The Four-tune Tellers entertained with several comedy skits and songs.

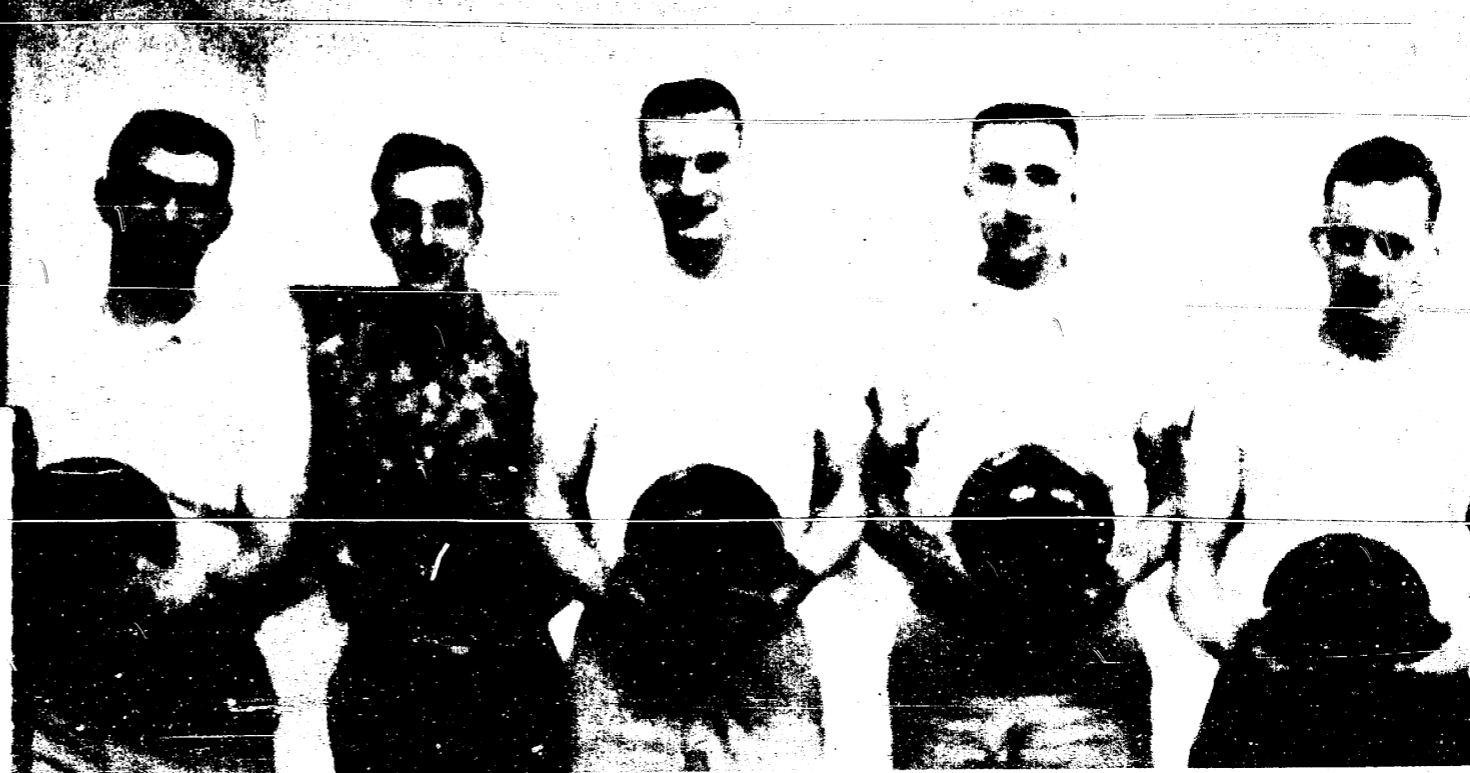

This program is available as of this time.

SPECIAL SECTION: Register for School Election May 14th

If you are not a registered voter for National, State and township elections you are eligible to vote in the school elections. To be eligible to vote, you must be 21 years of age, a resident of Michigan for six months and resident of the school district for thirty days. YOU DO NOT REGISTER AT SCHOOL, but register with the Township Clerk in the township in which you reside. If you have moved since the last election to a different township, you must register. The final time for registration to vote in the school election is 5:00 p.m., May 14th.

