FROM THE POLICE DEPARTMENT

Much time and many miles of driving have elapsed since the last vehicle safety-check campaign, and Police Chief Jules Van de Ginste thinks it's time for safety-minded citizens to take another close look at the family car.

"We were glad so many drivers cooperated in the previous check-up, and I know they felt good about it, too," the chief commented. "Those whose cars checked out allright were gratified and those who found things wrong were fortunate to have them corrected before more serious trouble or an accident resulted.

"Now another season is here, and even those cars which passed inspection with flying colors last spring deserve our attention again. There may be or may not be an official campaign and check-lane this time, but drivers should take the responsibility upon themselves."

With a view of oncoming winter weather, Chief Van de Ginste suggested that special attention must be given to car lights and batteries. "We're doing more of our driving after dark now," he pointed out.

Bald tires should be replaced before their owners find themselves skidding into an accident on a slippery street, he warned. Tires with good tread are needed, and many drivers are switching to snow tires, he said. He advised that drivers who plan or need to use their cars regularly during severe conditions, not to overlook the added advantage of a good set of tires and chains, even if they have snow tires.

"At times chains are a necessity, or we have dangerous and costly traffic delays during severe snow or ice conditions. All drivers who have to go, or who elect to go in severe weather conditions, should carry a pair of reinforced tire chains in the trunk and use them when needed," he said.

According to Chief Van de Ginste the early winter motor vehicle safety check should also include an inspection of the car's exhaust system. Wind-shield wipers need attention, he said. Wipers which were adequate in a gentle summer rain may not be strong enough to keep heavier snow or sleet from obscuring driver vision. Not only are live blades advisable if over a year old but wiper arms should be tested to assure that they exert at least one ounce of pressure for each inch of blade length. Otherwise they will tend to ride over the slushy material which they should be moving aside with out effort.

"We know in our minds that these items are important, and others too," Chief Van de Ginste concluded.

TOWNSHIP TAXES HAVE INCREASED

Manchester township taxes are now payable. According to Supervisor, Clayton Parr the county taxes for Wash-tenaw are now \$10.78 per thousand, compared to \$9.10 last year.

Last year the school tax was 3.75 mills but this year the school took their 4 mills which has been voted to them.

It was necessary for the school to take the extra millage because the Wash-tenaw county allocation Board gave a little more millage to the county operating than last year. This year the township tax is 1.13 for operating as compared to 1.52 last year.

Money for county operating goes to pay township officers' salary, fire protection, election expenses and for the library, Mr. Parr said.

Manchester school district gets a total of \$55.23 per thousand of assessed valuation as compared to Brooklyn \$55.13 and Clinton school district \$46.58. In Manchester township the school operating is \$20.30, special operating \$9.05 and school debt \$12.12; in Brooklyn school operating is \$19.25; special operating \$6.20 and school debt \$15.92, in Clinton school operating is \$19.25; special operating \$5.65 and school debt \$7.92. 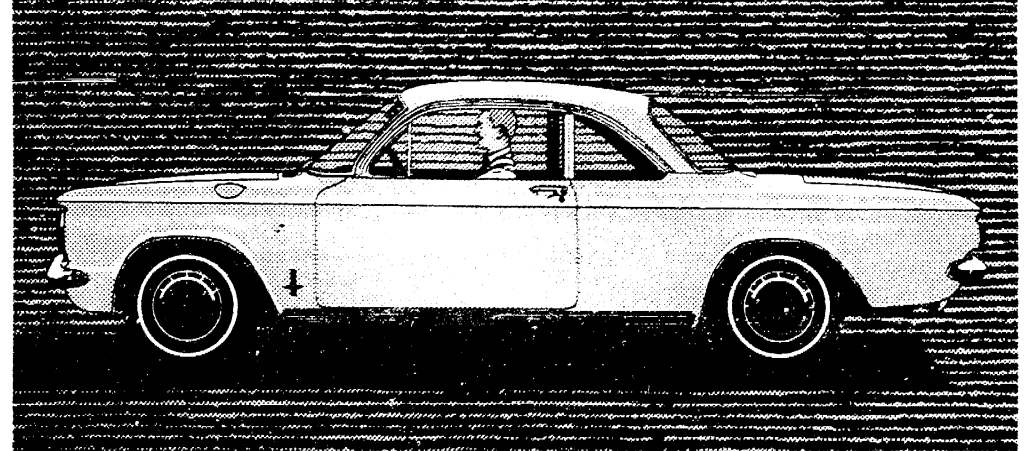

