## Shakespeare and 20th Century Hold Joint Meeting

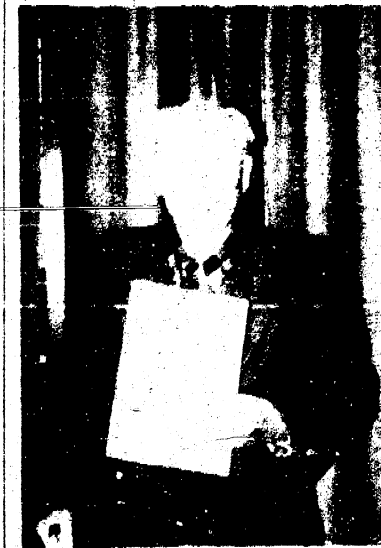
On Tuesday evening, at the Music Room of the High School, the Shakespeare Club and Twentieth Century Club held a joint meeting.

## New Optimists Initiated

Two out-of-town guests, Herb Estes and T. Hawley Tapping, both of Ann Arbor, were introduced by Franklin M. Reck. Tapping gave the members a brief talk on the work of the Washtenaw County Chapter of the American Red Cross, describing how 1400 voluntary workers in the county are handling the important business of the Red Cross—the Bloodmobile, Home

Service training courses in waterfront, safety, first aid, disaster relief and other subjects. Seventy-five of these volunteers are in Manchester. Herb Estes, member of the County Drive Committee to build a new Red Cross headquarters, followed with slides showing the crowded conditions of the present headquarters in the Nickells Arcade, and showing an architect's rendering of the building being planned for Packard Road. It was announced by George Koda and Franklin M. Reck, local chairman of the Red Cross Building Drive, that the full story of the work being done by Manchester's 75 Red Cross volunteers, will be carried in next week's Enterprise, March 22nd.

## First Aid Course to be Given Over T.V.

Red Cross Chapters in Central, Michigan, Northern Ohio, and Northern Indiana will be taking to the airways by presenting the Red Cross Standard First Aid Course over Television. The seven week course will be offered over WILX-TV, Channel 10, beginning April 9th, at 9 a.m.

This will be the first time in this part of the country that such a course has been offered by the Red Cross over a commercial TV station. There has been one prior venture of this type, a highly successful course that was taught in the Milwaukee area last year. 1200 people passed the course given through that channel.

Corporal William Carter of the Michigan State Police, an authorized Red Cross First Aid instructor, will teach the course. An examination will be held in each of the participating counties at the completion of the course. Those who are enrolled in the course and successfully complete the exam will be awarded the Red Cross Standard First Aid Certificate.

Those wishing to participate in this course are requested to register in advance by sending \$1.00 to "First Aid, WILX-TV, Box 380, Jackson, Michigan". The dollar will cover the cost of the text book and workbook.

Registration may also be made by contacting the Washtenaw County Chapter, 211 Nickells Arcade, Ann Arbor. Life Saving topics to be covered in the program will include control of severe bleeding, artificial respiration, and First Aid for poisoning. First Aid, by Red Cross definition, is the "immediate and temporary care given to the victim of accident or sudden illness until the services of a physician can be obtained". Files of the Red Cross and other organizations are full of instances where a proper knowledge of First Aid has been responsible for saving a life.

Civil Defense officials recommend that at least one person in every family take a First Aid Course. They point out that in the event of enemy attack or disaster of any kind, that doctors and hospitals might be unavailable for a long time. The difference between life and death could very well depend on the First Aid treatment they received.

Red Cross, which has been teaching First Aid for over 50 years, points out that when an accident strikes in the home or on the highway, or anywhere else, a proper knowledge of First Aid can often keep an individual safe.

### Six Theater Fellowships to Be Offered

Six fellowships will be offered in conjunction with The University of Michigan's new Professional Theatre program, according to Executive Director Robert C. Schnitzer. Heads of drama departments in universities and colleges throughout the nation are each being invited to nominate two outstanding recent graduates as candidates for these fellowships. Letters signed by Prof. William P. Halstead, head of theater activities for the U-M Department of Speech, and Professor Schnitzer are being mailed out this week inviting nominations by May 1st.

The six students selected for fellowships will be given opportunity to appear in minor roles with the resident company of the U-M Professional Theatre Program.

They will also be able to work in the theater division of the U-M Department of Speech toward advanced degrees. Professor Schnitzer announced March 1st, that the Association of Producing Artists (APA) had signed a three year contract as the program's resident company. APA will be in residence in Ann Arbor for 20 weeks each year and will also tour the state.

Recipients of the new fellowships, Schnitzer stated, will be able to gain professional theater experience and advance their academic careers. They will also enrich the acting pool of the Department of Speech theater program and bring to the U-M campus talented graduates from other schools.

