smallpox will be offered without charge to students in the Junior High Schools of the county during the month of March. In those school systems which do not have separate Junior High School buildings, the immunizations will be offered to students in Grade 9 and 10.

The schedule for the clinics is Manchester Junior High, March 20th. Students eligible for this program will be given request slips to be filled out and signed by parents and returned to the school prior to the date of the clinic.

The school clinics will offer smallpox vaccinations and/or polio injections to children in the grades specified who have not had either of these injections within the past four years or longer.

No diphtheria-tetanus boosters will be offered at these clinics this year.

The major reason for the changes in the immunization program is that there has been excellent immunization of entering school children prior to enrollment in Kindergarten. This has made the previous practice of including Kindergarten or First Grade children in the booster Clinics unnecessary.

Polio vaccine for the booster clinics is being made available through the Michigan Department of Health.

These annual booster clinics, now in their 22nd year, are made possible through cooperative efforts of members of the County Medical Society who volunteer their time, the schools, lay volunteers from the community and the personnel of the Washtenaw County Health Department.

Book Exchange Day March 8th

March 8th is Book Exchange Day for the Washtenaw Area State Library Book-Loan Project. One third of the books loaned to each participating library for the year 1961-62 will be exchanged at this time with the other libraries in the area.

At Manchester Township Library, this will mean that about 90 books new to our library will be ready for circulation next week. The Book-Loan Project is free service from the State Library involving 3000 books which were loaned to the Washtenaw area last June. The local library may also send to the State Library for special requests for readers in the area.
