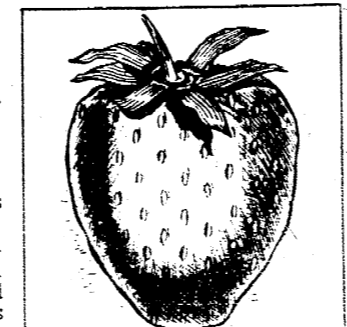

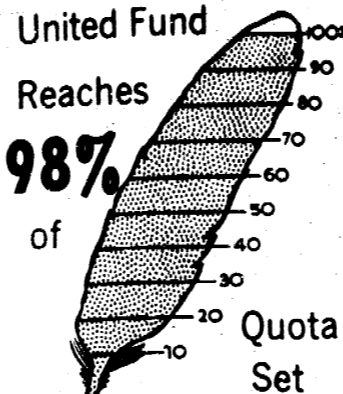

Prepare pudding mix following package directions. Cool. Fold in whipped cream and strawberries. Fill cream puffs with strawberry mixture.



- STRAWBERRY CHEESE TARTS (Makes 8 servings) 1 package (8 ounces) cream cheese, softened 3 tablespoons sugar 3 tablespoons lemon juice 1 pint fresh California strawberries 1/2 cup sugar 8 baked tart shells, 2 1/2 inches in diameter. Best cream cheese, 3 tablespoons sugar and lemon juice until fluffy. Combine strawberries and 1/2 cup sugar; mix until sugar dissolves. Spoon cheese mixture into tart shells; top with sweetened strawberries. Chill. Decorate tarts with whipped cream if desired.

Mr. & Mrs. Fred Grossman to Celebrate 66th Anniversary

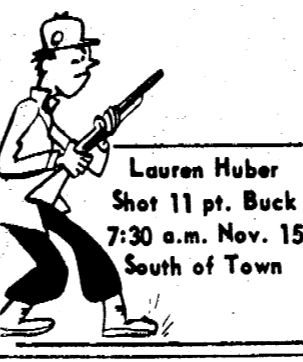

Mission Starts Sunday

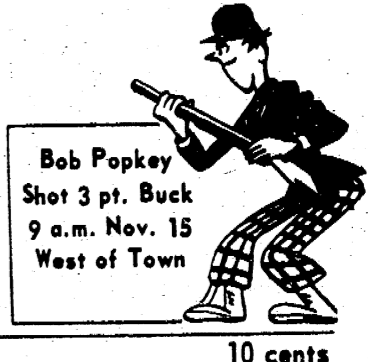

Bus Accident Children Escape Serious Injury

Deputies Fitzgerald and Stander of the Washtenaw County Sheriff's department were asked to investigate an accident which involved a Manchester school bus. The Farm Bureau Insurance Co. called the Sheriff's department Thursday, Nov. 8 for an account of the school bus accident which the Insurance Co. said happened Wednesday, Nov. 7. The Sheriff's department had not received a call on the accident nor a report from any of their deputies concerning it. Officers Fitzgerald and Stander were dispatched to investigate. Sheriff's officers stressed the importance of reporting any personal injury accident to the department at once. According to their report, a 1962 Chevrolet school bus, driven by Gary Michael Brokaw of Manchester went out of control when the brakes gave out causing the bus to miss a turn on Smythe road in Sharon township, hit an embankment and ran into a tree. The right front and top of the bus were damaged, the officers said, when they checked it out at the Marshall-Schaible Garage, where it was towed. In the officers' report, one of the students, Paul W. Crech of 7682 M-92 suffered lacerations of the head and a bruised ear. Other students had minor injuries the officers said. The accident happened in the afternoon as the bus driver was taking a bus load of children home after school had dismissed for the day.