The Regional follow-up meeting of the Governor's conference on libraries was held in Ann Arbor, for the purpose of formulating new state aid to libraries.

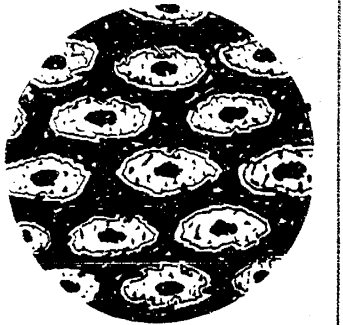
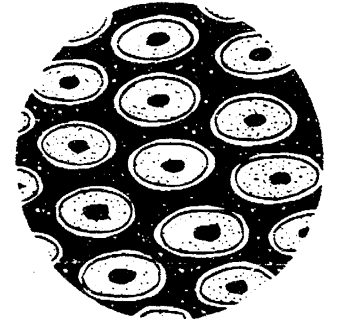
Washtenaw area libraries played host and guests were from South Lyon, Milford, and Farmington.

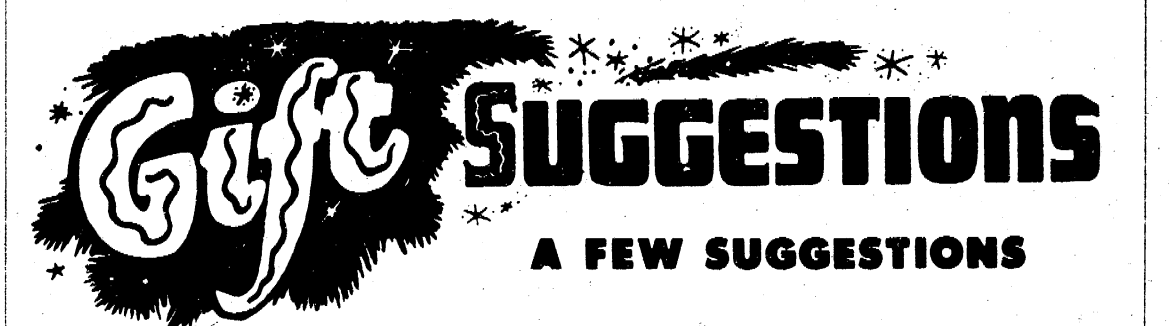

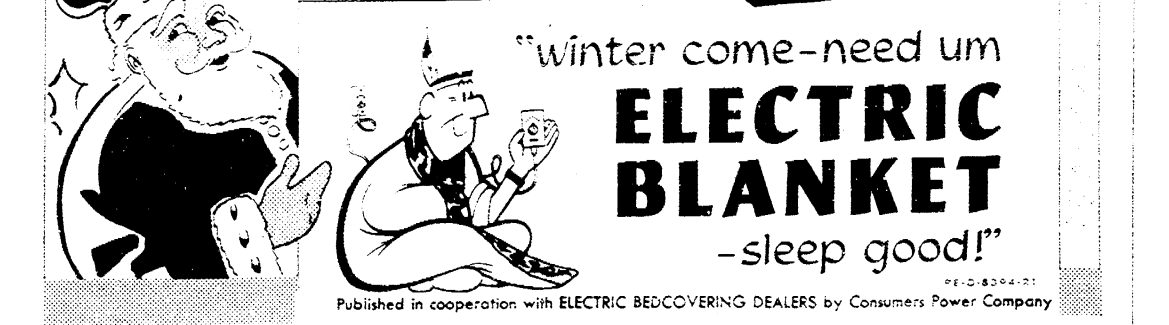

MAIL STANDARDIZATION BEGINS JANUARY 1st.

