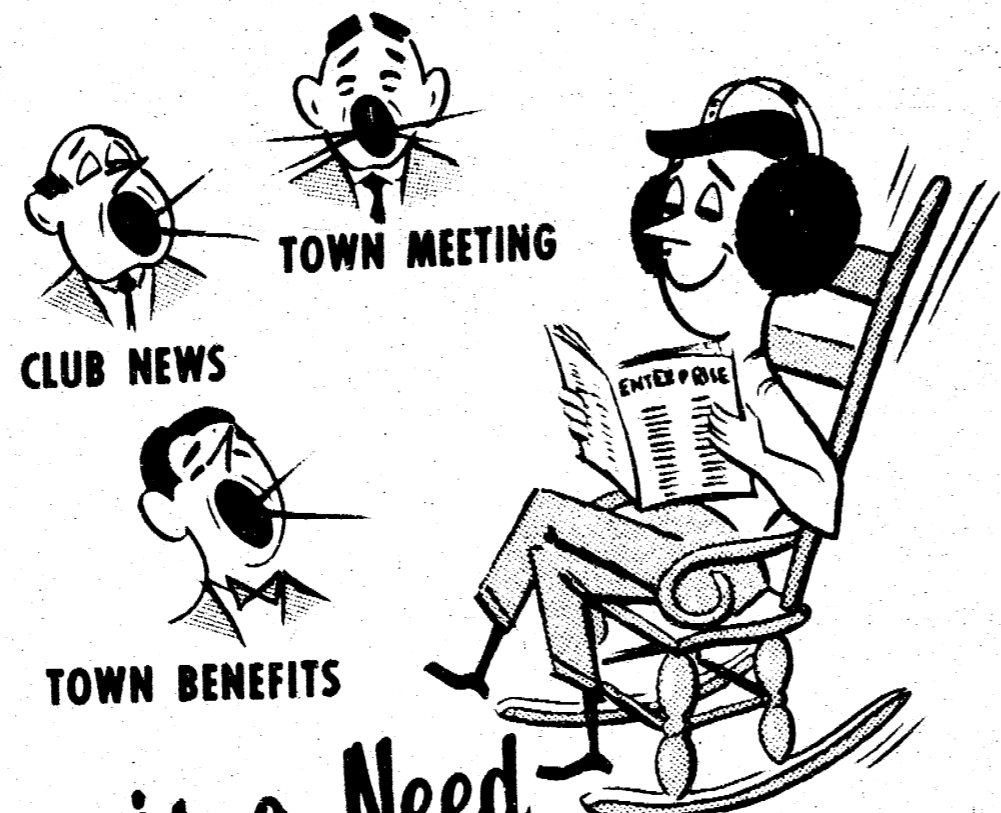

The Washtenaw County ASC Committee has determined that "Premeasurement Services" in Connection with the 1962 Feed Grain Program will be available to participants in the Feed Grain program. This means that producers who wish to know the acreage in either the fields he wishes to divert from production of corn or the fields he wishes to plant to corn, can be measured officially for a service fee of \$5.00. This premeasurement service shall be performed on a farm prior to May 31, 1962. The farmer shall request the service and pay the fee at the County ASCS office. This program is available as of this time.