Bus Accident Due to Brake Failure

Brake failure has been established as the immediate cause contributing to the bus accident this previous week, according to a report released by the Manchester Schools. The report follows: At this time the reason for the broken brake line on bus No. 5 has not been reported. "Bus No. 5 was a new 1962 bus with less than twenty-five hundred miles recorded at the time of the accident. At the time of the accident there were 26 children on the bus. Most of the children received minor bruises. Those most severely injured were: Paul Crech with a head wound requiring four stitches, his brother William was also treated for severe bruises. Other children requiring doctor's care with severe bruises were Billy Sott and Mary Jane Kruse. "Driver Gary Brokaw reported that when approaching Wingate Road from Smythe Road his brakes failed to operate. Driver Brokaw steered the uncontrollable bus around the corner, side-swiping the high bank on the right. The bus then collided with a tree after making the turn. "A high school student was sent to a nearby house to report the accident while the driver administered first aid to the children. "The bus was extensively damaged on the front right hand corner of the body. "Superintendent Robert Masten, reported that this was the first major accident involving a school bus in Manchester's thirteen year transportation program. "At Monday night's meeting the board heard a full report on the accident. At this meeting they commended driver Brokaw for his alert action in avoiding an otherwise very serious accident." This concludes the school report.

Livestock Destroyed in Fire

A fire of undetermined origin leveled two large barns on the Floyd Jacob farm Saturday. Twenty-eight cows and 28 sheep, 1,000 bushels of corn and 10,000 bales of hay and a wagon were also destroyed. The Jacob farm is on Eli Road, Manchester township. Clinton State Police said no one was injured. State Police said the value of the barns was not immediately known but the value of the animals, corn, hay and wagon is estimated at \$12,000. The Clinton and Manchester fire departments battled the blaze. Nothing was saved in either barn. The fire departments were able to keep the fire from spreading to the Jacob house, officers said. The fire was discovered by a neighbor, Roger Brooks.

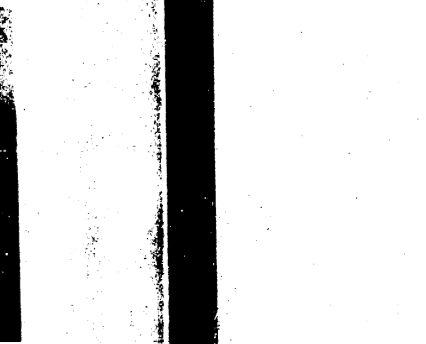

Fire Levels Barns at Alber Farm



For the second time in 5 days fire leveled barns in the Manchester area. Wednesday at 5:15 p.m. the fire department was called to the Allen Alber farm at 7753 Hasley road, about 6 1/2 miles north of town when neighbors discovered the large barn burning. Dwight Below, Reno Feldkamp and Dorian Hofhansian rushed to the scene and saved the 28 hogs housed in the burning barn. A new stock truck valued at \$6,500, approximately 70 ton of hay and a quantity of corn and wheat were lost along with the 36 x 50 foot barn. The new roof and side of a shed near the barn were burned. The Chelsea fire department was called to aid the local firemen in keeping the fire from spreading to other buildings. None of the family was home at the time. After the children left for school in the morning Mr. and Mrs. Alber left with friends on a hunting trip in northern Michigan, expecting to be gone several days. Other members of the family had not returned when the fire was discovered. Assistant fire chief, James Kensler said the cause of the blaze could not be immediately determined. The department stayed at the scene until 11:30 p.m.

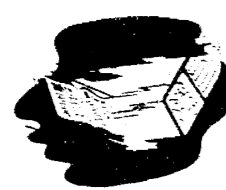


Another member of our fine teaching faculty this year is Mr. Raymond Blossom. Mr. Blossom is married and has four children. He lives at 101 West Main Street.

Flitting down to where she is, He will try to make her his.

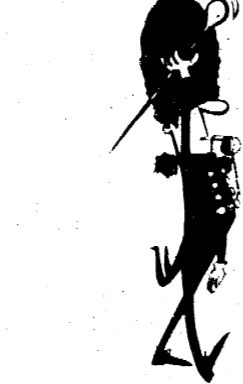
Now I see that in the sky, Flying, swooping, diving, high, Flying low amongst the clouds, The falcon feels so very free.

