**Bloodmobile Here Today**

Manchester area will have the opportunity Friday, June 22, to put its Community Red Cross Blood Club in good standing with the Regional Red Cross Bank. The Bloodmobile will be at the Emanuel Church Hall from 2:00 to 5:30 and 6:30 to 8:00 p.m., to serve the public. It is an "open clinic" and can therefore take donations for other official Red Cross Blood Clubs where ever they are. Credits will be transferred automatically upon request.

Due to exceptional demands the Manchester Club has served five fifteen-pint-or-more cases in the last six months. Consequently the local bank is two pints in debt to the regional bank at this time. The last Bloodmobile in Manchester was August 23, 1961 with a small attendance and 55 pints donated. Since that time the club has assisted 12 individuals with 93 pints of blood.

Individual donors may give their blood for patients who have received blood from the club, if they wish this is a neighborly gesture that some people prefer to use. These are the people the family would have had to call upon, had there been no blood bank to take care of the situation at the time. The usual demand from the club comes to approximately 100 to 150 pints per year. That many donors are greatly needed at this time.

Most adults between the ages of 18 and 60 can give. If it is not possible to make a reservation with Mrs. Roland Grossman, Chairman-of-the-day (GA. 8-2311) or any other member of the Releasing Committee, come anyway during the hours designated. The committee anticipates that the most crowded part of the day will be from 4:30 to 5:30 to handle the Double A donors. (Releasing Committee: Mrs. F.M. 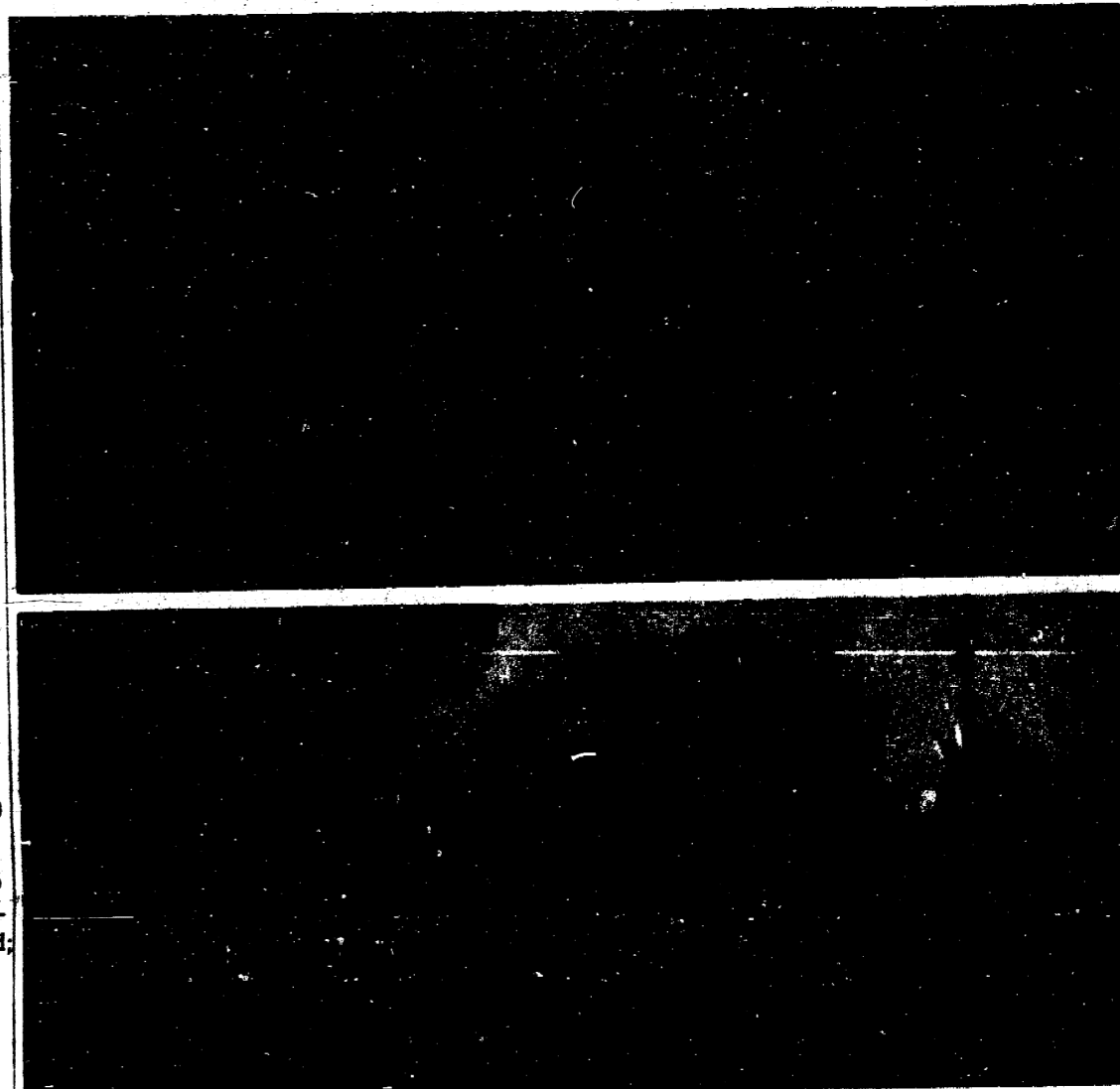

**Angry Winds Upset Area**



The Manchester area was the victim of winds estimated up to 60 miles per hour Monday night. The winds accompanied a rain-storm which struck the vicinity about 6 o'clock.