Postmaster George Merriman, the Manchester postmaster has announced that a Mail Standardization Program by the Post office department will begin January 1, 1963.

Patrons, but most specifically, manufacturers of envelopes and mailer firms should start planning now for the changes in mailing procedures which will go into effect on January 1. These changes are the first step toward mail standardization, and will eliminate a major source of delay in mail processing the small and odd kinds of mail which cause trouble in modern cancelling machines and other postal mechanization equipment. Two of the new rulings are mandatory—two are recommended.

The two MANDATORY standards are:

A. Pieces less than three inches in width (height) or four and a quarter inches in length will not be mailable.

B. Pieces having shapes other than rectangular (4 right angles) will be non-mailable.

The two recommended standards are:

A. Pieces having a ratio of height to length of less than 1 to 1.414 (1 to the square root of 2) are not recommended.

B. Pieces which are not sealed or secured on all four edges so that they may be handled by machines are not recommended.

These new standards are being adopted so that progress can be made in the development of economical mail handling machinery.

Mail processed by machine must be consecutively passed through automatic culling, facing-cancelling, and sorting devices at machine speeds. Each piece is repeatedly stacked, de-

stacked, transported by roll and belt conveyors, free-fallen, and gated. Envelopes, double postcards, and self mailers with loose flaps and unsealed edges interleave with other mail and cause frequent jams in the equipment resulting in damaged mail and time-consuming delays.

TELEPHONE DIRECTORIES DISTRIBUTED

New Ann Arbor-Ypsilanti area telephone directory contains an expanded customer convenience and distribution is now underway in the Manchester area.

In the front of the new directory, the number of communities in the USA and Canada—Which studies have shown are called most often by Michigan telephone users has been increased from 450 to 1600.

These communities with their respective area codes are listed for customers who make long distance calls to other parts of Michigan and to other states said Nicholas J. Prakken, manager of Michigan Bell Telephone Company.

These 1600 localities are only some of the 40,000 which now are identified by area code.

The new directory also contains many ANC (All-Number Calling) listings. About one telephone number in five is listed as just seven numerals—the new way of expressing telephone numbers without letters.

The number of telephones with ANC will increase annually until, within the next three-to-four years, all Michigan Bell Telephones will be identified this way.

When the new directories are delivered the old ones will be picked up, Prakken said. Telephone users will want to check their old books and remove any valuable papers.

Some 69,000 copies of the area directory will be distributed in Ann Arbor, Chelsea, Dexter, Whitmore Lake, Manchester, Saline, South Lyon, Willis and Ypsilanti.