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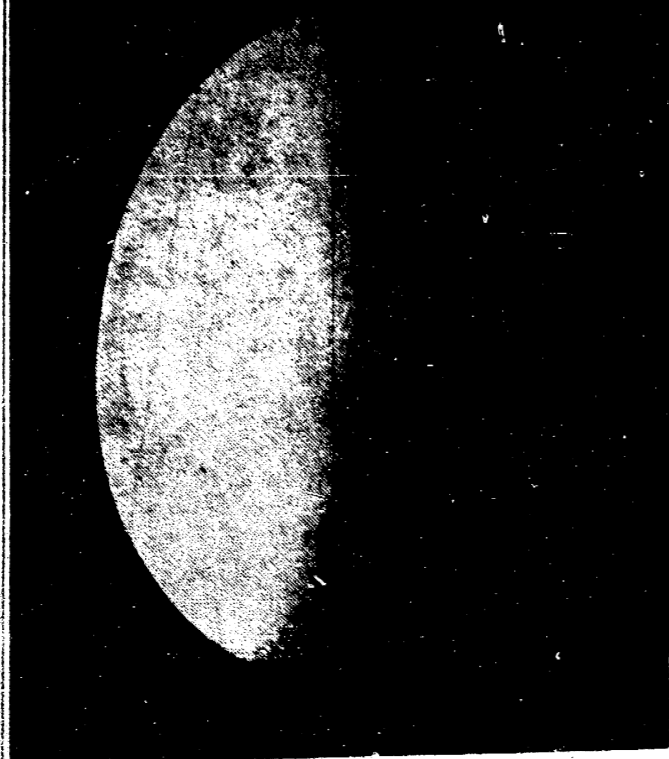

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KHRUSHCHEV'S GOAL: An Egg a day for every Russian by 1980

We hear a lot these days about our "farm problems". Yet how many of us realize that American agriculture—problems and all—is the envy and the wonder of the world?

Witness Mr. Khrushchev's recent 7 hour speech to the Communist Central Committee. He openly admitted that Soviet agriculture has fallen critically short of its goals—in spite of concentrated efforts. He also made a sweeping promise and set an heroic goal for Soviet farms: an egg a day for every Russian by 1980. Significantly, he refrained from such a rash commitment on milk and dairy products.

Witness a few more facts: (1) Our farmers make up only 2% of our population, yet they produce abundant food for all of us at the lowest cost in history. Russian farmers represent 45% of the population, yet there is a constant threat of food shortage. (2) Food takes less of our income than ever before—only 20% in Western Europe food takes 30% to 50% of the average income—in Russia, 60%.

Does this mean that the United States has no farm problems at all? Of course not. Fortunately, however, ours are not problems of shortage and near-famines. Let's keep this in mind next time we read about our "farm problems". Let's remember too that "farm problems" are not altogether "farmers' problems". At stake, don't forget, is the food supply of 180 million Americans You and me.

Let's not take our egg a day, our quart of milk entirely for granted.

Let Them Eat Cake



If you are watching the kinds of fat you eat rather than the fat calories, you will like this cake made with the new balanced oil margarine or corn oil margarine. The recipe favored by the staff members of Best Foods Test Kitchen is called Apricot Torte.

- 2 cups sifted flour
1 1/2 teaspoon baking powder
1/2 teaspoon salt
1 cup corn oil or balanced oil margarine
1 cup sugar
3 eggs, separated
Grated peel and juice of 1 lemon

Sift together flour, baking powder and salt. Cream corn oil margarine, add sugar and beat until light. Add egg yolks and mix well. Stir in almonds, lemon juice and peel. Add sifted dry ingredients and mix until well blended. Fold in egg whites which have been beaten stiff. Turn into a greased jelly roll pan (15 1/2 x 10 1/2 x 1 inches). Bake in a 350°F. 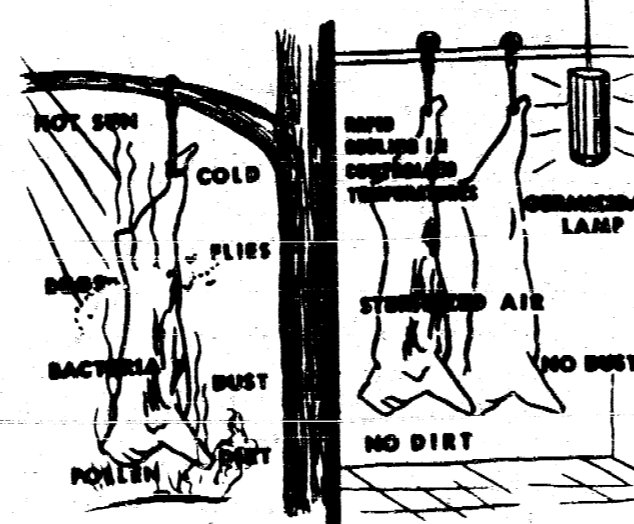

