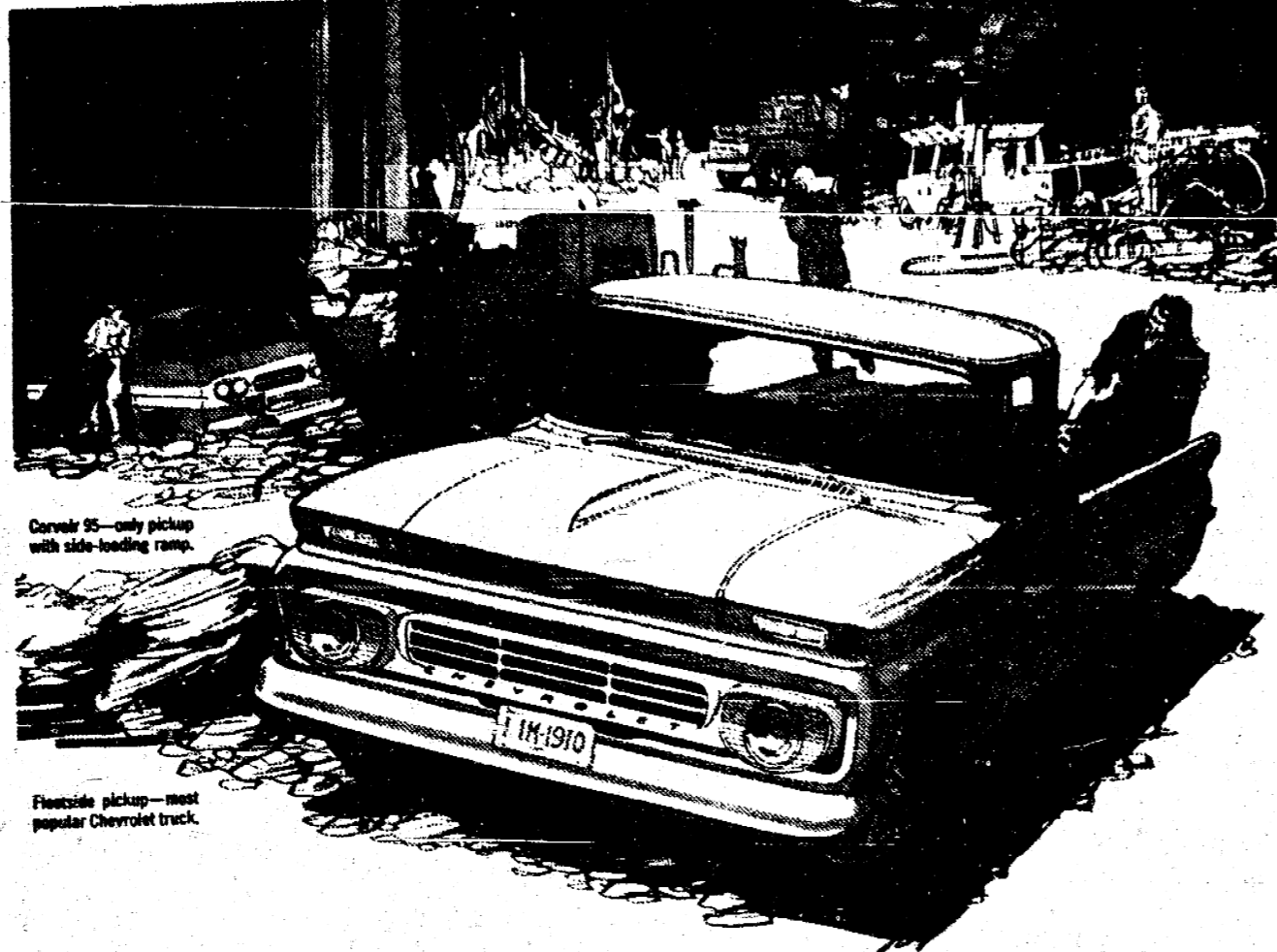

Child Molesting On Increase

Since child molestation complaints increase at this time of year, parents should strongly warn their children against accepting lures of strangers to go for walks or rides, says Sgt. Carl Anderson, commanding officer of the Clinton post of the Michigan State Police.
This cautionary advice, given now and occasionally repeated, might prevent some child from suffering an experience which could blight his or her life. Children should be assured that policemen are friends who want to help and protect them. They should be encouraged to notify police of any strangers loitering around playgrounds, schools, public rest rooms or in the neighborhood.
Following are suggested rules for children:
1. Don't talk to strangers or accept any offer of money, candy or gifts to go for a walk or ride with them.
2. Report to your parents, police or teacher any suspicious stranger who tries to join you or your group.
3. Stay with playmates when outdoors. Don't play or walk alone in alleys, deserted buildings or other secluded areas.
4. Don't go along to the movies, fairs or carnivals. Try to have at least one companion wherever you go.
5. Keep a safe distance from the road so that a stranger in a passing car cannot easily reach out and seize you.
6. Don't loiter in public rest rooms. These are danger spots.
7. These rules are for your protection. Don't let anyone persuade you to disobey them. If you have any question or problem, tell your parents.

Premeasurement Services

Celebrates Fortieth Anniversary

The Reverend and Mrs. Jesse D. Epps celebrated their fortieth anniversary in the Methodist ministry Sunday, April 8th, with a special message in the morning service and the church sponsored an open house in the afternoon.

Mr. Epps took for his morning message, "Forty Years in The Ministry". Highlights from his forty years were presented in compact style in the forty-minute message he brought. Most of the time was spent pointing out the struggles of their early ministry; how he and Mrs. Epps were converted on Feb. 15, 1922 and he began his ministry by preaching his first sermon on April 9th, following to the church he served for one year. Mr. Epps presented the folded paper on which he had written his first sermon notes now yellowed with age. Also, he told how he was challenged to give up the use of tobacco, his struggles in getting his education—high school which he began at the age of 26, his college and seminary training while serving churches at the same time.

