Registration Set

Next week Thursday, August 23, all those Junior High students who cannot register for their classes the week prior to the opening of school must register with Mrs. Celestia Ingraham at the Junior High office. Others should register according to the following:

Monday, Aug. 27 the seventh grade, last name A through L will register from 8:30 to 11:30 a.m. and M through Z will register from 1 p.m. to 4:30 p.m.

Wednesday, August 29 all who could not come according to schedule will register. Those students who intend to sign up for Junior High band and orchestra will be required to pay a semester's instrument fee in advance. This can be done at the time of registration before the opening of the regular school session.

Regarding the junior high curriculum, parents and students will be accommodated on the days of announced registration on the first come first served basis. School officials ask that students come at the designated published time. It will be less time consuming for the students and will help to have school run smoothly. Fees may be paid at the time of registration.

These fees do not cover the cost of a lock for physical education class. Eighth graders probably have their lock from last year, which may again be used, but seventh graders will have to purchase a lock. Only those locks sold by the school are authorized for use in physical education. Classes that use a weekly reader will be asked to bring money for this, too.

A list of those students who qualify to belong to the Junior High Chorus will be posted at the time of registration. To some extent this will determine a student's daily work.

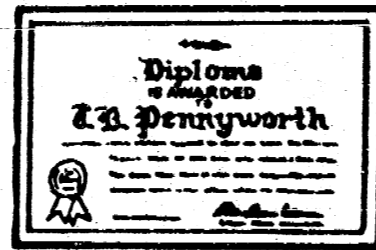

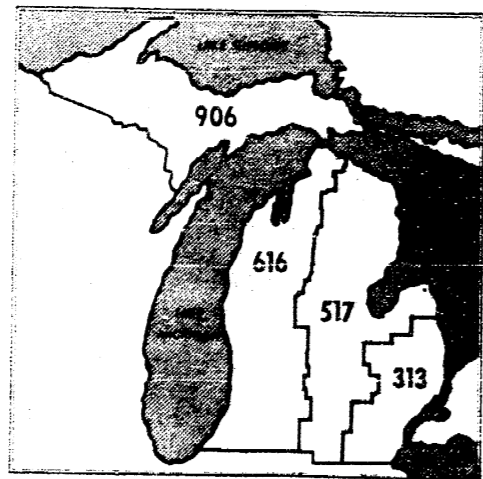

Something you should think about if you're about to buy a truck:

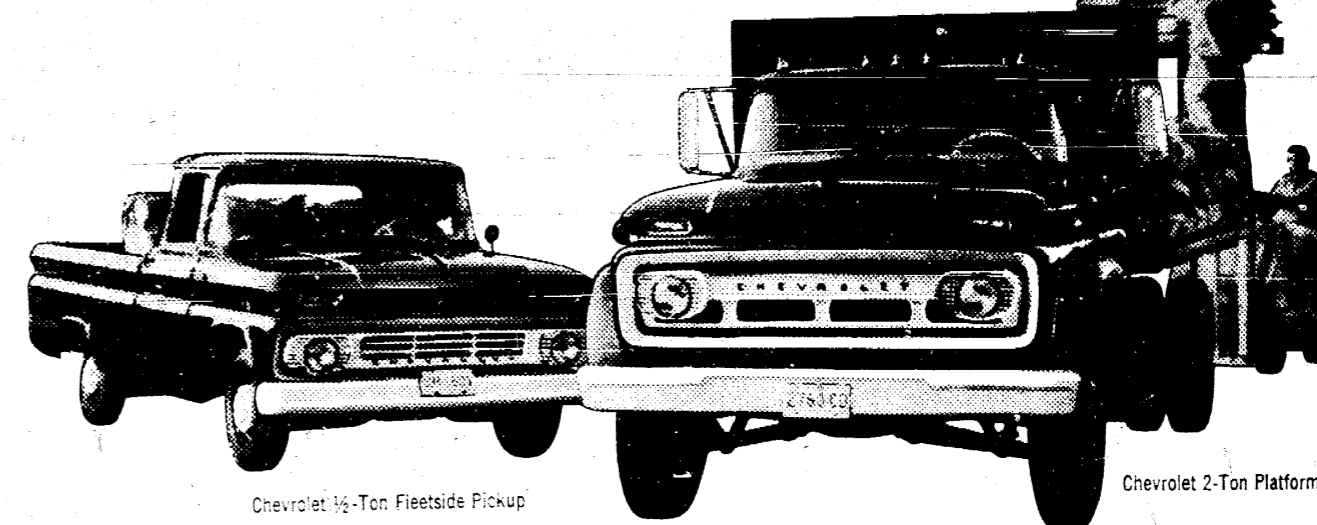
If all trucks were built the same way, cost the same to keep up, were worth the same at trade-in... then probably the price tag would be your only concern. It can't be, of course, because some trucks have more quality than others. And marks of quality are the real keys to low cost. Chevrolet trucks, for example, have double-wall construction, which gives bodies and cabs more strength. Cabs are insulated against heat, cold and noise. A big part of road shock, which shortens truck life, is damped out by Chevrolet's suspension system; it also makes riding in the truck a pleasure. Pickup bodies and cabs are separated to eliminate stress between them.

