### Maccabees International in August

The 34th review of the Great Camp of Maccabees of Michigan was held at the Statler-Hilton Hotel in Detroit and made plans for the convention of the Maccabees International which will be held in Lansing August 27, 28, and 29. Monday August 27 will be fraternal day with drills and contests. Louis Wolfe and Carl Wuerthner were elected as delegates for the Lansing convention. Lenawee, Washtenaw and Hillsdale. This year's picnic will be held at Carr Park Sunday, August 19th.

Mr. Wuerthner has summarized the early history of the Maccabees as follows: The Maccabees had its beginning in London, Ontario. Several prominent citizens had met in their homes at times discussing the advisability of organizing a fraternal society. It was in the early 1870s that W. J. Clogston and Mr. John Peel started the society with provisions for infirmities of old age disability and death. This would prove a blessing and would create a benevolent order established on the lines of fraternity and would be cooperative because everyone would help his brother when the need arose.

The society was founded on the 2nd book of Maccabees, chapter 1, in the Holy Bible. The society was named the Knights of Maccabee August 7, 1878 and christened Adam after establishing a number of subordinate tents in the Province of Ontario. The first meeting was held in the United States. One branch was established at Port Huron and Major N.S. Boynton, a civil war veteran became the charter member. In the spring of 1880 a meeting was held in Port Huron followed by one in Buffalo, New York, which created the Union of the Knights of Maccabee organization. Sir Knights Boynton, Stanton and Avery were appointed a committee on laws. It was at this convention that discussion broke out on June 11, 1881 Major Boynton organized the Great Camp of Michigan. The first Great Commander was Arthur Bassett of Detroit. The 2nd Great Commander was A.R. Avery of Port Huron.



liminary meeting had been held at the home of Mrs. Adolph Ward who was the organizer and founder of the Ladies Auxiliary of the Knights of Maccabee for one month when he was named to fill the vacancy of the office of recorder, due to Dr. C. Berger moving to Toledo, Ohio. The unit's record became active and had a membership of 147 at its peak.

At the Great Camp review at Ludington in 1906 Carl Wuerthner was elected a member of the Great Camp as second Master of the Guards and again elected at the Great Camp review in 1908 in Toledo, Ohio.

The Carl Wuerthner Post No. 341 was formed by the merger of the two Manchester units. In 1935 there occurred a vacancy on the Great Camp Board. Carl Wuerthner was appointed to the office of executive committee. He was re-elected at each quadrennial review when in 1954 at the review held in Jackson he was elected Great Lt. Commander, again in 1958 in Detroit and at the review held in Detroit last month again he was named to a four year term.

Mr. Wuerthner has served the various offices of the local unit for 67 years. For 27 years he has been a member of the Great Camp Board. Louis Wolfe, commander of the local unit was a delegate to the review in Detroit last month. The Maccabee picnic association consisting of Jackson, Lenawee, Washtenaw and Hillsdale counties was formed 31 years ago and meets in August each year. This year the meeting will be at Carr Park Sunday, August 9th.

### Speaks at IFYE Program

Mr. and Mrs. Franklin M. Reck returned from Brookings, South Dakota Sunday night where Mr. Reck interviewed the eleven Latin American delegates attending the Rural Youth Leaders' Workshop of the mid-point conference for the IFYE (International Farm Youth Exchange) program. On July 26, Mr. Reck was the afternoon program speaker for the 11th Annual National Alumni Conference of IFYE at Simpson College, Indianola, Iowa. His topic was "Rural Youth Organizations of Latin America." Mr. Reck is editor of Yearbook for Latin American Rural Youth for the Ford Motor Company.

D. P. Markey functioned as Great Commander until 1891 when the order became too large and the responsibility too great for one man to handle. It was through the influence of Major Boynton that D.P. Markey became Supreme Commander of the Maccabees of the world. He held that office for 33 years. Before he retired from the office of Supreme commander he became one of the leading fraternalists of the age and a well known person by every insurance company doing business on the continent. The Ladies of the Maccabees came to life in the city of Muskegon, March 24, 1886. A preliminary

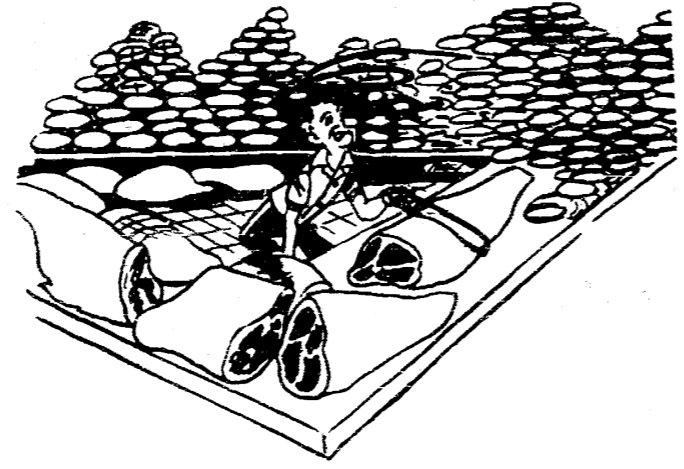

Tentative Changes

Tentative changes in the 1962-1963 junior high curriculum have been announced by Mr. Ted Tapping, Supervising Principal. For the first time a few elective courses will probably be offered to eighth graders. Plans would permit most junior high students to choose one (or possibly two) of the following experimental courses: General Music, Survey of American and English Literature, General Orientation to Foreign Languages.

