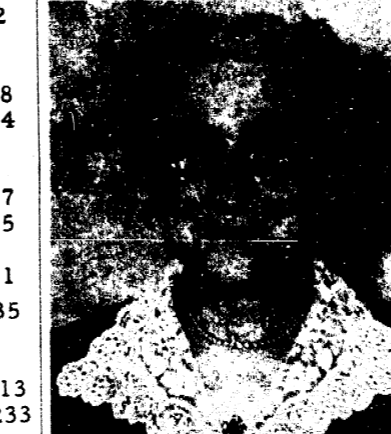

### Celebrates 90th Birthday

A former Manchester resident, Mrs. Elizabeth Ahrens will celebrate her 90th birthday, Sunday, Nov. 11. She was the fourth of six children of Sabastian and Helen Diebold in Sharon township. Her one living sister is Mrs. Francis Houck of Norvell, who will be 95 on December 28.

In her early years she worked for Dr. Kotts, a dentist in Manchester and attended the Manchester Methodist church. November 15 she married Henry Ahrens of Norvell township. They had four children, Harvey of Wayne; Homer of Ft. Charlotte, Fla. Archie of Jackson and Mrs. William (Junaita) Pierce of Manchester; seven grand children; and fourteen great-grandchildren.

Mrs. Ahrens will be remembered for her kindness to people of the community. Whenever illness or tragedy struck Mrs. Ahrens was always on hand to help in any way she could. She was good as a practical nurse but had no formal training.

One time a child was very badly burned in a house fire and there was no one able to help the doctor--except Mrs. Ahrens. Although she had never taken care of that type of injury, under the direction of the doctor, they managed to save the child's life. The child's mother was nearly blind and could not be of any help in caring for it. She remembers that sometimes people were very grateful for what she did and sometimes they didn't say "thanks". But that didn't matter and the next time trouble struck Mrs. Ahrens was ready to do what she could.

She never shirked hard work. She enjoyed it and found satisfaction in a job well done. She liked to bake. Before there was a bakery in town she baked for the village--took orders and baked bread at home. She recalls of having to be called out of bed to sell her last loaf of bread on several occasions and finding herself getting up extra early to make biscuits for her own family.

### Red Cross To Recruit Volunteers

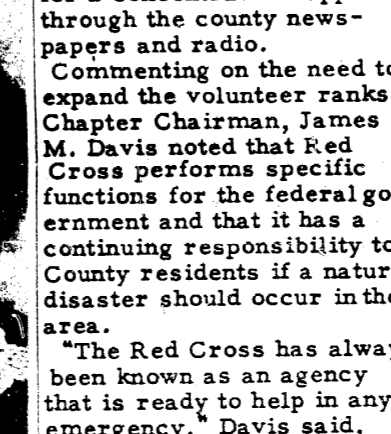
The Washtenaw County Chapter of the American Red Cross has announced plans for an intensive volunteer recruitment drive during November. A tense international situation, increased numbers of local residents in uniform and an ever expanding population, were given as reasons for the recruitment.

More trained volunteers are needed to work in the Red Cross disaster Preparedness program, to serve as drivers in the Motor Service, and to work in the expanding Blood Program. Preliminary plans for this intensive recruitment were discussed at a meeting of Chapter officials and their Public Information committee. Tentative plans call for a concentration appeal through the county newspapers and radio.

Commenting on the need to expand the volunteer ranks, Chapter Chairman, James M. Davis noted that Red Cross performs specific functions for the federal government and that it has a continuing responsibility to County residents if a natural disaster should occur in the area.

"The Red Cross has always been known as an agency that is ready to help in any emergency," Davis said, "and by expanding the volunteer ranks now, the high degree of readiness can be continued to meet any emergency."

"Good things happen when people give--and people will give when they recognize the need," Davis said. "We'll get new volunteers as if we help them realize the need for their services."

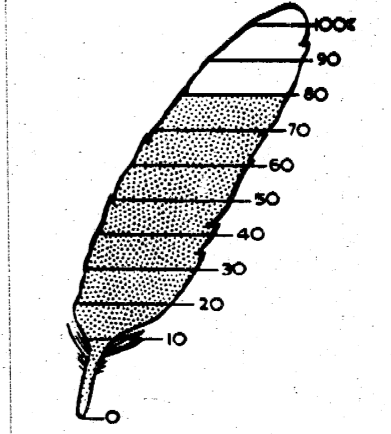



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MANCHESTER ENTERPRISE  
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HAND CAUGHT IN CORN PICKER, FARMER LIVES

A 49-year-old Bridgewater township farmer who possesses what doctors are calling "amazing stamina" last week Wednesday survived a cornpicking accident in which he lost his left hand.

Charles C. Knight of 10291 Willow Road, was alone while operating a tractor which was towing a cornpicker on his farm about 3 p.m. Wednesday.

He reached back to free the stalk stuck in the picker's machinery. With a lurch the machine yanked the stalk backward pulling Knight's left hand into the whirling teeth of the picker.

Unable to free his hand Knight stretched one foot toward the tractor's control panel in front of him. He barely managed to touch with the toe of his shoe the button which shut the tractor off.