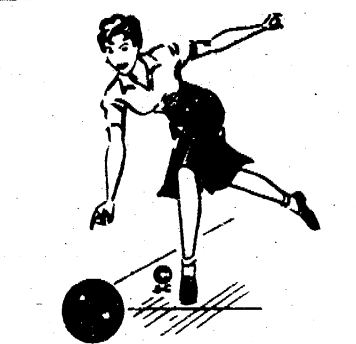

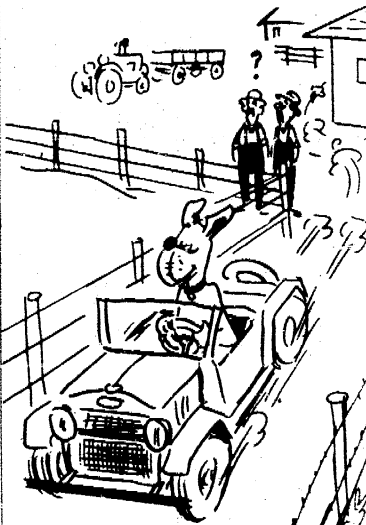

CHANGES IN POSTAL REGULATIONS TOLD
 Manchester Post Office has many additional responsibilities as well as numerous extra services to offer the public during the 1962 Christmas season. Postmaster George Merriman urged that people mail early. For use during the Christmas rush, the post office department is offering this year a new 4-cent Christmas stamp for sale, and is preparing for new postage rates starting January 7, Mr. Merriman explained. "We really need public cooperation at this time," Mr. Merriman said. Commenting on the rates,

he observed that in a period of high-cost living when one exercises care in expenditures for goods and services, the U.S. Mail service still remains the bargain. Reminding area citizens of the forthcoming new postal rate structure effective January 7, the Postmaster listed these highlights of the rate legislation enacted recently by Congress. Increase over which the man in the street is most concerned is the one-cent hike in letter rates. First Class Mail: surface letters, five cents an ounce; postal and post cards, four cents. Air: letters, eight cents; post cards, six cents included in the first class

category is the so-called "drop letter." The rate will go from three cents to four cents an ounce. Postal regulations designated this type of mail as letters "dropped" at a post office by a sender and picked up by the addressee at the SAME post office. It is used mostly by patrons in rural areas where mail delivery service is not available and mail is picked up at the post office. Often thought of by the user as "first class" but actually is third class is the "greeting card." This type of mail will cost four cents when the new rates become effective January 7. The current rate of three cents will apply for the up-coming 1962 Yuletide messages. To insure speedier service this year, Postmaster Merriman suggested the new Christmas stamp for greeting cards. This permits the card to be forwarded, if necessary, he said and returned to the sender if undeliverable—provided, of course that the return address is on the envelope.

DAVID KIRK GOES BACK TO SCHOOL

David Kirk resumed his classes at the Manchester school where he is an eighth grader on Wednesday. This was his first day in a class room this school year. On June 26 David suffered a broken neck, when he dived into shallow water in Sweezy Lake in Jackson county while swimming with his sisters and friends. As a result he was hospitalized at St. Joseph Mercy hospital Ann Arbor for 102 days. Three vertebrae in his neck were broken. His left side was paralyzed and this has meant months of physical therapy to strengthen his damaged muscles. When it became apparent that David would be unable to resume his classes at the Manchester schools, principal, Ted Topping, suggested that David could apply for Washtenaw County Special Education assistance. David is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Robert Kirk of 14180 Schleweis Road. He started his studies on September 10. This service was started immediately while he was still hospitalized. When he returned home in October, no time was lost as far as his school work was concerned as the home teacher, Miss Alpha Turman continued to teach him at home—coming twice a week to the Kirk home for his classes. She spent at least an hour with him, teaching him, on each of her trips. (The number of visits to student's homes vary with the ability of the student but the teacher tries to confine the visits to two a week. David has completed his second six weeks of work and now that he is physically able to return to his class room he is academically ready to resume his studies. He is 14 years old and on

Most people enjoy a little snow at Christmas but the men who distribute the U.S. mail are concerned about snow piled in front of rural mail boxes. Postmaster, George Merriman, issued a warning, "Snow must be kept away from the rural boxes so that they can be served by the carrier from his car. Otherwise the mail will be returned to the post office to be called for." The postmaster pointed out that this could be very disappointing to those who seem very anxious to receive their mail. "In consideration for our rural carriers, we must remember that they are not only combating heavy loads of Christmas mail and snow, but also zero and sub-zero weather. When the weatherman at Willow Run reported the mercury had dropped to two above zero and was 8 below at Jackson--well, it's pretty cold, no matter how we figure it. So help the rural mail carrier and at the same time help yourselves for more speedy delivery. "By the way, we did receive a limited supply of those much asked for special Christmas stamps Come and get them before our supply is gone," the postmaster suggested.
