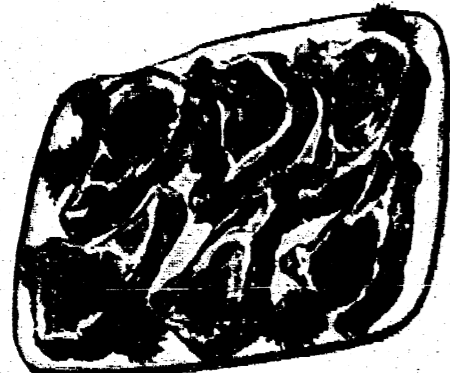

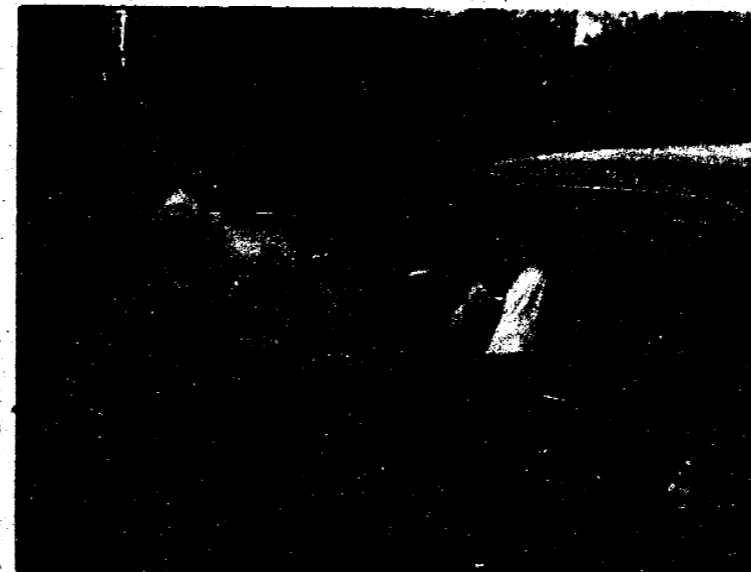

stopping other destructive influences of unregulated water runoff attended the 9th National Watershed Congress May 7-9 in Columbus, Ohio.

