HOW MUCH SHOULD YOU PAY for a beef buil? When getting a purebred buil to go on a commercial herd stay within 3 to 6 times the value of an average cow in your herd. If a buil is worth less than 3 times the value of the average cow, he isn't good enough to ungrade your herd. If the price is more than 6 times the value of the

average cow, then he probably can't improve the herd enough to justiff KEEP YOUR FARM FREE OF RATS. This pest not only causes heavy losses of stored feeds and grain, but also spreads disease among livestock. One disease carned by rate is atropaic rhimitis in hogs. Usually not fatal, this disease lowers the hogs' resistance and make them more suscepitable to other diseases. A good home-made bait can be made by mixing 85% cracked corn and 5% saind oil with sugar and Warfarin.


