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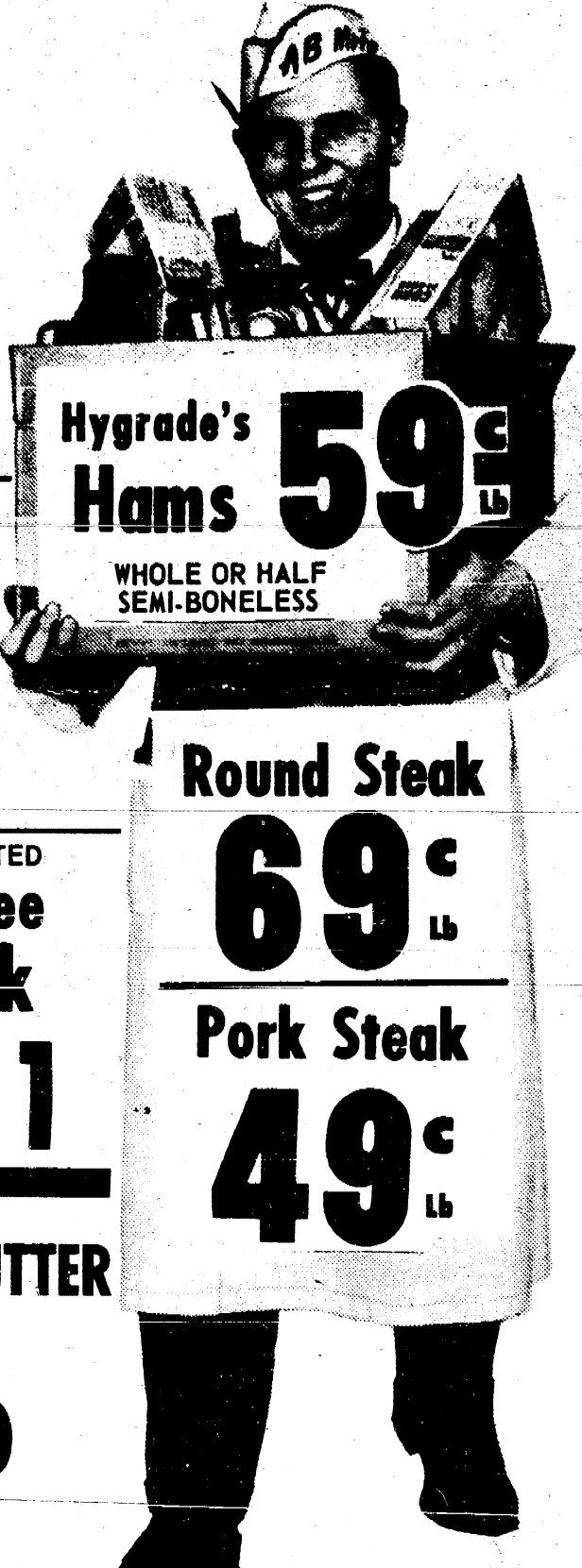

John Galbreath Goes to Honduras

John Galbreath, who has been Science teacher in the Manchester High school for the past five years, has accepted a position as Mathematics Instructor at the American School in Tegucigalpa, Honduras. He is the son of Mr. and Mrs. John Galbreath, Jr. of 1122 Chicago road, Jackson. Prior to coming to Manchester he served two years as Lab Technician with the U.S. Army. He will leave Metropolitan airport Sunday for his new position.

Tegucigalpa, capital of Honduras, is located at an altitude of 3,200 feet midway between the Pacific Ocean and the Caribbean sea. Temperatures vary from 50 to 86 degrees, year-round, he said. Although Spanish is the language of the country, all instruction in the American School is in English. There are 423 students in kindergarten through twelfth grade; 63% are Hondurans, 32% U. S. citizens and the rest are other nationalities. At present there are classes through grade 9 with plans to add one grade a year for the next three. The students of grades 10 to 12 are on correspondence from the University of Nebraska, except for Chemistry and Physics.

Mr. Galbreath's job calls for teaching, coordination, planning and developing a sound program in math and science for the junior and senior high school. Since the school year is February through November Mr. Galbreath will begin at the mid-year when he takes up residence in Tegucigalpa on August first.

A search of the farm conducted at that time failed to locate the marauding animal. Friday when the trooper and Deputy Clark were checking the area where Bienick's 150-sheep flock is kept a dog suddenly leaped out of the nearby bushes. Bienick immediately identified the animal as the one which had killed his sheep ten days ago. Deputy Clark shot the fleeing dog in the head, killing it instantly. Later the dog was traced to Jack Gibson of Clinton who admitted ownership. Gibson agreed to make restitution for the loss of the sheep. The sheep are valued at about \$12 each.

