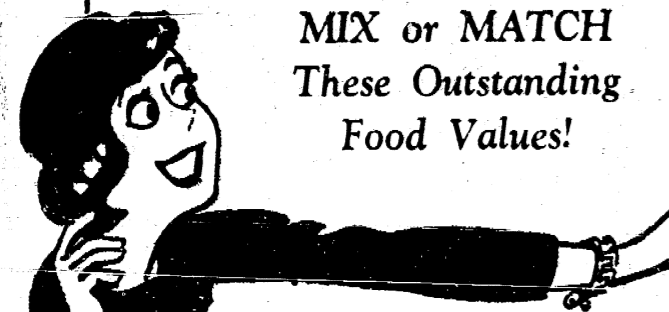

**Outline of Tentative School Budget**

The preliminary budget for operation of the local schools is developed early in the spring of each year for the following school year. At this time many factors are not known that are needed before the document is made final.

The largest portion of the budget is salaries which constitute 80% of the expenditure. Salaries of all personnel presently employed are applied to salary schedule for an accurate estimate. Another 10% is used in fixed charges, such as lights, heat, water, insurance and transportation. This leaves approximately 10% for maintenance, capital outlay, supplies and the purchase of new equipment.

The following is a breakdown of the anticipated expenditures for this next year. ADMINISTRATION, salaries of superintendent and secretaries, school audit, legal counsel, elections, census takers and new accounting forms for new state accounting system.

The preliminary budget with all available receipts indicate a deficit figure of \$61,000.00. The board will request a renewal of the 4 mill special operating levy at the June 11th election. The re-approval of the special operating tax will approximately balance the budget if the state and county finances are not reduced below the present year.

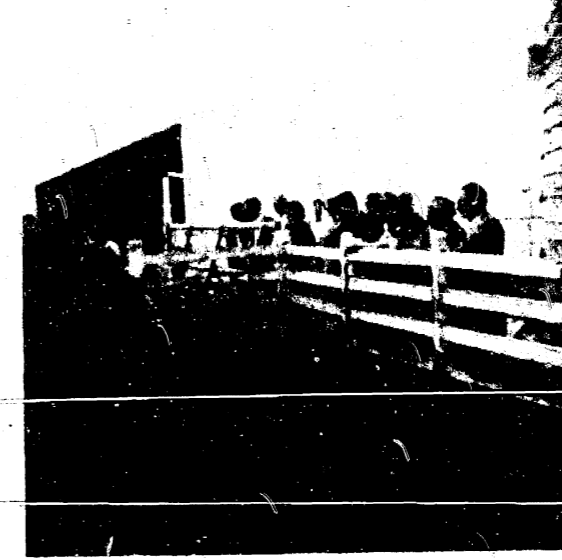

**DON'T SHORTEN SPRAY-RIG LIFE** by using old 55-gallon barrels as tanks. Although you may have several of them on hand, they can prove expensive. With steel barrels, corrosion by chemicals is often excessive and strainers and nozzles can become plugged. More important, rust particles will soon ruin your pump. Be sure to check with your chemical supplier on the type of tank recommended for double-use.

**RENT MACHINERY** you don't use enough to justify buying. It is growing practice is profitable for both the farmer and the machinery dealer. Many dealers rent all sizes and types of farm equipment. Renting plantings out to a farmer is profitable for both the farmer and the machinery dealer. You pay only when you are actually using the equipment. It's another way to keep your money where it belongs, having a lot of capital invested in machinery, when it could be making you more money somewhere else.

**EARLY CUT HAY PACKS MORE WATER** as a roughage feed than later cut hay. Although top yield comes about 10 days later, maximum feeding value is reached at the early bloom stage. After this point, feeding value is reduced by about 1% for each day cutting is delayed. Cutting the first crop early sometimes allows making an extra cutting of hay or, if grazed, permits a longer pasture season. Later cuttings should follow about every 45 days.

**TEST BULL FERTILITY** before breeding bulls in with cows. Most veterinarians are equipped to make this test. Studies show about one fourth of all bulls are incapable of setting a cow in two services. Sixty percent of the females should settle on first service and the same percentage of the rest at second service.