School Board Request Renewal of 4 Mill Tax

In the past, your board of education will request a one mill special operating tax to maintain an adequate school program. The request for millage will be the same as last year. This being four mills on an equalized valuation. Only 175 mills was spread last year as there was one fourth of a mill allocated that was not anticipated when the election was held. This year's budget is again a strong attempt to hold the line on taxation and still operate a satisfactory educational program for the areas children.

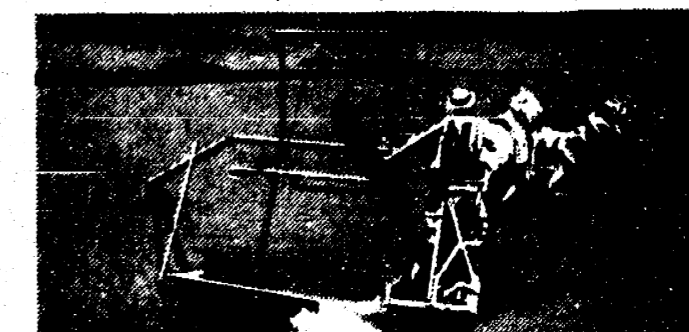

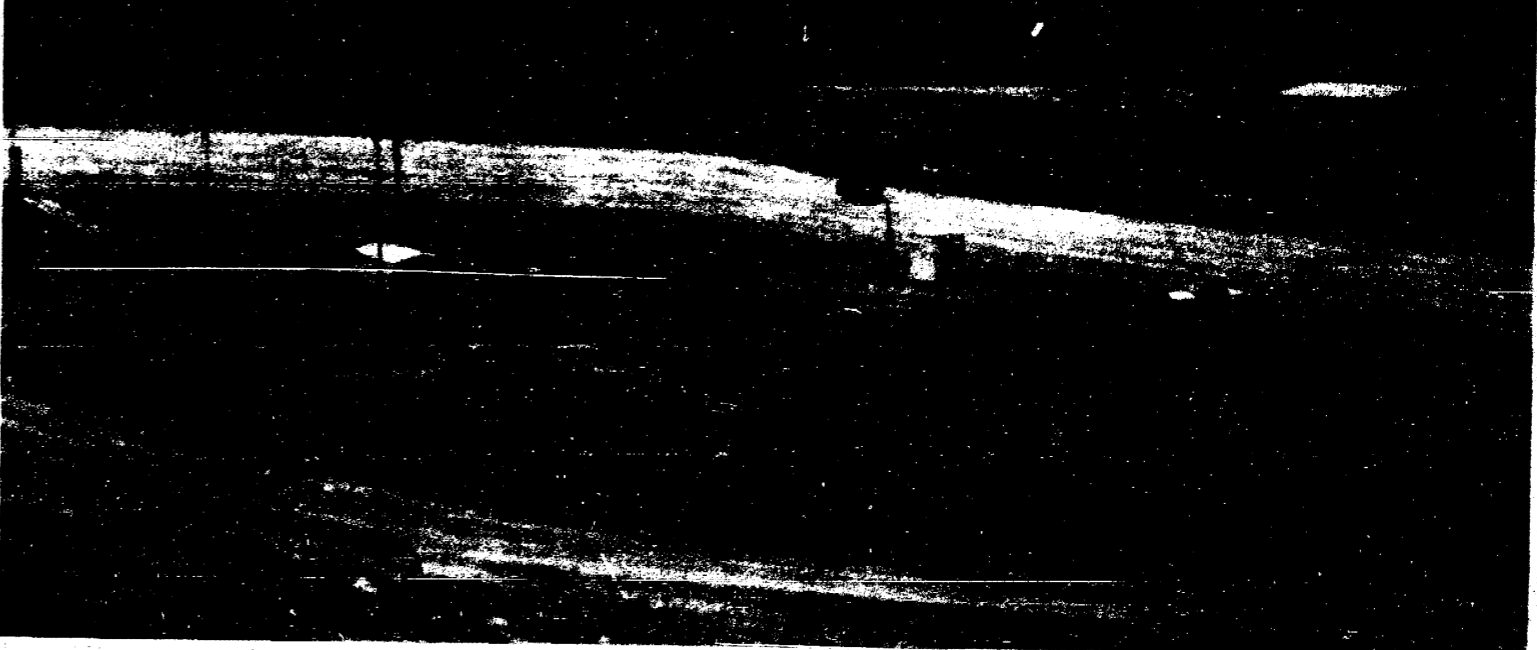