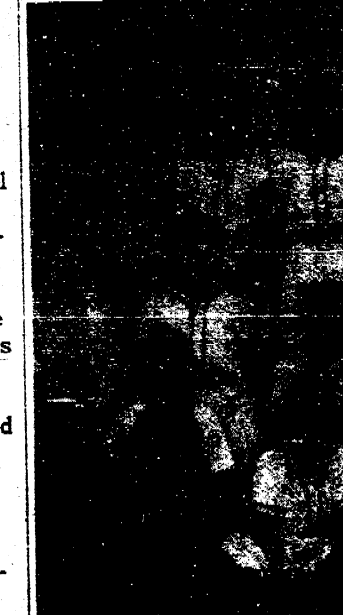
Farm Bureau Plans Picnic

Demand Greater Than Supply Forben Eat Cold Cuts

The Manchester Chicken Dinner, one of the biggest in Michigan was bigger than ever this year. There were well over 3,000 chicken dinners served. According to general Chairman Luther Klinger there were better than 300 who couldn't be served and many had to be refunded to about 75 who had already purchased their tickets. Credit for success goes in part to the exceptional publicity given by Howard Heath of WPAG. Marshall Wells of WJR and the local newspapers for their coverage.

Professor Howard Zindel, head of the Poultry Department at Michigan State University and Professor Emeritus J.M. Moore of the same department who were "chief cooks" said they had never seen a better organized group of workers and attributed much of the success in the speed in serving the public to the way in which everything seemed to be organized.

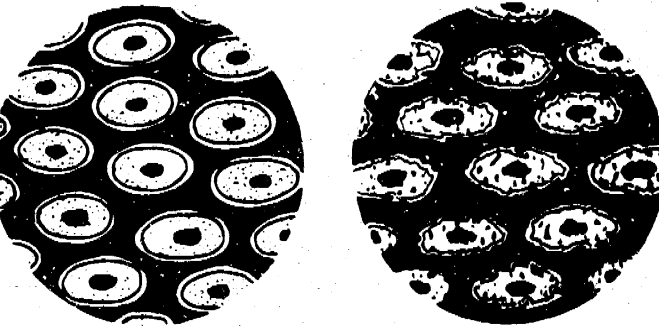

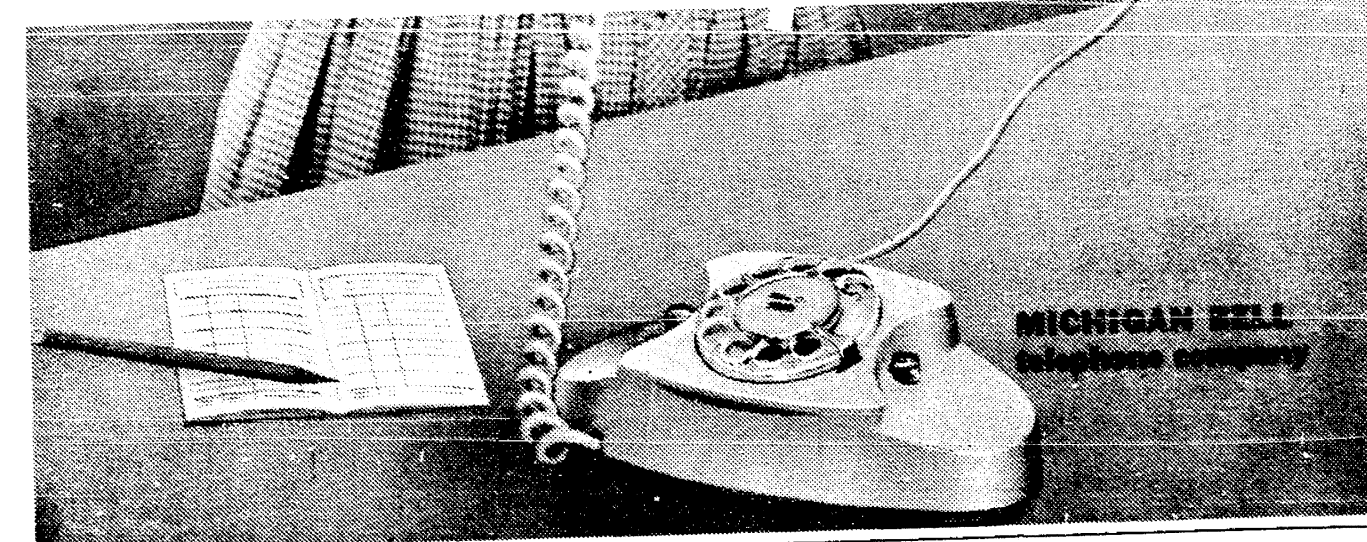



THE NUMBER OF PIGS FALLOWED THIS FALL will depend to a great extent on how you feed your sows during breeding. In college tests, sows fed a high level of antibiotic farrowed 10.4 pigs per litter compared with 9.4 pigs among sows not receiving any. Number of pigs weaned averaged 8.6 and 7.8 in favor of the antibiotic treatment. Feed about one-half gram of aureomycin or terramycin per sow per day for 10 to 21 days at breeding time—one gives about as good results as the other.
KEEP HOG SHIPPING LOSSES DOWN.
Shrink can vary all the way from 0.5% to 4% in hogs depending on how they are handled. Be especially careful when temperatures climb to 80 degrees and above. Load animals and ship early in the morning where possible. It also helps to put wet sand or crushed ice on the floor of the truck. Make up a full but comfortable load—either over or under-loading can increase shrink 15% to 20%.