Also being prepared for distribution this fall is a Manchester Junior High Handbook. It will be relatively brief, but will form the basis for a more permanent type handbook in future years.

Continuing with announced plans for the junior high, Mr. Tapping states that parent-teacher conferences will be held twice during the school year. These will be evening conferences, the dates of which will be found in the new 1962-1963 P.A. School Events and Memorial Yearbook which will go on sale during the Manchester Community Fair.

These changes will mean that all seventh and eighth graders will be required to come to school for a re-registration before classes begin on September 4. Dates and times of this will be announced in the future. Failure to pre-register will mean students may not have the choice of any electives, and will probably spend a lot of time unnecessarily just sitting, waiting to be registered the last day of school.

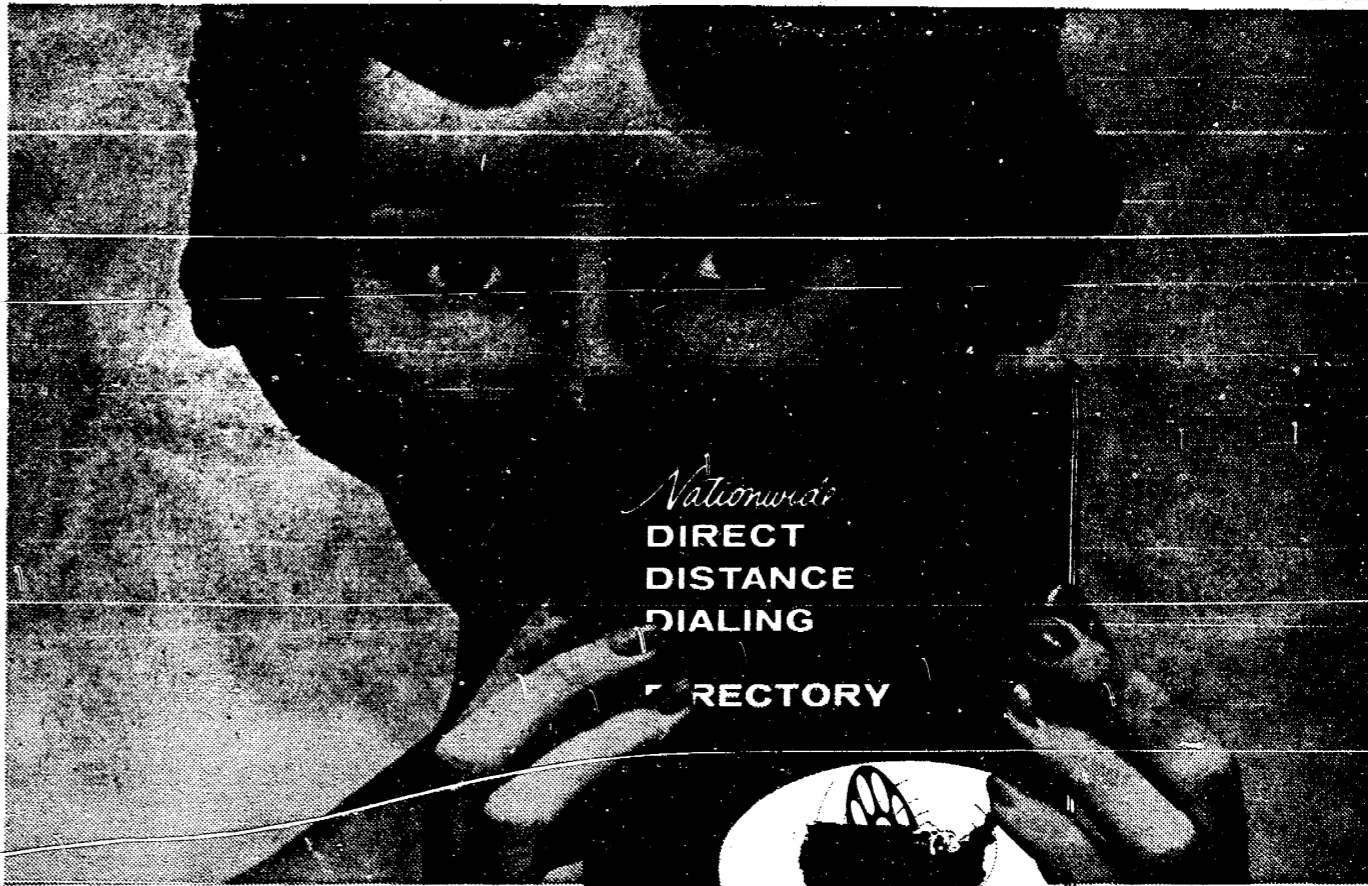

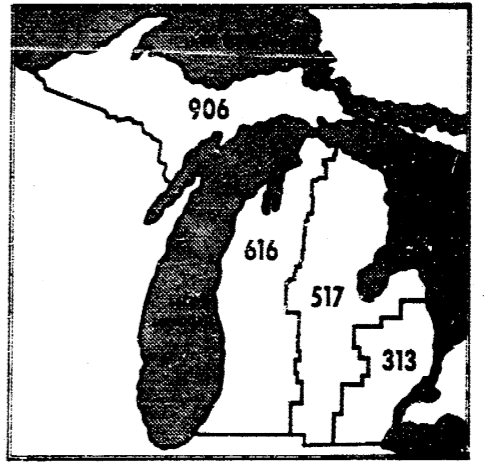

**Baked Beans for the Crowd**  
 Whether the jovial, hungry group has just returned from a beach outing, ball game or tour, they'll enjoy any summer-time snack that's spiced with very Baked Beans prepared in this special way. Here's how to give baked beans from the oven an all-time favorite complement to hot dogs, hamburgers or sizzling steak—that extra flavor appeal:

**SAVORY BAKED BEANS**  
 2 cans (1 lb. 12 oz. each) baked beans  
 1 cup catsup  
 1/2 Tbsp. Worcestershire  
 4 Tbsp. brown sugar  
 1 Tsp. dry mustard  
 1 or 2 dashes of Tabasco  
 1 large onion, very thinly sliced  
 Combine catsup, L&P Worcestershire, brown sugar, lemon juice, mustard and Tabasco. Turn 1 can of beans into 2 quart casserole. Cover with hot sliced onion and pour over hot sauce. Add the other can of beans, the rest of the onion, and the sauce. Cover and bake in slow oven (300°) for 3 hours. (Serves 6 to 8)







**DOLLAR and SENSE FARMING.**  
CAUTION 2-4-D USE cannot be over-stressed. Any damage caused by drift makes you liable and under unfavorable conditions drift can carry a mile or more. Crops such as soybeans and tomatoes are extremely susceptible to damage. To avoid drift damage danger use amine forms of 2-4-D keep pressure under 30 pounds per square inch and spray only when wind is below 10 m.p.h. When temperatures climb to 80 degrees or higher turbulence develops that can carry particles high in the air.  
