1962 - 1963 SCHOOL YEAR BEGINS

The 1962-63 school year will officially begin Tuesday Sept. 4. There will be no classes Tuesday morning. School will be called at 1:30 p.m. for the purpose of organizing classes and orienting students. Kindergarten will begin Wednesday for both morning and afternoon classes. There will be no school Friday, Sept. 7. The bus routes will be comparable to last year. Tuesday Sept. 4, 1 p.m. will replace 8 a.m. on the full day schedule. School officials ask that the children be ready and out by the road at least five minutes ahead of last year's scheduled time for the first few days.

Supt. Robert Masten notes that there are more rural kindergarten pupils again this year than from the village.

All village children will attend school in the afternoon. The rural afternoon attendance will consist of all kindergarten students on and east of Schleiweis road and on south of Bemis road. These children will be picked up and transported to school during the noon hour. They will ride the regular busses in the morning and will be transported home during the noon hour.

It will be necessary for only those students new to the district to register before school. This may be done by calling GA8-2341 or dropping into Mr. Tapping's office before school begins. All grades were split into sections before school was out this spring. These sections are indiscriminately assigned to teachers in the near future. All classes will be posted outside of the respective room for the first day of school.

There are fees to cover the workbooks and repair of textbooks from kindergarten through eighth. The hard bound text books are furnished by the district.

Kindergarten students pay \$1.50 and first through sixth grade pay \$3.75. Junior high school fees include an extra amount for lockers, towels, and home economics. Seventh and eighth grade boys pay \$6.25 and eighth grade girls pay \$6.75.

The high school book store is now open and new books are sold on a cash basis. The school handles only new books. All checks are to be made payable to the Manchester Public Schools. Elementary school fees should be paid separately for each child.

All students renting musical instruments on the rent purchase plan will be required to pay rent on a semester basis. This rent will be due for the first semester when school begins. All boys who were member of the safety patrol last year and desire to serve again this year should pick up their equipment in Mr. Tapping's office before the beginning of school. School accident insurance may be purchased the first week of school for a fee of \$1.50 for kindergarten through sixth and for \$2.00 for seventh through twelfth grades. Twenty-four hour insurance is available for \$10.00. All students participating in athletics will be required to have insurance.

High school football players must carry special insurance which will cost them four dollars plus insurance.

COUNTY HEALTH EDUCATOR NAMED

Mrs. Betty Owens, 27, of Lexington, Ky., will begin her duties as county health educator Sept. 4. Dr. Otto Engelke, director of the county Health Department, has announced.

Mrs. Owens has just completed a master's degree in public health at the University of North Carolina. Prior to earning this degree she was a health educator for the division of alcoholism in the Kentucky State Department of Health for one year.

She holds a bachelor's degree from the University of Kentucky and attended the Yale Summer School of Alcohol Studies. She has taught in San Diego, Calif., and Louisville, Ky.

Her husband will enter the U-M as a graduate in the Institute of Public Administration. The health educator will write scripts for the department's weekly news releases and radio programs, address groups, conduct educational programs at public health clinics and with voluntary agencies, and conduct tuberculosis chest X-rays.

She will also be in charge of the field training experiences of public health students and of the in-service training program for the department staff.

Mrs. Owens succeeds Howard Hilton, who left the post for a position with the U.S. Public Health Service. Hilton, who resigned Feb. 1, had been county health educator since 1954.

DR. ALBERT HEUSTIS SEEKS POLIO BAN

Dr. Albert E. Heustis, state health commissioner made a strong recommendation to the state health department that oral polio vaccine should not be used in Michigan.

He also advised against plans for its use in the future.

Heustis, taking issue with Dr. Luther Terry, surgeon general of the U.S. Public Health Service, said there have been two cases of type three paralytic poliomyelitis which occurred following the use of the oral vaccine in Michigan. Heustis said the two cases occurred among 100,000 persons who took the oral vaccine, while only three cases were reported among the 7,800,000 persons who did not receive it. He added that there was also some question about the accuracy of the diagnosis of one of three incidents of polio.

Twelve New Teachers Added To Staff

Twelve new teachers have been added to the staff of the Manchester school system, with one teacher still to be hired. At present there is no teacher for the science department to replace John Galbreath, who has accepted a position to teach in Central America, according to Superintendent of Schools, Robert Masten.

The new teachers include Mrs. Marvel Trolz. She replaces Patricia Troester. Last year Mrs. Trolz taught in Jackson Northwest. Prior to that time she taught here for five years. She will teach second grade in the Nellie Ackerson School.

Mrs. Janet Lodge will teach third and fourth grade in the Pleasant Lake School. She has been teaching at Fremont, Long Island, N. Y. and is replacing Mrs. Helen Gross at the Pleasant Lake School. Mrs. Gross is retiring.

Phyllis Coward, who has been teaching at Montreal, Ontario, Canada, will be teaching fourth and fifth grade at the Pleasant Lake School. She replaces Dorothy Fitzpatrick.

