Miracle of the Open Heart

The "open heart" operation is one of the miracles of modern surgery.

By means of it, the human heart can be bypassed, and an artificial heart substituted, while the doctor makes essential repairs on the valves of the heart, putting it in normal working condition. Such an operation requires from eight to fifteen pints of blood.

Manchester has had two open heart operations in its history. One of these cases recently involved a two and one-half year old girl, Sallie Kidd. It was successful, and the youngster is now back home, recovering nicely.

The Manchester Blood Bank and the parents of Sallie Kidd are grateful to all the donors who gave Sallie a chance to live a long and normal life. They are also grateful to the Red Cross Bloodmobile which made possible the collection of blood for the open-heart operation and all the other emergency cases all for life-giving blood.

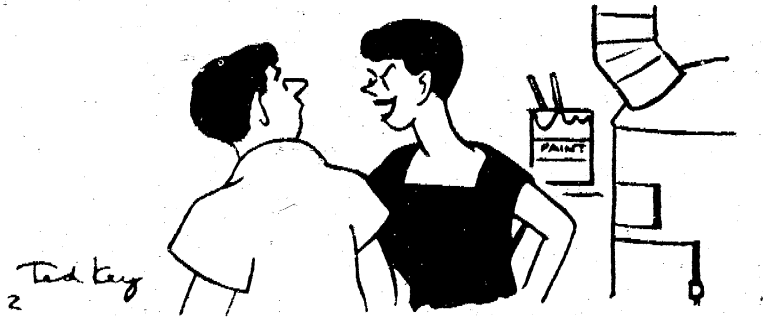

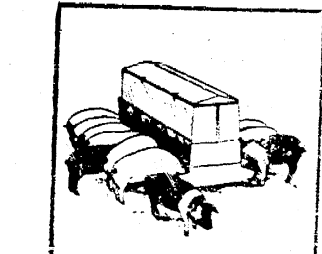

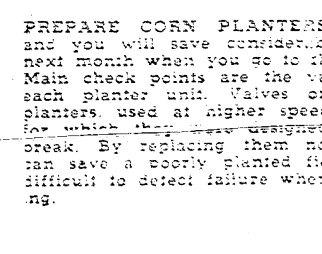

INCREASE HOG PROFITS by feeding pigs for maximum gain from birth to 30 pounds. It is during this period that pigs make their largest gains per pound of feed consumed. Also, a fast rate of growth and high feed efficiency at a young age will influence weaning during finishing. Place pigs on a starter ration as soon as they are a week to ten days old. The increase in gains and livability will more than pay for the cost of the feed.

WHAT IS YOUR BREAK-EVEN POINT? This should be figured for each farm enterprise to determine if it is returning a profit or if it is actually a loss hidden by other, more profitable activities. The average 20-acre farm in Ohio could not pay all crop costs unless it produced higher yields or received higher prices than those: Corn 38 bushels at \$1; soybeans 22 bushels at \$1; oats 20 bushels at 50¢; wheat 27 bushels at 50¢ and hay 1.5 tons at \$20 a ton.



PREPARE CORN PLANTERS NOW and you will save considerable time next month when you go to the field. Main check points are the valves in each planter unit. Valves on older planters used at higher speeds than low speeds may wear down or break. By replacing them now you can save a costly planted field. It's difficult to detect faulty worn planters.

STUCK IN THE MUD! Then make plans to have your feedlot this summer. Now is the time to get ready to the banks and pay to the manager. In addition to increasing livestock gains, it is very weather. You need it as it all at once. Spread the job out over 3 or 4 years.

L. E. Scheid at GA 8-8421, will also be issuing permits. Most of the fire runs this spring have been the result of trash burning on windy days and leaving the fire unattended.

ACT 143, P. A. 1923, AS AMENDED, PROVIDES THAT:

- 1. You must have a permit to have an open fire except where the ground is unenclosed, or for domestic purposes, or to protect persons or property in case of fire.

Clean-Up Hint

Make Sure Your TV Set Is In Proper Operating Order

Making sure that your television set is in proper operating order should be a part of your Spring Clean-Up Week program.

A warning on all television sets is to disconnect the power cord from the outlet.

High voltage picture tube is dangerous to handle. Refer servicing to qualified service personnel.

Television sets never should be placed on a radiator or other source of heat. Some parts can be damaged by exposure to temperatures in excess of 100 degrees Fahrenheit.

Television sets are ventilated to keep temperatures below maximum limits. If the openings are blocked, overheating and a fire may result.

Christmas Fire Safety Campaigns "Civic officials, school teachers, the Boy Scouts, the Girl Scouts, fire departments, and other public spirited citizens who direct Spring Clean-Up Week activities are to be congratulated on their work."

Campaigns Prove Effective Mr. Vincent pointed out that Spring Clean-Up Week and other fire prevention campaigns are proving to be effective fire deterrents.

While dollar losses are up, they are in part a reflection of continued expansion of the economy and the rising costs of materials, goods and services, he said.

However, studies show that over the years, due in part to fire prevention efforts, the ratio of fire losses to the value of buildings in place is gradually declining.

Mr. Vincent reminded that greater care could reduce the number of fires. "Nearly one-fourth of all fires are caused by matches and smoking," Mr. Vincent said.

"Another 20 per cent are due to misuse of electrical equipment. "And, three-fourths of all fires are the result of carelessness or forgetfulness."

"If we could convince everyone to use care with fire, keep heat-producing equipment in good repair, and remember that even big fires were little ones when they started, we could take a long step forward in fire prevention."

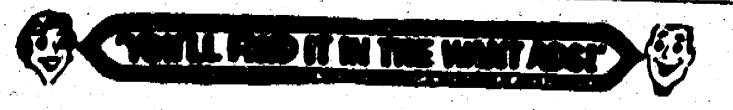