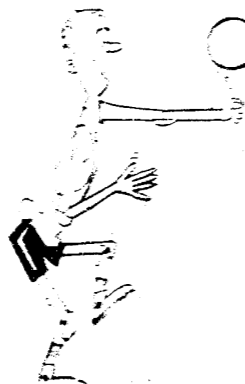

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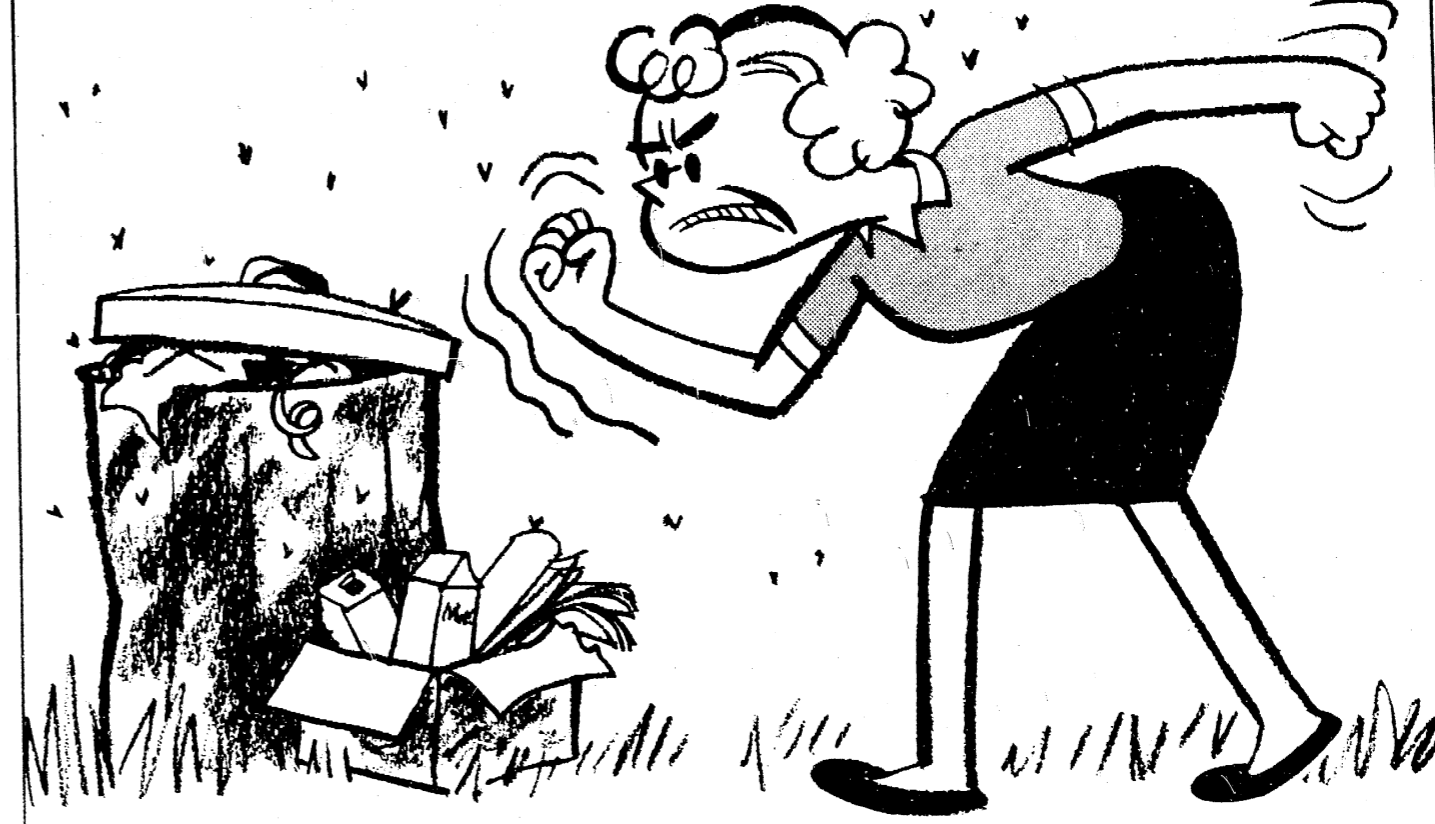