Also it was pointed out in his morning address that he had spent considerable time in going through the annual minutes of the conference where he had served to discover the statistical results of his forty years of service. The minutes showed that he had baptized 584 infants, 338 youth and adults, received 635 by confession of faith and 224 by transfer. Palm Sunday he will receive 17 into



the church which will bring the total to 876, or an average of 22 persons per year for the 40 years.

The afternoon celebration from 2 to 5:00 was in charge of the Pastoral Relations Committee with Mr. Robert Looney as Chairman. Others on the committee were Mr. Charles Gauss, Mr. John Pippinger, Mrs. Hollis

A four tier anniversary cake was served with other delicious cakes from several of the ladies of the church, coffee and punch to nearly 200 guests. 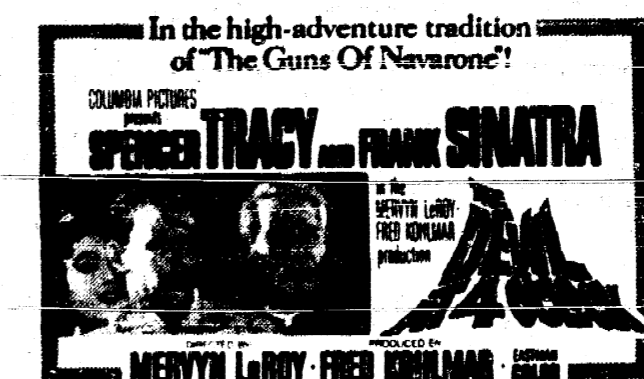

Medical Doctors' Share is Less Than in 1941

Doctors as a profession today receive 15.66% less of each dollar spent for health care than they did 25 years ago.

Government studies made by the United States Department of Commerce and the Federal Reserve Board show that the medical profession today receives 15 cents of each dollar spent for professional services and for care of his patient.

Twenty years ago, the share received by the doctor of medicine of each dollar spent was 30 cents.

This is a 15.66% decrease based upon dollar for dollar spent, not upon the difference in the value of a dollar today as compared to 25 years ago.

While the share of the health dollar is changing, it is important to note that the percentage of the gross national product spent on health care has remained relatively unchanged.

Medical Doctors' Share is Less Than in 1941

Doctors as a profession today receive 15.66% less of each dollar spent for health care than they did 25 years ago.

Government studies made by the United States Department of Commerce and the Federal Reserve Board show that the medical profession today receives 15 cents of each dollar spent for professional services and for care of his patient.

Twenty years ago, the share received by the doctor of medicine of each dollar spent was 30 cents.

This is a 15.66% decrease based upon dollar for dollar spent, not upon the difference in the value of a dollar today as compared to 25 years ago.