### MASL to Hold Board & Council Meeting

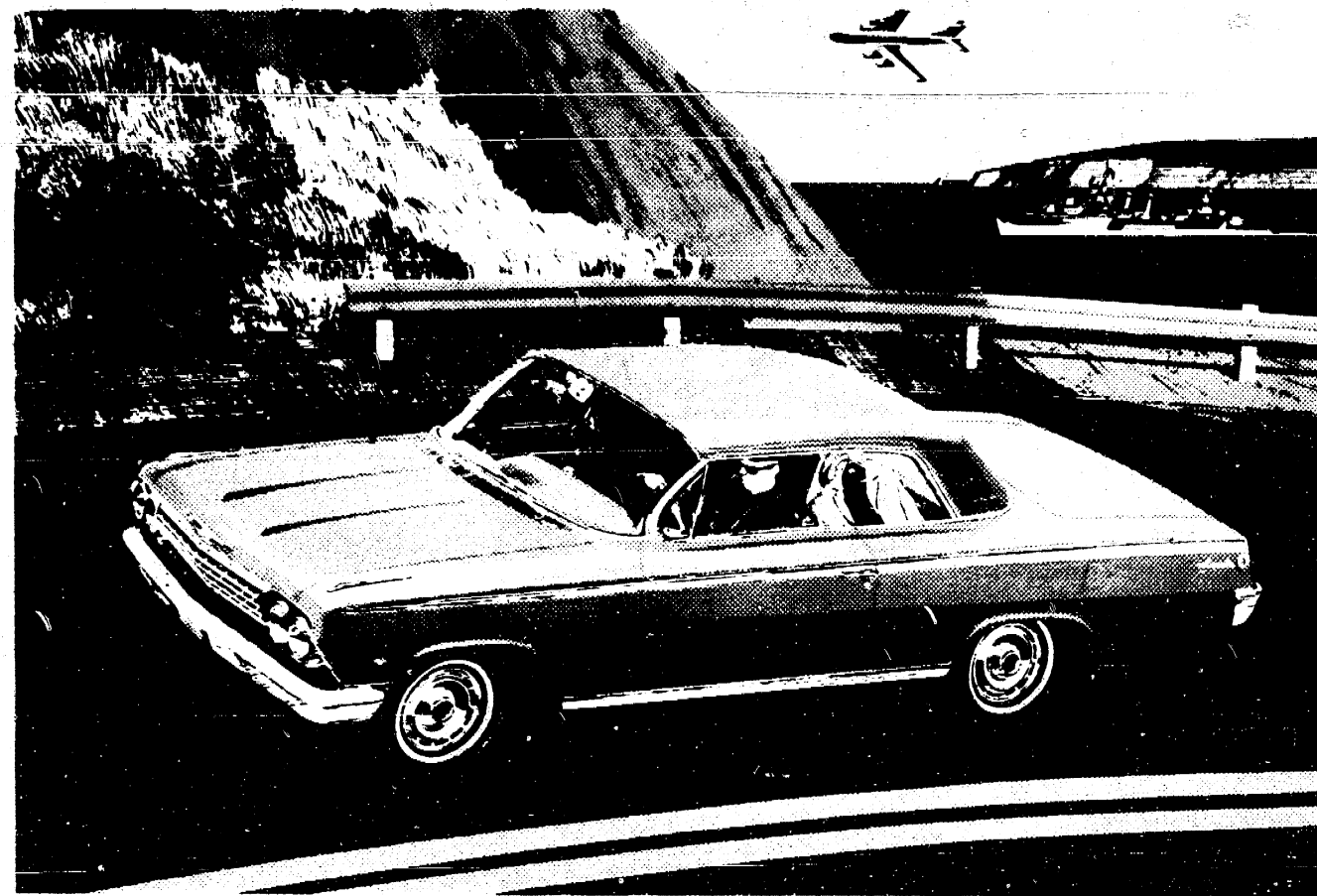

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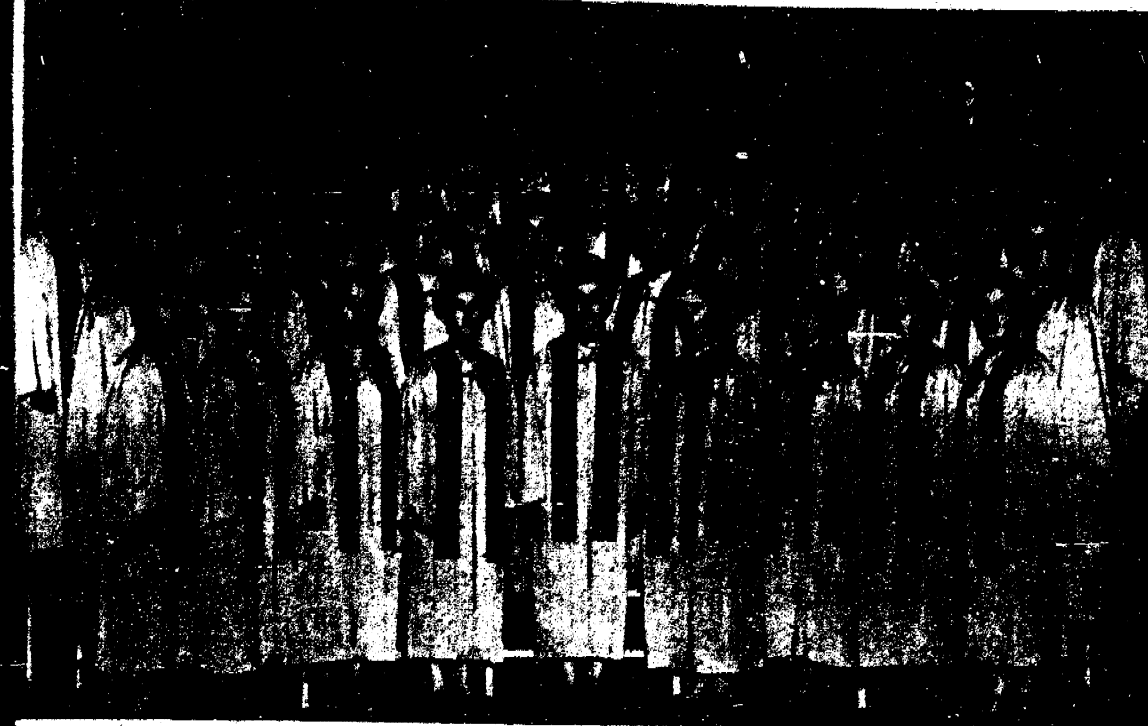

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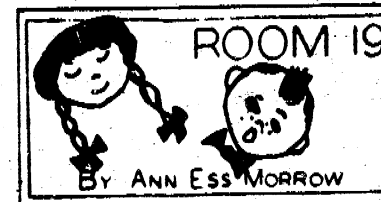

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**FEED GRAIN PROGRAM SIGN-UP PERIOD** is to continue through March 30. The program is essentially the same as in 1961. You must retire at least 20% of your acreage to be eligible for price supports on your remaining acres. Payment for diverting 20% of your acreage will be based on 50% of the normal production on the diverted land valued at the county support rate. For diverting an additional 20%, payment will be based on 60% of normal production. Remember, you must sign up to be eligible.

**SOCIAL SECURITY TAX** for this year is 3.1% of an employee's salary. For simple figuring, .0313 multiplied by the employee's wage will give the correct amount to withhold. Employers must match the employee's deduction. When \$100 has been accumulated, it must be deposited with a commercial bank recognized as a Federal depository. Obtain the necessary forms from your local Social Security office. The law provides a penalty for failure to comply.

**HIGHEST RETURNS FROM FERTILIZER** are possible only when nitrogen, phosphorus, potassium and lime are in balance. To find how much is needed for optimum yield, it is necessary to run a soil test. Take your soil sample now if you