Dr. Karl Wright of the Agricultural Dept. will also be a part of the team. He has been making some detailed studies of the costs in feeding cattle and hogs. His study has revealed some extremely interesting facts, which will interest all feeders.

Cystic Fibrosis Drive Gets Underway

Washtenaw County Chapter of the Cystic Fibrosis Research Foundation is mailing information about the disease and soliciting contributions as its share in the national drive to aid the many children afflicted with this disease.

Allen Luckhardt, Manchester village president has proclaimed this as Cystic Fibrosis Week and asks that everyone help medical research conquer this inherited disease of babies and children.

This second annual Cystic Fibrosis Drive is under the county chairmanship of Mrs. Robert Starling of Saline. A mailing of 10,000 direct mail appeals to the people of the County is now underway. Donors are being asked to enclose donations in the return envelope in this part of the appeal.

Also included in the drive will be a benefit dance at the Saline American Legion hall Saturday, September 8, with music furnished by the Rhythmairs. The public is invited and tickets may be obtained locally from Hollis Walker.

A number of "CF coffee hours" have been scheduled in area homes during the week of the drive and later in September to help raise funds.

Cystic fibrosis, Mrs. Starling, explained, is a childhood disease for which there is at present no known preventative or cure. Funds from the CF drive are directed into the necessary research to learn more about this often-fatal disease and to find a treatment for those children now afflicted.

Approximately 25 per cent of the funds collected are retained by the local chapter of the organization for research by the local chapter.

The national organization recently gave a grant of \$16,000 to the University Medical Center for research into the disease. The seven day program is endorsed locally by Manchester village president, Allen Luckhardt. Others working in the area are Mrs. Richard Warty of Saline and Stanley Montange of Chelsea.

First Day School Enrollment Top Record

A total of 1043 students were enrolled the first day of school as full time students in the Manchester Public schools on Tuesday. This is a slight increase over last year's figure.

Built to house three hundred students, the high school has almost gained the goal with a record enrollment of 290.

Pleasant Lake School, which houses kindergarten through grade five, and special education reported 135 students.

Manchester kindergarten and grade 5 unit, The Nellie Ackerson School, reported an enrollment of 395.

The Junior high school enrolled 223. Superintendent Robert Masten reported that the only problem existing is the size of the Third and Fourth grades. Each section has about thirty-five students, which is too large for a teacher who wishes to work with individual students. He states that this problem will be investigated and improved if possible.

COMMUNITY FUND ANNOUNCES QUOTA

Manchester area Community Fund Board announces a quota of \$8,962 for this year. This is less than 6 per cent increase over the 1961-62 quotas which were raised by the local community in record time.

The dates for the fund raising activity for 47 agencies, including 7 local and 36 in the Michigan United Fund, will be October 11 to Nov. 1.

The study for the quota was made by the budget committee, Louis Vogel, chairman, Ted Tapping, Allen Benedict, Mrs. Ray Tirb and Mrs. Franklin Rick and passed by the board at the July meeting.

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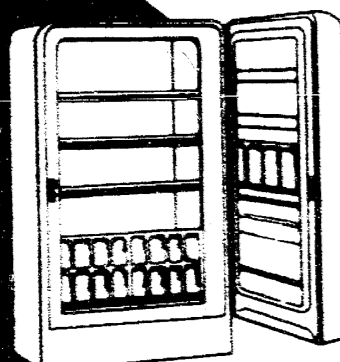