HOW MUCH SHOULD YOU PAY for a beef bull? When getting a purebred bull to go on a commercial herd stay within 3 to 5 times the value of an average cow in your herd. If a bull is worth less than 3 times the value of the average cow, he isn't good enough to upgrade your herd. If the price is more than 5 times the value of the average cow, then he probably can't improve the herd enough to justify his cost.  
KEEP YOUR FARM FREE OF RATS. This pest not only causes heavy losses of stored feeds and grain, but also spreads disease among livestock. One disease carried by rats is streptococcus in hogs, probably not fatal, but disease lowers the hogs' resistance and make them more susceptible to other diseases. A good homemade bait can be made by mixing 85% cracked corn and 15% salsol oil with sugar and Warfarin.  
SILAGE QUALITY can't be better than the crop from which it's made but the use of a hay conditioner in harvesting grass-legumes for silage can help you keep quality. Crimped, bruised or crushed hay crops ferment into better silage, and do it quicker than conditioned forage.

Mrs. Caroline Bruns celebrated her 102nd birthday, August 3 at the Washtenaw County hospital where she had lived for over a year. When asked what is the secret of living such a long life she said, "It might be hard work." It was in 1952 that she decided that she was getting too old to work any more.

She was born August 3, 1860 in Schalla, Germany, the daughter of Bernard and Anna Elsie Kuhl. She came to the United States with her family in 1884 and on November 11, 1888 she married Lewis Bruns at Green Garden, Illinois.

They moved to a farm in Sharon township on New Years Day, 1890. Her husband died in 1907. In 1920 following the death of her father she moved to 223 Riverside Drive in Manchester and soon became a familiar figure. Neighbors knew her for her unfailing warmth and good humor and for her music. She could be heard for many hours of the day or night playing her organ and singing German hymns.

She was known to everyone as "Grandma Bruns." She lived alone, without "modern" conveniences and raised a small garden every year, until September 26, 1957. It was then that she fell while adjusting a window shade. She moved to a convalescent home in Tecumseh, not because of poor health but it was feared that she might not be so lucky if she fell again.