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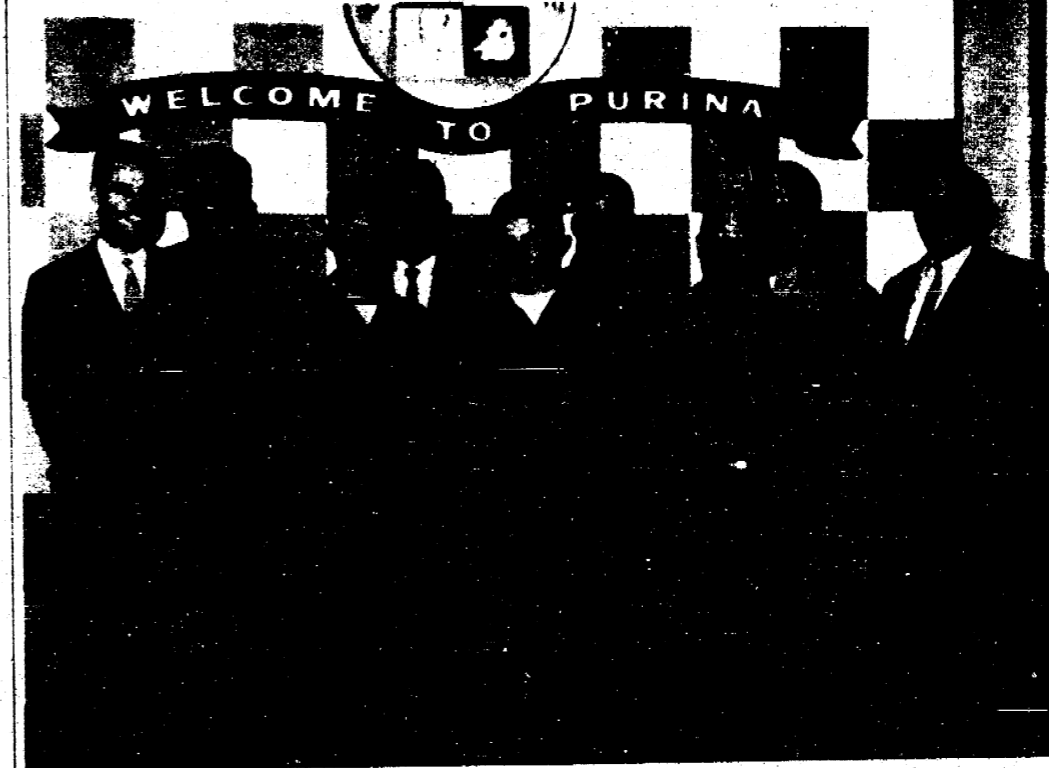

'Watch That FIRE' The spring fire season is here and the condition of the grass and brush is kindling dry. Washtenaw County has suffered a rash of wild grass and brush fires. Most of these fires have been started by people burning trash in unsafe containers, using poor judgement, not taking the proper precautions to prevent its spread and leaving these fires unattended. All of these causes are directly responsible for the large loss in wildlife habitat, pine plantations and even building. This past week local fire departments have averaged 20 runs a day on grass and brush fires started by careless burning. These runs cost between \$50.00 and \$250.00 apiece. This is a very tremendous financial burden on the community. I would like to make a suggestion at this time that you confine the burning of your household trash to the evening hours. The humidity is usually high at that time and the wind of the day has died down. Most men are home at that time of day and they should do the burning. Stay with your fire till it is out. Have your garden hose and broom handy. Under no circumstances should you allow your children to do the burning. A fire permit is not required for burning trash in your container around your home. However a fire that is allowed to escape from the container and burn surrounding grass lands is considered to be a careless use of fire. Under the State Law you can be fined and prosecuted. Remember only YOU can prevent fires.