His mangled hand remained trapped in the cornpicker. Knight started to shout for help.

The nearest house was more than a half-mile away and the road was almost a far.

Finally at 4:15 p.m.--more than an hour later--David Zick, another farmer living in the area at 10635 Fisk road, Bridgewater township, walked out his front door onto the porch and headed for his tractor. In the distance he heard Knight's faint cries for help.

When he reached Knight he saw he would be unable to free Knight without dismantling the cornpicker. He seized a handful of tools and in minutes had the corn picker disassembled and was lifting Knight's arm from the machinery.

Zick put his arm around Knight and helped him walk the half-mile to the Knight home and Mrs. Knight wrapped heavy bandages around the arm and drove him to the hospital --a distance of 15 miles.

Doctors at St. Joseph hospital amputated Knight's left hand three inches above the wrist.

Surgeons said Knight's good physical condition and stamina may have saved his life. They said apparently the cornpicker machinery caught his forearm in such a manner that arteries were severed and the circulation of blood was cut off. Had this not occurred Knight might have bled to death while waiting for help doctors said.

Knight is recovering at St. Joseph hospital.

**FEWER MICHIGAN APPLES THIS YEAR**

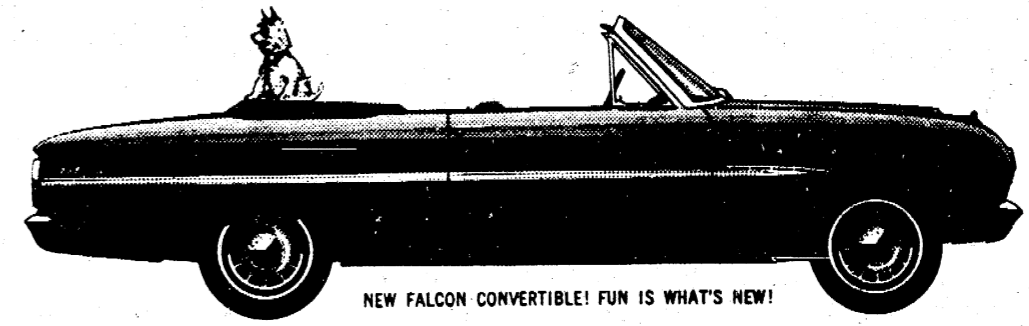
Michigan's agricultural news states that the apple crop is down 25 per cent from a year ago. That means fewer apples are available for canning or frozen apple slices, sauces or juices. And, it means a cut in the fruit farmers' income. Apples bring in \$25 million a year to Michigan growers. The demand for fresh apples is about the same but when the production is down the apples available to processors are down. This year's lower supply has boosted prices to growers by 20 per cent over last year. Sauce manufacturers are paying top prices of \$2.75 per bushel for Northern Spies that are two and one-half inches in diameter or more. Slice manufacturers are paying top prices too.