Judith Butters will replace Mrs. Helen Thrall as a sixth grade teacher. Miss Butters is a graduate of the U-M. Deloris Dahl will be the junior High School language and girls' physical education teacher. She replaces Nola Boughton. Miss Dahl has her Master's degree from Hartford Conn. Seminary in religious education. Last year she taught in Ann Arbor.

Michael Bazany of Grand Haven will be the Junior High Math and physical education teacher and will be assistant football and baseball coach. Mr. Bazany will replace Fred Brown who went to Mesck where he will be high school principal.

Jo Ellen Orcutt will teach language orientation and junior high English. She is a graduate of Delaware University and is replacing Barbara Baker.

Mrs. Michael (Elizabeth) Bazany, a June graduate of the University of Michigan, whose home is in Owosso, will replace Mrs. Ira Jump, as high school social studies and girls' physical education teacher. The Bazany's will live in Manchester at the J.R. Jones house on North Union Street.

Leonard England of Ann Arbor will teach High School Industrial Arts. He has a Master's degree from the U-M. He taught in the Upper Peninsula and will replace Ronald McNally who will be teaching in the local school system in the physical education department. Darrell Harper will be assistant football coach at Southfield. He formerly was in the physical education department.

Edna Laughrey is an additional teacher in the local school system. She will be teaching high school English and will have the school newspaper. She taught at St. Claire Shores last year.

Maynard Blossom, who received his master's degree from Michigan State will be the vocational agricultural teacher here. Last year he taught at Cheboygan and Sparta and replaces Ira Jump who will teach in Milan. Dewey Smith will teach high school biology, social studies and coach football. He was at Lake City for the last three years and is replacing Bill Baker.

"Beginning at the South quarter post of section 6, thence East 12.10 chains in the South line of said section; thence Northwesterly to a point in the North and South quarter line; thence South 641.45 feet in the North and South quarter line to the place of beginning; being that part of the West half of the Southeast quarter of Section 6 lying South of the highway."

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the Township Clerk publish this amendment within ten (10) days after its adoption, in the Manchester Enterprise a newspaper of general circulation in Bridgewater Township, and that said amendment shall thereupon become immediately effective.

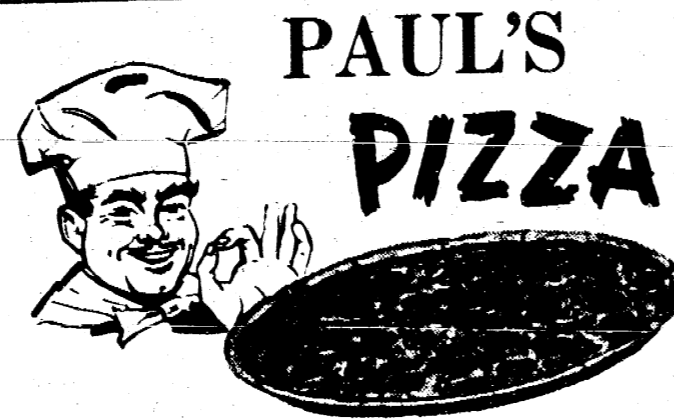

Wool Referendum Ballot

Ballots for voting in the referendum on the lamb and wool promotion and market development program will be mailed between Sept. 4 and 7 to producers in Washtenaw County, according to Max Kalmbach, chairman of Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation County Committee.

The referendum will determine whether or not deductions will continue to be made from producer payments earned under the wool incentive program. Funds collected are used by the American Sheep Producers Council to carry out a program of advertising, promotion, and related activities under an agreement with the secretary of Agriculture.

Producers may vote in the referendum during the period from Sept. 10 through Sept. 21. The period for voting will last 2 weeks in order to encourage participating in the referendum by as large a number of sheep producers as possible. Preliminary referendum results will be announced late in September.

Producers who are eligible to vote in the referendum are all those who have owned sheep or lambs, 6 months of age or older, for any one period of at least 30 days since January 1, 1962. Each producer will report the number of sheep and lambs on his ballot.

Chairman Kalmbach urges any producer who believes he is eligible to vote and who does not receive a ballot by Sept. 10 to get in touch with his ASCS county office. To be counted, the ballots must be received by the office not later than Sept. 21.

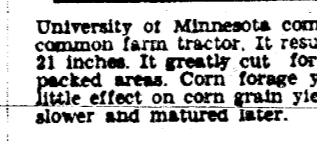

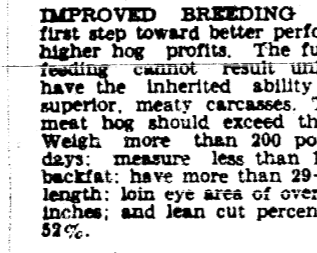

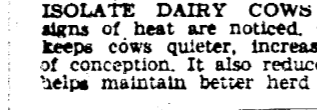
WILL YOU BE FARMING IN 1970?
According to economists, capital requirements to operate a commercial farm will no longer be a birth right, but will belong to those with financial backing, the training and drive to get the job done. Farmers of the future should specialize in managerial ability and technical know-how. Farm records, tax accounting, financial administration and basic biological sciences cannot be stressed too much.