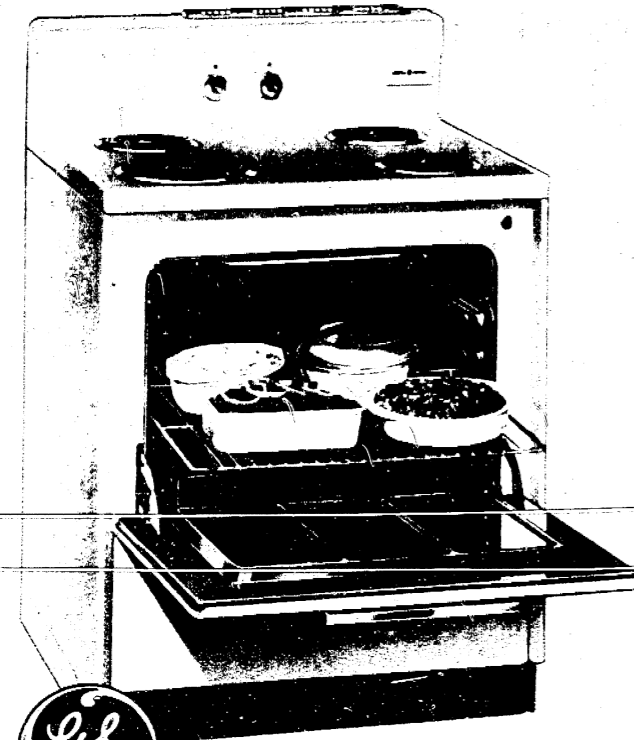

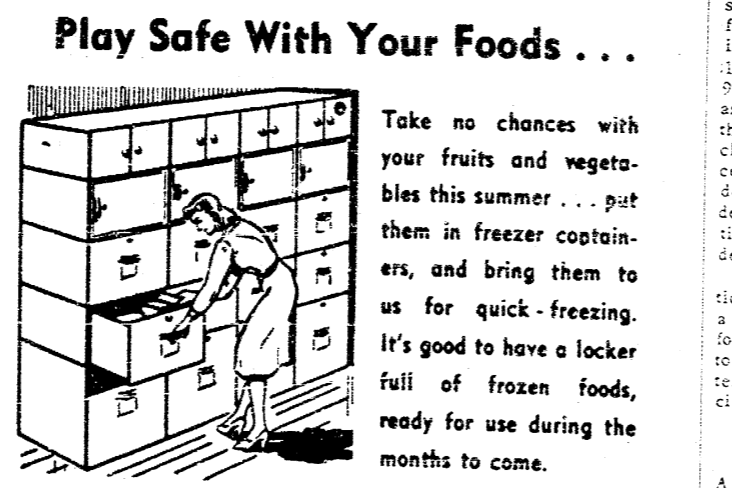

For more than 40 years red poppies have been worn proudly by many Americans around Memorial Day. As this date draws near again I would like to tell you about this flower's significance and the purpose of Poppy Day.

**WHAT THE PRESS SAYS ABOUT MEDICARE**

Newspaper editors and magazine columnists are known for their objectivity in analyzing legislation as to its effect upon the public. They study an issue in depth before taking a public stand. "This tax is discriminatory. It falls on only those who pay social-security taxes, excluding all others. It is compulsory. But the need is alleged to be a national responsibility, and if that be so it should be paid by all, not some of the taxpayers."  
 "And consider the small businessman with a few employees. He cannot generally increase his prices to cover this expense. His plight is already obvious. It would be much greater under the King-Anderson plan."  
 "There can be no argument about the fact that there is a national obligation to make sure that no elderly person shall lack medical and nursing care. This country is rich enough, and its people are humane"

**EXCERPT FROM EDITORIAL IN BATTLE CREEK ENQUIRER & NEWS, MAY 4, 1962**

"To further prove our argument that the public has been misled on this program, we cite the typical expense of a particular operation that is often required by elderly women."  
 • "The standard surgeon's fee is \$90, but may range to \$135."  
 • "The average length of hospital stay is eight days, for which the patient would pay each day under the King-Anderson bill deductible clause."  
 • "Since some laboratory tests almost certainly would be necessary, another \$5 to \$20 of the patient's money would be involved."  
 "Thus, an elderly woman undergoing such surgery would have to pay at least \$170 from her own money—a sum far in excess of the average annual private insurance premium on true medical care plans that offer much more benefits, including fees of physicians and surgeons."  
 "There are many other flaws and fallacies in the King-Anderson bill, but to explore them here would only confuse the basic issue. We prefer to deal solely with the definition and stated purposes of the bill and to demonstrate how the public has been deceived by their wordings and the interpretation of them by vote-hungry

politicians. We are confident that if the people are awakened to realize how they have been deluded, they would have none of the King-Anderson measure.  
 "We are quite aware that many who have looked upon this bill as the salvation of their declining years may still be somewhat skeptical of our argument. We urge them to write to their congressman and to ask for a copy of H.R. 4222, the bill introduced in the House February 13, 1961, by Rep. King. A careful reading of this document will open the eyes of any doubter."  
 "We want these senior citizens to have the security and adequate medical care they deserve. But, we do not relish the idea of buying their votes by misleading them into thinking that the King-Anderson bill will meet their needs."  
 "President Kennedy and the leadership of the American Medical Association proceeded absolutely nowhere in their discussion of the administration's so-called health care program for the aging this week. Such an impasse was to have been expected. The vast majority of the nation's physicians are fully aware of the fallacies in the plan and they justifiably want nothing to do with it."

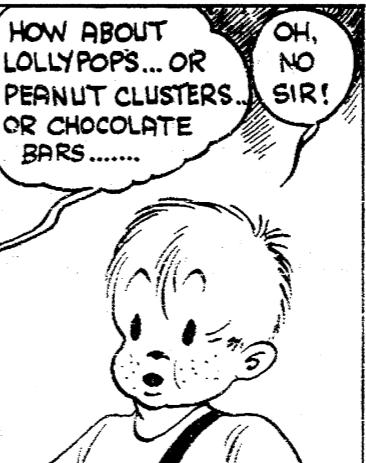

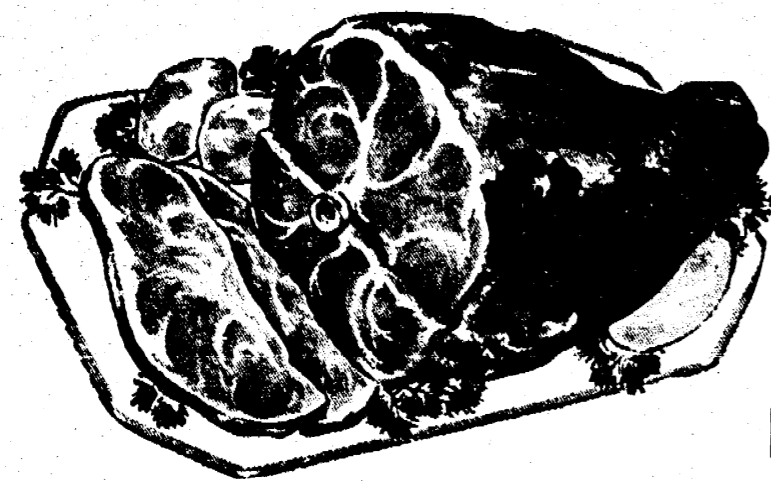