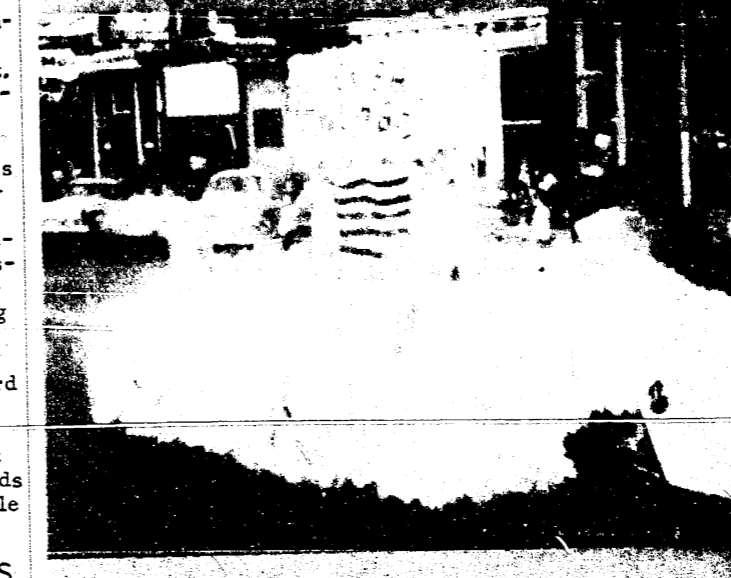

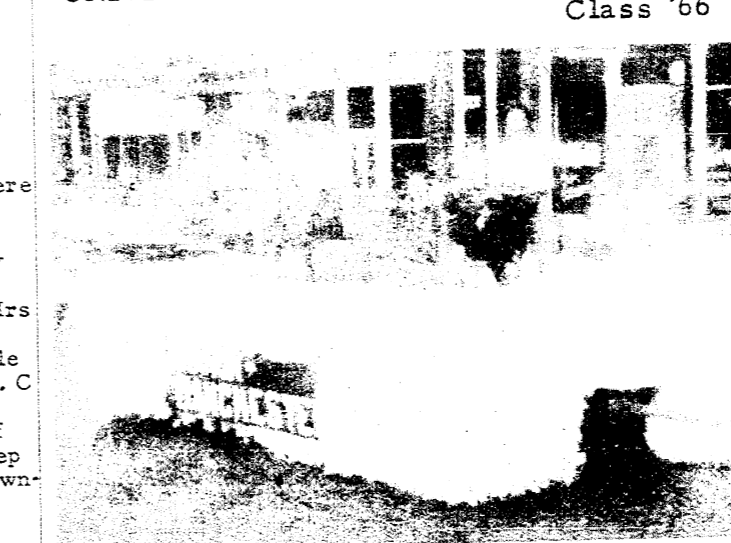