The most damage came to the property of Mrs. Albina Agosti and George Merriman. Mrs. Agosti had a barn flattened on her Buss Road farm by the winds. Merriman saw his sheep shed on Lamb Road lowered.

Other damage resulted in several fallen trees. Oak trees were down across Lamb Road and Buss Road prohibiting pas-

sage. A tree fell onto Noggles Road but traffic could travel around the obstacle.

A moving car was "ambushed" by falling willows on West Austin Road near the Wilbur Frey farm. The car was traveling and a willow fell ahead of it blocking the route. Attempting to back-up, the driver was halted as several more willows dropped.

Help came and the trees were moved so that the driver could proceed. The largest number of trees fell along Austin Road, the ma-

jority falling away from the road. Three trees were reported down within the village. The 400 block of East Duncan was the scene of some damage which occurred when a large tree fell across the street and snapped a telephone pole in the process. Several lines were disconnected. The other trees fell on Auburn St. and by Washington St.

Emergency work done by the county road commission and the village street department removed the route-blocking trees within a short period of time.

### Summer Begins June 21

Summer is just beginning—officially.

The season's official beginning comes at 4:24 p.m. Thursday (June 21) according to University of Michigan astronomer Hazel M. Losh.

"On this day Michigan will receive the most heat from the sun for any 24-hour period of the year, because the sun will reach its most direct position over the northern half of the earth," she explains.

But the chances are good that this day will not be the hottest of the year, because the sun will be about three million miles farther away than it was in January the U-M astronomer says.

"The northern hemisphere will continue to receive more heat from the sun than it loses until about the first of August, so temperatures generally can be expected to keep climbing until then."

June 21 will also be the shortest night of the year with only about nine hours between sundown and sunup, Professor Losh notes.

"On this day the sun will rise and set about 33 degrees north of the east and west points, and swing its greatest arc across the southern sky."

### Anhydrous Ammonia—Danger!

When the Billie Sol Estes case broke, one farm expert in Washington complained that all he did was answer calls from newsmen asking, "what's anhydrous ammonia?"

To oversimplify, it is a nitrogen compound frequently used as a soil fertility builder. Further, it is commonly stored in tanks from which it is dispensed to smaller tanks connected to applicators for field spreading.

Quite apart from the Estes affair where for a time everyone was out counting missing ammonia tanks, the lively liquid is capable of getting into the news strictly on its own.

Used properly, anhydrous ammonia is not a bit more dangerous than many other farm tools, but when coupled with carelessness, things can happen in a hurry. Common ammonia is found in most households and if you stop to notice, the bottles are marked "poison." Just add 70 per cent more strength and you have anhydrous ammonia.

In view of National Farm Safety Week, (July 22-28) - farmers would do well to acquaint themselves with proper safety precautions when dealing with this potent poison. For example, should a tank leak or a hose blow off an applicator, a farmer can easily become sprayed with the dangerous material. If he is overcome by ammonia fumes, someone might try to use an ordinary mechanical resuscitator on him. Although these devices are perfectly safe (even for babies under normal conditions,) IT WILL RUPTURE THE LUNGS of a victim that breathed anhydrous ammonia.

Soap and anhydrous ammonia simply do not mix. If a person sprayed by ammonia washes with soap anytime within a 24 hour period HE CAN END UP WITH

### THIRD DEGREE BURNS!

What to do? Farm Bureau safety experts when consulted said: "The best thing is to flood the exposed areas with a heavy spray of water and keep it flowing for ten minutes or more. If this is done, chances are there will be no real ill effects."

They recommended getting into the shower, jumping in the creek or horse tank, just anywhere to be in water...but especially flowing water. A hose turned on the victim can be a life saver.

How many people know of these

things? Unfortunately, not many. Farmers must realize that science has made major changes in their work and that each presents new safety problems.

three of us to reduce the number of calories we consume." Dr. Arata points out that fat contains more than twice the number of calories than an equal weight of carbohydrate and says it's just good sense to cut out calories by reducing fat in the diet.