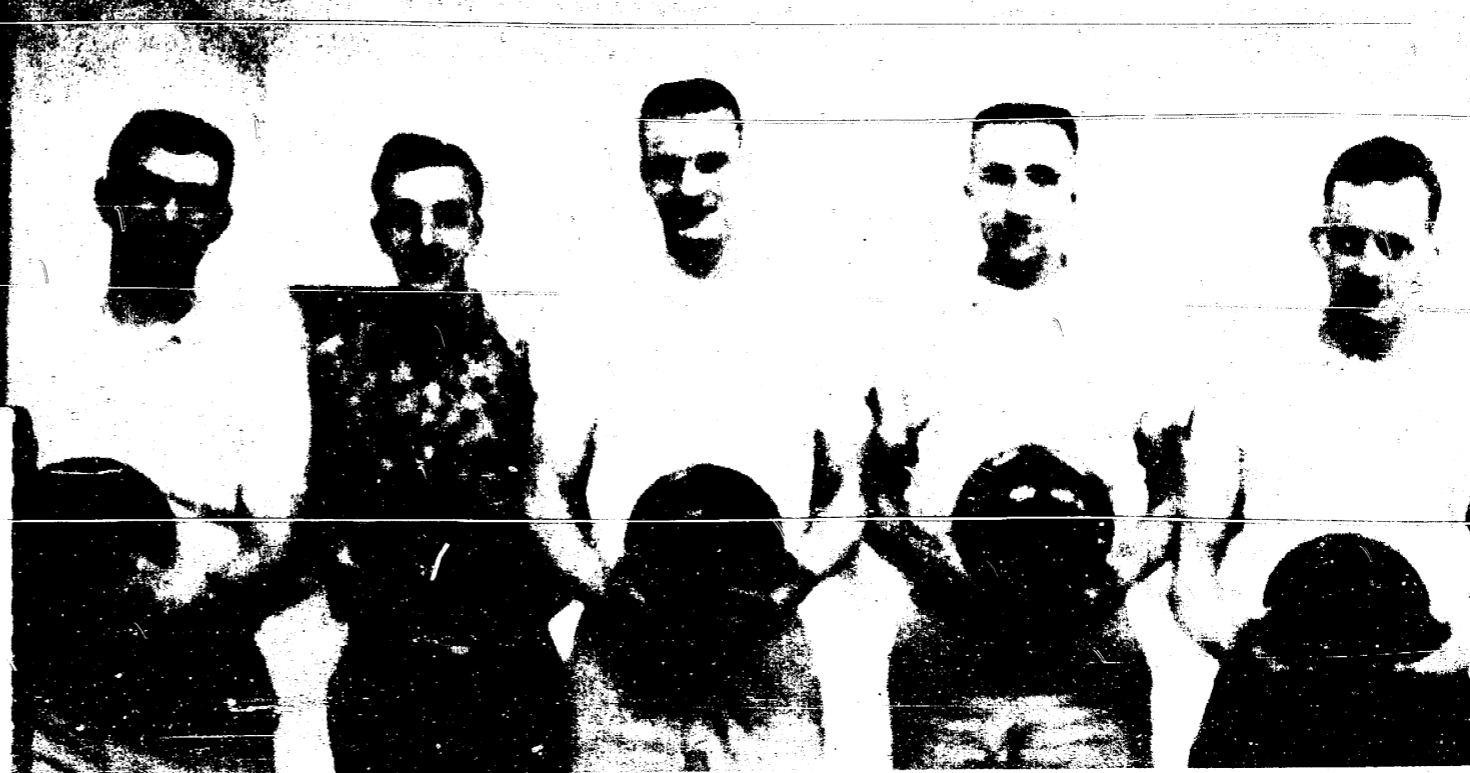