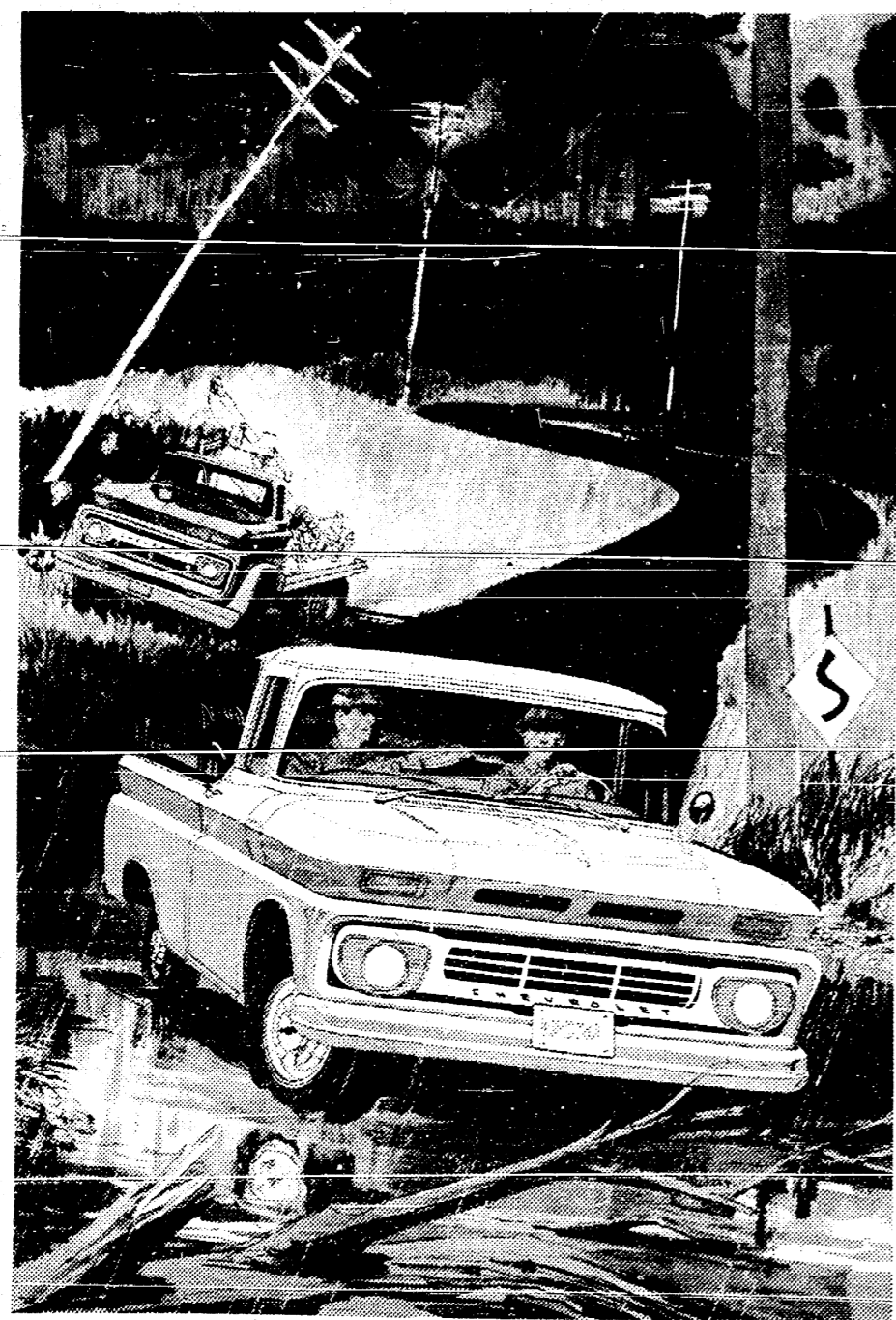

Outline of Tentative School Budget

The preliminary budget for operation of the local schools is developed early in the spring of each year for the following school year. At this time many factors are not known that are needed before the document is made final.

The largest portion of the budget is salaries which constitute 80% of the expenditure. Salaries of all personnel presently employed are applied to salary schedule for an accurate estimate. Another 10% is used in fixed charges, such as lights, heat, water, insurance and transportation. This leaves approximately 10% for maintenance, capital outlay, supplies and the purchase of new equipment.

The following is a breakdown of the anticipated expenditures for this next year. ADMINISTRATION, salaries of superintendent and secretaries, school audit, legal counsel, elections, census takers and new accounting forms for new state accounting system.

21,057.00 INSTRUCTION, teachers and principals salaries, textbooks, library books, teaching supplies, expenses and secretarial help. 290,350.00

OPERATION, custodians salaries, fuel, water, electricity, telephone and janitorial supplies. 46,450.00

MAINTENANCE, all painting, repairing and general upkeep of grounds, buildings and equipment. 5,050.00

FIXED CHARGES, all insurance and interest paid for short term loans 4,833.00

AUXILIARY SERVICES, bus drivers salaries and expenses, maintenance of busses, insurance on busses, tires, leased transportation and interest on bus loans. 28,925.00

CAPITAL OUTLAY, new school busses and all new equipment 15,000.00

Total 1962-63 Budget 411,665.00

Anticipated receipts for 1962-1963:

The anticipated valuation of the district is 15,800,000.00

The anticipated share of the 15 mills is 9 mills

Allocated local taxes 142,200.00

All State Aid 196,000.00

Money from County Special Education 5,400.00

Other miscellaneous receipts 7,000.00

Total 350,600.00

The preliminary budget with all available receipts indicate a deficit figure of \$61,000.00.

The board will request a renewal of the 4 mill special operating levy at the June 11th election. The re-approval of the special operating tax will approximately balance the budget if the state and county finances are not reduced below the present year.