SOIL COMPACTION becomes a greater problem as size and weight of tractors increase. Using a special tractor wheel, soil specialists at the University of Minnesota compacted soil equal to 10 years of using the common farm tractor. It resulted in compaction of the soil to a depth of 21 inches. It greatly cut forage yields of oats-alfalfa compared to un-packed areas. Corn forage yields were sharply reduced, but there was little effect on corn grain yields. However, corn in the packed area grew slower and matured later.



IMPROVED BREEDING is the first step toward better performance and higher hog profits. The full effects of feeding cannot result unless animals have the inherited ability to produce superior meat carcasses. The genuine meat hog should exceed the following: Weigh more than 200 pounds in 180 days; measure less than 1.5 inches of backfat; have more than 29-inch carcass length; loin eye area of over four square inches; and lean cut percentage of over 52%.

Social Security News

Many people who keep working after they become 65 can get monthly social security checks despite their earnings. Working people over 65 should visit their nearest social security office to see if they are eligible for benefits, the Social Security Administration urges.

Many people do not receive their social security benefits simply because they fail to apply for them, the social Security Administration says. Applications for benefits are retroactive for only 12 months, so people who are eligible for back payments lose a month's payments for every month they delay filing.

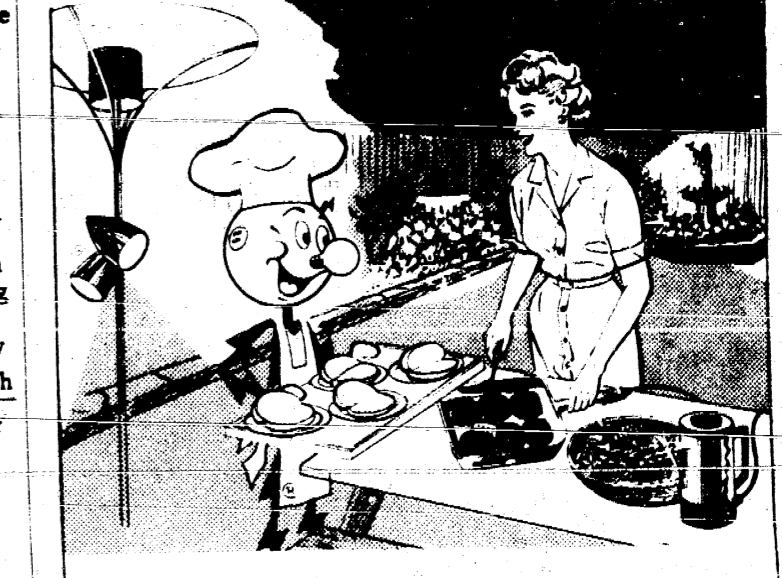

Cystic Fibrosis Drive Gets Underway

Washtenaw County Chapter of the Cystic Fibrosis Research Foundation is mailing information about the disease and soliciting contributions as its share in the national drive to aid the many children afflicted with this disease.

Allen Luckhardt, Manchester village president has proclaimed this as Cystic Fibrosis Week and asks that everyone help medical research conquer this inherited disease of babies and children.

This second annual Cystic Fibrosis Drive is under the county chairmanship of Mrs. Robert Starling of Saline. A mailing of 10,000 direct mail appeals to the people of the County is now underway. Donors are being asked to enclose donations in the return envelope in this part of the appeal.

Also included in the drive will be a benefit dance at the Saline American Legion hall Saturday, September 8, with music furnished by the Rhythmairs. The public is invited and tickets may be obtained locally from Hollis Walker.

A number of "CF coffee hours" have been scheduled in area homes during the week of the drive and later in September to help raise funds.

Cystic fibrosis, Mrs. Starling explained, is a childhood disease for which there is at present no known preventative or cure. Funds from the CF drive are directed into the necessary research to learn more about this often-fatal disease and to find a treatment for those children now afflicted.

Approximately 25 per cent of the funds collected are retained by the local chapter of the organization for research by the local chapter.

The national organization recently gave a grant of \$16,000 to the University Medical Center for research into the disease. The seven day program is endorsed locally by Manchester village president, Allen Luckhardt. Others working in the area are Mrs. Richard Wany of Saline and Stanley Montange of Chelsea.

First Day School Enrollment Top Record

A total of 1043 students were enrolled the first day of school as full time students in the Manchester Public schools on Tuesday. This is a slight increase over last year's figure.

Built to house three hundred students, the high school has almost gained the goal with a record enrollment of 290.

Pleasant Lake School, which houses kindergarten through grade five, and special education reported 135 students.

Manchester kindergarten and grade 5 unit, The Nellie Ackerson School, reported an enrollment of 395.

The Junior high school enrolled 223.

Superintendent Robert Masten reported that the only problem existing is the size of the Third and Fourth grades. Each section has about thirty-five students, which is too large for a teacher who wishes to work with individual students. He states that this problem will be investigated and improved if possible.