JH Council Busy Lot

Installation of an intercommunication and sound system in the Junior high school was completed recently. The Junior high school student council paid for this from funds accumulated during fund raising projects over the past five years. In addition were profits from concession stands at the high school baseball games, sale of pencils, maps, sweatshirts etc. In addition the Junior high school chorus contributed to this fund from profits realized from their operetta, "Fanny Ann" last year.

Not only do all classrooms have inter-com facilities to use but a loud speaker arrangement in the Civic auditorium was redesigned and now operates to maximum effectiveness.

In addition to conducting activities to support their project fund the student council has many school and community service activities. Among these are:

- Actively helps recreation committee and Jaycees in running the Kiwanis parade.

Maccabees International in August

The 34th review of the Great Camp of Maccabees of Michigan was held at the Statler-Hilton Hotel in Detroit and made plans for the convention of the Maccabees International which will be held in Lansing August 27, 28, and 29. Monday August 27 will be fraternal day with drills and contests. Louis Wolfe and Carl Wuerthner were elected as delegates for the Lansing convention. Several prominent citizens had met in their homes at times discussing the advisability of organizing a fraternal society. It was in the early part of 1874 that W. J. Clogston and Mr. John Peel started the society with provisions for infirmities of old age disability and death. This would prove a blessing and would create a benevolent order established on the lines of fraternity and would be cooperative because everyone would help his brother when the need arose.

The society was founded on the 2nd book of Maccabees, chapter 1, in the Holy Bible. The society was named the Knights of Maccabee in August 7, 1874 and christened Adam after establishing a number of subordinate tents in the Province of Ontario. The first meeting was held in the United States. One branch was established at Port Huron and Major N.S. Boynton, a civil war veteran became the charter member. In the spring of 1880 a meeting was held in Port Huron followed by one in Buffalo, New York, which created the Union of the Knights of Maccabee organization. Sir Knights Boynton, Stanton and Avery were appointed a committee on laws. It was at this convention that discussion broke out on June 11, 1881 Major Boynton organized the Great Camp of Michigan. The first Great Commander was Arthur Bassett of Detroit. The 2nd Great Commander was A.R. Avery of Port Huron.

When the new organization was complete, new rates were set into effect and the 10 cent membership fee was obsolete. After the collapse of the original supreme tent Major Boynton called together the ex-members of the great camp who had continued their membership through the Great Camp and reorganized the Supreme Tent of the Maccabees of the World in September 1883.

D. P. Markey functioned as Great Commander until 1891 when the order became too large and the responsibility too great for one man to handle. It was through the influence of Major Boynton that D.P. Markey became Supreme Commander of the Maccabees of the world. He held that office for 33 years. Before he retired from the office of Supreme commander he became one of the leading fraternalists of the age and a well known person by every insurance company doing business on the continent. The Ladies of the Maccabees came to life in the city of Muskegon, March 24, 1886. A preliminary meeting had been held at the home of Mrs. Adolphia Ward who was the organizer and founder of the Ladies Auxiliary of the Knights of Maccabee for one month when he was named to fill the vacancy of the office of recordkeeper, due to Dr. C. Berger moving to Toledo, Ohio. The unit's record became active and had a membership of 147 at its peak.

At the Great Camp review at Ludington in 1906 Carl Wuerthner was elected a member of the Great Camp as second Master of the Guards and again elected at the Great Camp review in 1908 in Toledo, Ohio. The Carl Wuerthner Post No. 341 was formed by the merger of the two Manchester units. In 1935 there occurred a vacancy on the Great Camp Board. Carl Wuerthner was appointed to the office of executive committee. He was re-elected at each quadrennial review when in 1954 at the review held in Jackson he was elected Great Lt. Commander, again in 1958 in Detroit and at the review held in Detroit last month again he was named to a four year term. Mr. Wuerthner has served the various offices of the local unit for 67 years. For 27 years he has been a member of the Great Camp Board. Louis Wolfe, commander of the local unit was a delegate to the review in Detroit last month. The Maccabee picnic association consisting of Jackson, Lenawee, Washtenaw and Hillsdale counties was formed 31 years ago and meets in August each year. This year the meeting will be at Carr Park Sunday, August 9th.
