





GIVE YOUR SON A CHANCE to help you with management decisions. You may be surprised at some of the new ideas he may have that can be a real help. He's probably given lots of thaught to wave of making lobe arrive. nonal agriculture courses, he is familiar with the latest farming mathods. Although you may take for granted that your son will remain on the farm, he may look in other directions unless you show confidence in him and give him some responsibility.

ELECTRIC MOTORS need regular inspections. If a motor doesn't look, sound or smell just right don't delay investigating. Look for dirt, dust, lint, moisture, vibration, overheating and sparking. Merely taking the motor apart, cleaning it and putiting it back together will generally eliminate the trouble. Once you've learned to do this you can keep your motors in top shape. Then you'll need only to take them to the shop when major repairs such as rewinding, repairing commutators or replacing worn parts are needed.


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