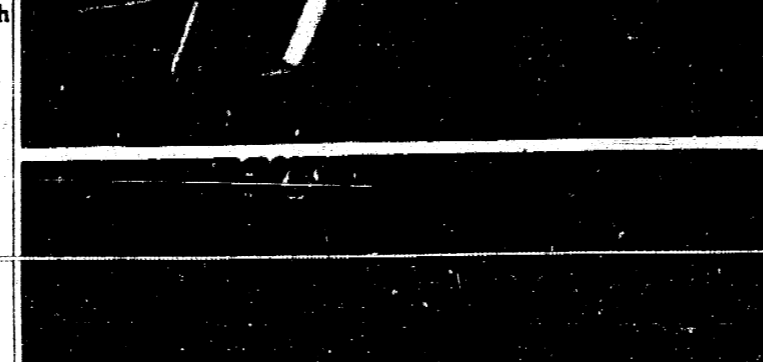
"Consumers have a perfect right to do this," she declares. It is the responsibility of the producer to make it possible. "For years," she continues, "we have bred livestock for high butterfat content of the milk. It would be just as simple to reverse the process and breed for low butterfat content."

Dr. Arata does not feel that milk should be cut out of the diet. "I know of no food which is as nutritious as milk," she adds.

"I drink two quarts per day," she says, "and have every intention of continuing to do so until I have a very good reason not to. I hope the dairy industry continues to produce high quality milk, even if a greater per cent of their product must be skim."

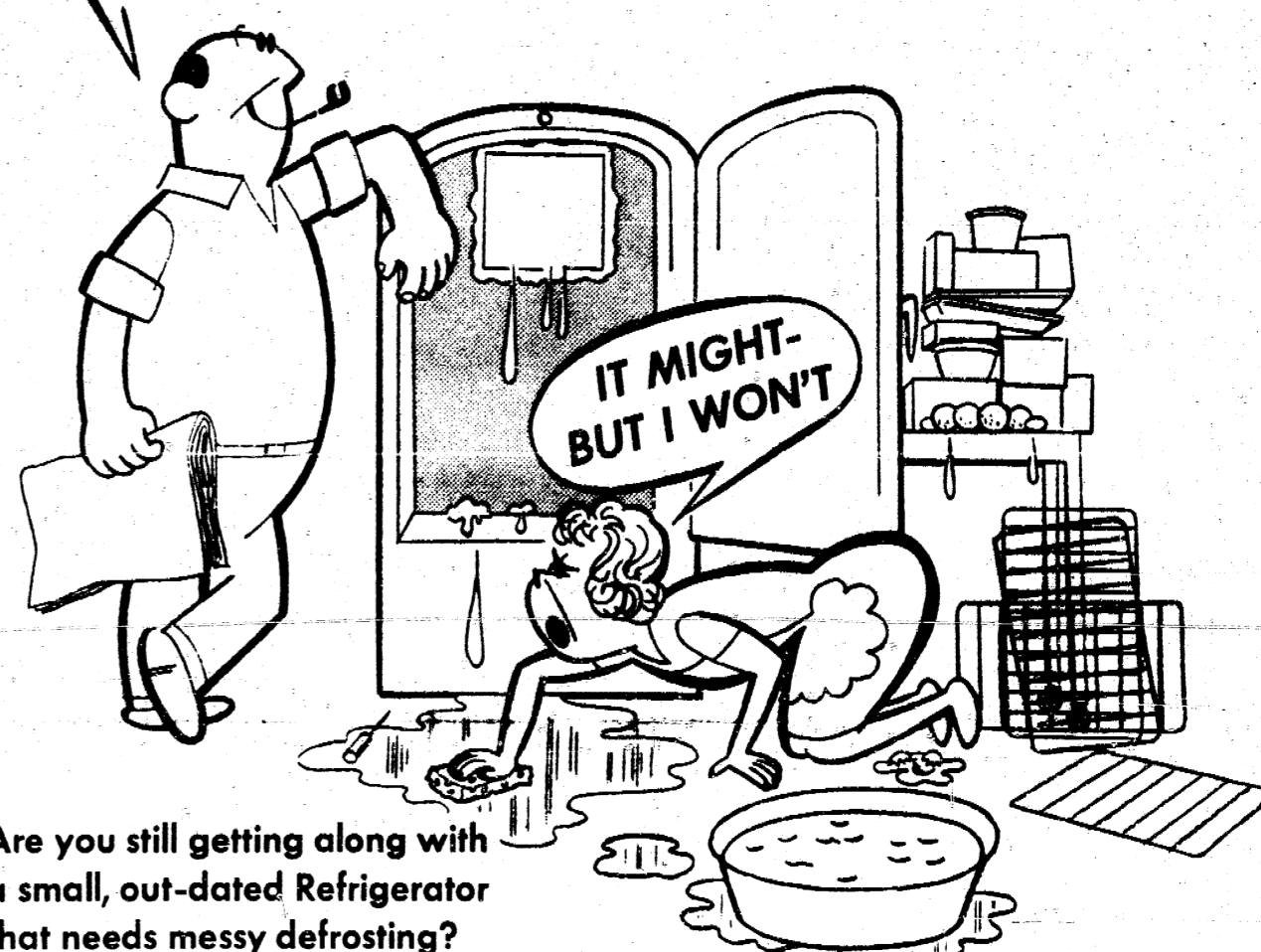