**SALINE REMOVES PARKING METERS**

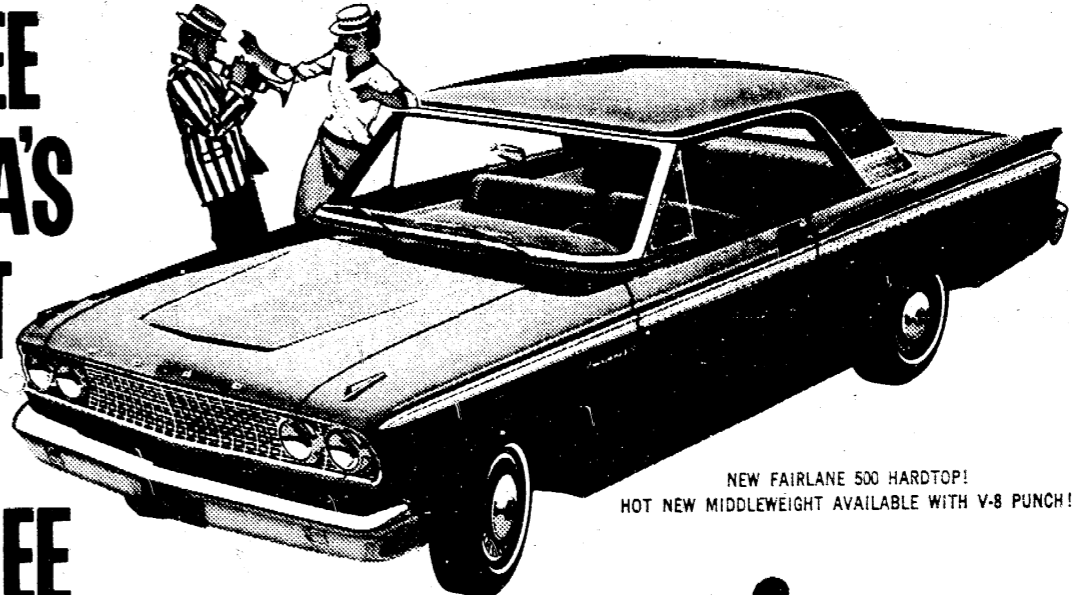

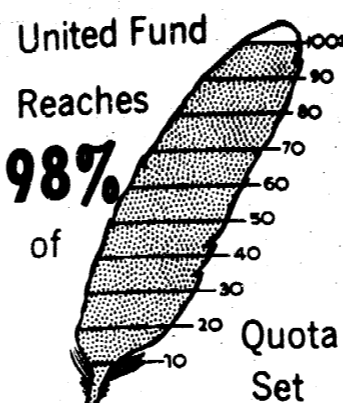

Mission Starts Sunday

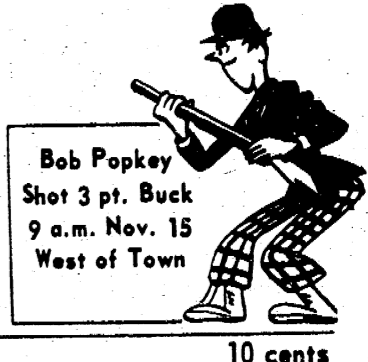

Bus Accident Children Escape Serious Injury

Deputies Fitzgerald and Stander of the Washtenaw County Sheriff's department were asked to investigate an accident which involved a Manchester school bus. The Farm Bureau Insurance Co. called the Sheriff's department Thursday, Nov. 8 for an account of the school bus accident which the Insurance Co. said happened Wednesday, Nov. 7. The Sheriff's department had not received a call on the accident nor a report from any of their deputies concerning it. Officers Fitzgerald and Stander were dispatched to investigate. Sheriff's officers stressed the importance of reporting any personal injury accident to the department at once. According to their report, a 1962 Chevrolet school bus, driven by Gary Michael Brokaw of Manchester went out of control when the brakes gave out causing the bus to miss a turn on Smythe road in Sharon township, hit an embankment and ran into a tree. The right front and top of the bus were damaged, the officers said, when they checked it out at the Marshall-Schaible Garage, where it was towed. In the officers' report, one of the students, Paul W. Crech of 7682 M-92 suffered lacerations of the head and a bruised ear. Other students had minor injuries the officers said. The accident happened in the afternoon as the bus driver was taking a bus load of children home after school had dismissed for the day.

Bus Accident Due to Brake Failure

Brake failure has been established as the immediate cause contributing to the bus accident this previous week, according to a report released by the Manchester Schools. The report follows: At this time the reason for the broken brake line on bus No. 5 has not been reported. "Bus No. 5 was a new 1962 bus with less than twenty-five hundred miles recorded at the time of the accident. At the time of the accident there were 26 children on the bus. Most of the children received minor bruises. Those most severely injured were: Paul Crech with a head wound requiring four stitches, his brother William was also treated for severe bruises. Other children requiring doctor's care with severe bruises were Billy Sott and Mary Jane Kruse. "Driver Gary Brokaw reported that when approaching Wingate Road from Smythe Road his brakes failed to operate. Driver Brokaw steered around the corner, side-swiping the high bank on the right. The bus then collided with a tree after making the turn. "A high school student was sent to a nearby house to report the accident while the driver administered first aid to the children. "The bus was extensively damaged on the front right hand corner of the body. "Superintendent Robert Masten, reported that this was the first major accident involving a school bus in Manchester's thirteen year transportation program. "At Monday night's meeting the board heard a full report on the accident. At this meeting they commended driver Brokaw for his alert action in avoiding an otherwise very serious accident." This concludes the school report.

Livestock Destroyed in Fire A fire of undetermined origin leveled two large barns on the Floyd Jacob farm Saturday. Twenty-eight cows and 28 sheep, 1,000 bushels of corn and 10,000 bales of hay and a wagon were also destroyed. The Jacob farm is on Eli Road, Manchester township. Clinton State Police said no one was injured. State Police said the value of the barns was not immediately known but the value of the animals, corn, hay and wagon is estimated at \$12,000. The Clinton and Manchester fire departments battled the blaze. Nothing was saved in either barn. The fire departments were able to keep the fire from spreading to the Jacob house, officers said. The fire was discovered by a neighbor, Roger Brooks.

Fire Levels Barns at Alber Farm

For the second time in 5 days fire leveled barns in the Manchester area. Wednesday at 5:15 p.m. the fire department was called to the Allen Alber farm at 7753 Hasley road, about 6 1/2 miles north of town when neighbors discovered the large barn burning. Dwight Below, Reno Feldkamp and Dorian Hofhansian rushed to the scene and saved the 28 hogs housed in the burning barn. A new stock truck valued at \$6,500, approximately 70 ton of hay and a quantity of corn and wheat were lost along with the 36 x 50 foot barn. The new roof and side of a shed near the barn were burned. The Chelsea fire department was called to aid the local firemen in keeping the fire from spreading to other buildings. None of the family was home at the time. After the children left for school in the morning Mr. and Mrs. Alber left with friends on a hunting trip in northern Michigan, expecting to be gone several days. Other members of the family had not returned when the fire was discovered. Assistant fire chief, James Kensler said the cause of the blaze could not be immediately determined. The department stayed at the scene until 11:30 p.m.
