POLICE CHIEF WARNS MOTORISTS

Year-end partying, gaiety and social activity should be tempered with reasonable caution, otherwise they may be unexpectedly tempered with tragedy, Chief of Police, Jules VanDeGinste warned today.

He said that the surest way to put a stop to fun is to have a traffic accident. "What could be worse than to have a family get-together end perhaps in a permanent family separation?" he asked.

New Years holidays are frequently marred by traffic accidents for a number of reasons, he observed.

"First, the fact that families and friends like to get together at times like this means there'll be a lot of traffic on the highways.

"The urge to hold family reunions and parties is so great in most of us that we usually won't let a little thing like a snowstorm stop us. A good car with snow tires and optional safety equipment in good operating condition and ready for use if necessary, windshield wipers checked for adequate pressure and live blade condition; flares, warm clothing, tire chains in the trunk and ready, and sense enough to stop overnight if conditions are too bad."

"Sometimes a man lets the spirit of the occasion get the upper hand," he said. "Surveys show 55 per cent of Christmas season fatal accidents have involved drivers who had been drinking."

The chief said the department doesn't buy the theory that a few under the belt makes a man a better driver. There are a lot of ways to wish people a happy new year and I believe all honest citizens will appreciate what we are trying to do," the chief concluded.

MISS JULIA KIRCHHOFFER RETIRED TEACHER DIES

Miss Julia Kirchhofer, 88, who taught for 40 years at Ann Arbor's Bach School before retiring from the teaching profession in 1939 died Monday at Whitehall Convalescent Home, Pittsfield township, following a long illness.

Miss Kirchhofer was born on Aug. 14, 1874, in Manchester, a daughter of Henry and Lydia Schmid Kirchhofer, members of a pioneer Washtenaw county family. Her great-grandfather, Jonathan Mann, came to Ann Arbor from Germany in 1824. Her grandfather, the Rev. Frederick Schmid, was the first German minister in Ann Arbor. He came from Basel Switzerland, as a missionary and established the Bethlehem Church, first German church in the county.

She was a member of this church, the present Bethlehem Evangelical and Reformed church. She also was a member of the Ladies Aid Society of the church. Survivors include three nieces, Mrs. J. F. Clark of Stockton, Calif., Mrs. L.N. Ridout of San Diego, Calif. and Mrs. C. J. Linton of Haverton, Pa., and two nephews, Dr. Lewis Kirchhofer of Springfield, Pa., and Ralph Kirchhofer of Havertown, Pa. She was preceded in death by two brothers and two sisters.

Funeral services were held at 1 p.m. Thursday, at the Muehlig Funeral Chapel in Ann Arbor with the Rev. Armin C. Bizer officiating and burial was in Oak Grove Cemetery, Manchester.

Miss Kirchhofer's service to the Ann Arbor Public School System was unique because the entire 40 years of her teaching career in Ann Arbor had been passed not only in the same school but in the same room. She had taught on the fourth grade level. Prior to teaching in Ann Arbor she taught in rural schools in the Manchester area.

She was born Dec. 26, 1883 in Bridgewater township, a daughter of Jacob and Eli Elizabeth Wurster Girbach. She married Herman Gall on April 2, 1913, in Saline township. Mrs. Gall was a member of St. Paul's Evangelical and Reformed church and a member of the Ladies Guild of the church, and the Washtenaw Farm Bureau.

Mrs. Gall, who came from a family of 12, was preceded in death by three sisters and four brothers. Survivors are two sons, Albert E. of Saline and Stanley of Detroit; eight grandchildren; a sister, Mrs. Luther Hamlin of Ann Arbor; three brothers, Frederick Girbach of Pontiac, John Girbach of Clinton and Gottlieb Girbach of Saline and numerous nieces nephews and cousins.

SOCIAL SECURITY HIKE EXPLAINED

Printed explanation of the Social Security tax increase scheduled for Jan. 1 now is scheduled to be on hand at the Social Security Office, 1355 N. Main St. Ann Arbor. Robert Kehoe, Social Security district manager, said that starting with the first

pay check in January, the worker's Social Security deduction will be increased by one-half of one per cent on the first \$4,800 of annual wages. With this increase, the amount of the Social Security tax will be three and five-eighths for an employe, with a matching amount contributed by the

employer. Kehoe said that benefits have been added to the original law to provide for the dependents and survivors of workers and their families. Also benefits have been increased several times to meet rises in the cost of living.

Under present law, there

will be two more increases in the Social Security tax rate, one in 1966, and the third in 1968.

Each increase will amount to one-half of one per cent, so that beginning in 1968, an employed worker will be paying four and five-eighths per cent toward Social Security.

Amid the joy of celebrating New Year's Eve, many will find time to get a bit serious, to evaluate the year that will soon be history, and to recall old-time favorite happenings in previous years.

And, what sort of year will 1963 be? Who can say for sure? Each New Year starts out pretty much the same. Those who were unhappy with 1962 forsee a change for the better; those who did well expect things to become even better.

The course of the nation and the world during 1963 is something else. National prosperity and world peace; where do we stand on these matters? In both instances, can we say, "It has been better, and it has been worse?"

So what, someone might note: "What can the guy on the street do about national prosperity and world peace, anyhow?"

The answer: plenty. Just for a moment, let us reflect upon the type of every human being in the world resolved at the magic stroke of twelve to try to do something tomorrow for family, community, country—and world.

Soldier's Wish

A New Year's greeting jotted down in a diary in the year 1863 exempted Southerners.

Obviously, the entry was made at a time when things were going badly for the North. The entry continued: "... though to speak truly I think the prospect is not such as to warrant and in even hoping that the wish (of a Happy New Year) may be fulfilled."

The journal, with human and personalized descriptions of the Civil War, is among the collection of Lincolniana and Civil War materials in the Wyles Collection at Santa Barbara, Calif., College.

Twelve Grapes

Twelve grapes are a part of the gay Spanish New Year's Eve celebration that takes place in the Puerta del Sol, Madrid's Times Square. As the clock strikes midnight the grapes are held high overhead and eaten for luck—one for each month of the year.

CONSIDER IRRIGATION — but not merely as insurance against drought. The costs are too high. To really pay off it should be used whenever soil water content is not high enough for maximum crop production. Where surface irrigation is possible, costs may be lower than sprinkling. An irrigation system requires a lot of planning. Start now investigating best systems for your situation, arranging financing and surveying the land so as to be ready to go next summer.

BROILERS CAN SKIP A MEAL occasionally—if the period doesn't exceed 12 hours. In Michigan trials where all feed was removed for two 12-hour periods each week from a group of birds, no changes in body weight or feed utilization were observed when compared with a group which had feed available at all times. A feed reserve in the bird's crop apparently continues to supply needs for a time after feed is removed. Eighteen and 24 hour "hunger periods" did produce slight weight losses and lower feed utilization. Due to differences in use of feed, this doesn't necessarily apply to layers.

EARLY DAIRY CALF WEANING can be a very practical way to reduce the cost of raising herd replacements. It saves marketable milk or purchased milk replacer. Remember these points though: (1) Feed limited quantities of milk or milk replacer to 4 weeks of age. (2) Begin feeding a high quality starter and water by the end of the first week. (3) Offer fresh, good quality hay daily. (4) Watch to see that the calf is healthy and eating grain and hay after it is weaned.



IS YOUR MACHINERY SITTING OUT IN THE WEATHER? It's a good way to lose money without being aware of it. Housed equipment will last about 10% longer and repair costs will run about 10% lower than with unsheltered equipment. You can justify about 1.4% of the replacement cost of a piece of equipment as an annual housing cost.