haven't already done so.

occupied with their own problems they cannot see beyond them. Don't be satisfied with "Nothing", when you ask what he must do. Make sure of it. Find out what they are studying. What projects must be handed in.  
Call school occasionally. If you cannot talk to teachers, perhaps the office or a counselor will check up to see that all is well. Or come to school, if possible—visit PTA.  
And why not chat by phone or person with the mother of Tim's best friend? Maybe she will

know a project Henry's doing— one that Timmy hasn't started. Encourage him to build a worthy concept of himself. You look so nice today, Tim. I'm sure you'll act that way. And the actions somehow tend to match his shirt, exactly as his socks do.  
"I wish that I could figure out that math the way you do." Or "Timmy, where'd you ever learn to write so well?" Then follow up, when Tim comes home, with "That's the boy!" He'll come to see himself that he'll not conceited, but wear-

ing a respect reflected in behavior.  
Don't let him follow failure route. He gets an 'E' in spelling one day. He may not try the next. Remember that an 'E' can challenge as well as it can frustrate. See that is used in that way.  
If the teacher says that he will have a test on a certain 15 words he knows exactly what the test will be, and if he puts out sufficient effort and his ability's within the range of normal, he can pass it with an 'A'. He may have to sprain a brain in doing so, but have a band-aid handy!