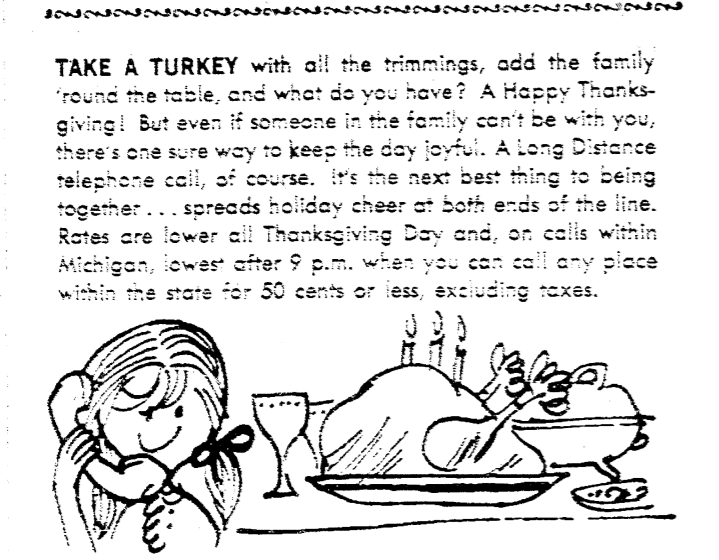

**Red Cross Need Volunteers**

Special emphasis of the Red Cross November recruitment Drive is aimed at building of the corps of trained volunteers in each community who can help in their home community throughout the year and as well as in the case of a natural disaster.

Chapter Chairman James M. Davis pointed out that the activities of the County-wide Red Cross Chapter has expanded so rapidly in the last year because of the pressures of an increasing population, more residents in military service, and the international climate that "gaps have occurred in the ranks of Red Cross volunteers."

More local volunteers are needed to help staff the local blood clinics in the home community and these volunteers are from the various service divisions such as: Staff Aides, who help register donors; Nurses Aides, who help the professional nurses obtain medical history information; Canteen workers, who help serve the coffee and juices; and Gray Ladies who can help as registrars and escorts.

Volunteer help is needed as Motor Service drivers, Social Welfare Aides, and First Aid Instructors. In each of the various divisions the Red Cross has a complete training program and is ready to start courses as soon as enough local volunteers are "recruited."

Each volunteer division has special duties during an emergency and it is necessary to have such trained volunteers in the Manchester area because it might be several hours before assistance could get into Manchester from other communities.

"If you have an afternoon morning, evening or week end free," Chairman Davis urged, "why not contact the Red Cross at 662-5546 and find out how you can get into the picture in Manchester and be ready to help."

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**BBC Committee Named by Jaycees**

Manchester Jaycees have formed the Business Betterment Committee (BBC). Purpose of the committee is to encourage better economic opportunities in the Manchester area.

It is expected that this will involve bringing new business to the Manchester area. BBC was formed after several Jaycees expressed dissatisfaction with Manchester current economic opportunities. Special areas of interest were those of employment and financing. The BBC will examine the problem and take whatever action is indicated.

BBC will work closely with the Jaycees' Community Development Committee (CDC). The CDC will conduct a survey to find Manchester's assets and needs. Survey includes portions on government, schools and youth affairs, as well as the economic portions. Golden Survey will be held early in 1963 with the help of the University of Michigan.

Following publication of the results of the survey, the Jaycees will select Manchester's most pressing needs as their area of interest. BBC will examine in detail the results of the economic portion of the survey. Tom Marshall is chairman of BBC. First meeting of BBC will be Nov. 29. Chairman of CDC is Dick Kuntz.

**Methodist Men Have Open Meeting**

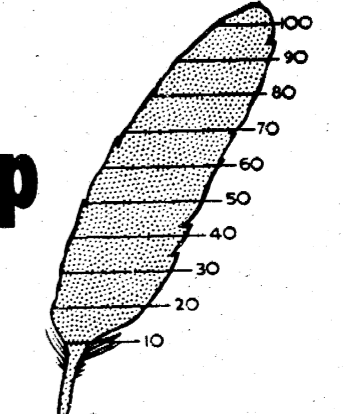