Work with Tim parents. Check to see he's copied words right before he starts to learn them. Then go through the list from time, and throw a troublesome word at him when he is doing something else. Make fun of work but not of him, and praise him well when he succeeds.  
And if he tells you that he got an 'A' in spelling, and his sister says, "But what about that 'D' in math?" don't dismiss the 'A' with "Uh-huh, but—".  
Give him recognition for achievement before you turn to figures.  
Take time to listen and to work with him, and he will learn and grow in his best way.

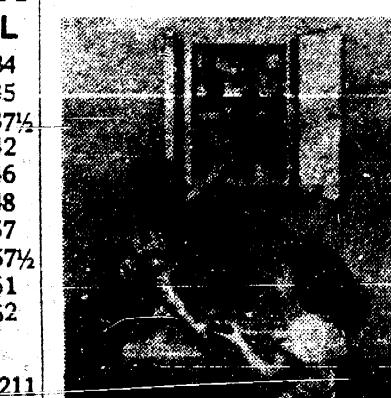

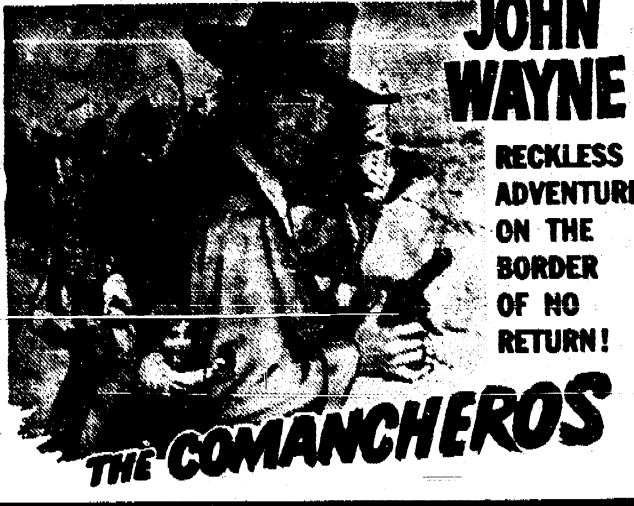

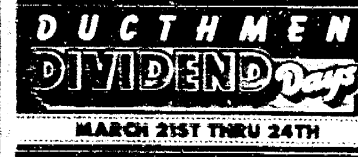

**Final Drive for Red Cross Headquarters Now Under Way**



**FINAL DRIVE FOR RED CROSS HEADQUARTERS NOW UNDER WAY**

Manchester Red Cross volunteer workers who drive to Ann Arbor, attempt to find a parking place, and climb the narrow stairs to the overcrowded Red Cross headquarters on the second floor of the Nickells Arcade, are aware that the Washtenaw Chapter needs a new headquarters. With its ever-expanding humanitarian services, the Red Cross has outgrown its rented space.

To meet this long overdue need, the Washtenaw Chapter inaugurated a low-pressure drive last spring for \$200,000 to build a new headquarters on Packard Road. During the rest of the year, without any great amount of publicity, the drive committee raised \$61,500, almost a third of the amount.

Manchester did considerably better than most small communities by raising \$309. This spring the drive is being resumed under the chairmanship of Edward Adams, Jr., of Ann Arbor, with T. Hawley Tapping, former alumni secretary of the University of Michigan, as consultant. They hope to raise the balance of the money in April.

The Manchester part of the drive is being conducted by the following committee: Franklin H. Reck, chairman, Mrs. Laurel Breitenwischer, James C. Hendley, J.R. Jones, Luther Klager, John Pippinger, Mrs. Norman Randall, Stanton Roesch and Mrs. Louis D. Vogel.

As explained by Mr. Adams, the proposed building is to be an economy structure stressing utility, providing office space, kitchen for disaster feeding, rooms for conferences, classes and lectures, badly needed storage space; and just as important, ample parking space. Red Cross supplies are stored in churches, attics, and basements of homes throughout the area.

**PROPOSED NEW RED CROSS HEADQUARTERS. The new Red Cross Headquarters will be located on Packard Road next to Buhr Park. It will be modern and flexible, but without luxury, and will have room to expand as the need grows. Movable metal partitions will permit changing room size.**

The present drive, Mr. Tapping explains, is not a part of the annual Community Fund drive. In the Manchester Community Fund; money is collected for local and national humanitarian services. It pays for the running expenses for these services.

The Building Fund drive, on the other hand, is for much-needed capital improvement. It is not repeated. The Manchester Committee plans to conduct and complete its share of the drive in April.

Pictures in this issue of the Enterprise show the proposed headquarters and its location. The building will greatly help the work of the 75 Manchester Red Cross volunteers who serve the daily needs of the people in this area.
