Re-elected Chairman
Robert T. Ross was re-elected to the Chairmanship of the Detroit Red Cross Chapter at its 53rd annual meeting on Thursday. Mr. and Mrs. Ross live at 1101 Bethel Church Road, Manchester. Mr. Ross has been a member of the Chapter's Board of Directors for eight years, serving on various committees before becoming Chairman of the Executive Committee in 1959, and Chapter Chairman in 1961.

Mr. Ross, Manager of Employee Relations of the Ford Motor Company, is a native Detroit, graduate of Wayne State University, and the Harvard Advanced Management Program. Prior to joining Ford, Mr. Ross was special agent for the Federal Bureau of Investigation for 10 years. Mr. Ross' civic interests include membership on the boards of Industrial Hygiene Foundation of America, the children's Hospital of Michigan, the Rehabilitation Institute of Metropolitan Detroit and the National Safety Council. He is a past president of the Greater Detroit Safety Council and the Michigan Safety Conference. As Chairman of the Detroit Red Cross Chapter, Mr. Ross heads a group of more than 7,000 volunteers who last year gave more than 347,350 recorded hours of service through the Detroit Red Cross Chapter. At the annual meeting General Alfred M. Gruenther, president of the American Red Cross spoke to an audience of 950 persons gathered in Detroit's Cobo Hall. Mr. Ross presided at the business meeting at which the election of officers took place.

New Buses
At recent school board meetings it was decided to purchase two small buses to be used in the school transportation program. Bids were received in August for a small bus to seat 16 or more passengers. This vehicle was necessary to replace the 1956 panel, which is rusted and does not have the pupil capacity needed. This bus is to be used for noon kindergarten and special education transportation to Chelsea. Bids were received as follows: Tirt Chevrolet-Step Van Conversion 16 passenger \$3,975; Marshall Schabile-Conventional 24 passenger bus \$4,430; Tecumseh Equipment-Metro 16 passenger \$4,100; Tirt Chevrolet-Conventional 24 passenger \$4,304. After due consideration the Board purchased the 24 passenger Chevrolet bus.

At a recent meeting the board authorized the transporting of special education children to Ann Arbor from Manchester, Chelsea and Dexter districts. The cost of this program is to be totally reimbursed by County and State grants. Bids were taken on a station wagon to be used for this purpose. The following bids were received: Marshall-Schabile (9 passenger Country Sedan \$2,400); Tirt Chevrolet (9 passenger Station Wagon) \$2,274; and Marshall-Schabile (8 passenger Ranch Wagon) \$2,168.

The board of education accepted the Ranch wagon bid from Marshall-Schabile.

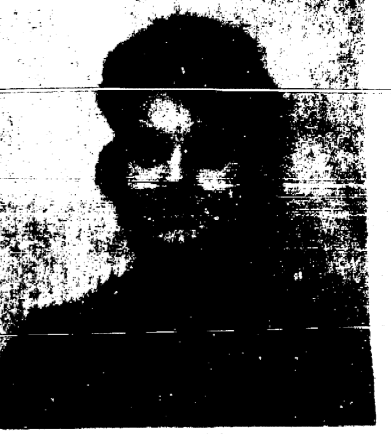
K of C Install Officers

The board of education, faced with an over population of third and fourth grade students, decided at the September meeting to break up the combination grades at Pleasant Lake for the remainder of the year. This means transporting Pleasant Lake fifth graders to town where a room is available, and the hiring of a new fifth grade teacher for this new room. Parents of children attending over crowded third grades in town were then asked to volunteer transferring to a small third grade section remaining at Pleasant Lake. As of Monday there were only four volunteers. This has not done too much to alleviate the crowded third grade at the Nellie Ackerson School. Mrs. Jane Taylor who lives and has taught in Ann Arbor is the new fifth grade teacher.

ANNUAL SCHOOL REPORT 1961-62

The school enrollment the fourth Friday in September 1031 children. There was a loss of five children during the year leaving the final school enrollment at 1025.

The average daily attendance was 973 giving a 95% attendance figure. Children were in school a total of 173 days. There were eleven legal holidays and school closings giving the total of 184 membership days.

There was total of 45 teachers and three administrators. Only two members of the professional staff lacked college degrees.

During the summer several maintenance programs were completed, the largest being the rebuilding of locker rooms at the Junior High School.

Curriculum wise a Junior High School football program was initiated as well as a full scale Special Education Program in cooperation with the Chelsea and Ann Arbor Public Schools.

Capital outlay consisted mainly in the construction of two special education rooms and adjoining facilities at Pleasant Lake. This was constructed mainly from County funds with a smaller amount being derived from a dormant building and site fund.

New policies were adopted by the Board concerning student activities. The main objectives of these policies were to cut money making activities by students and give adequate time for church programs oriented toward youth.

Seven members of the Citizen's Committee along with the Board members and four teachers worked with the Bureau of School Services during the year. The final product was a complete evaluation of the local school system. This information will be used this year as the citizens of the Community work with school personnel to improve the local school system.

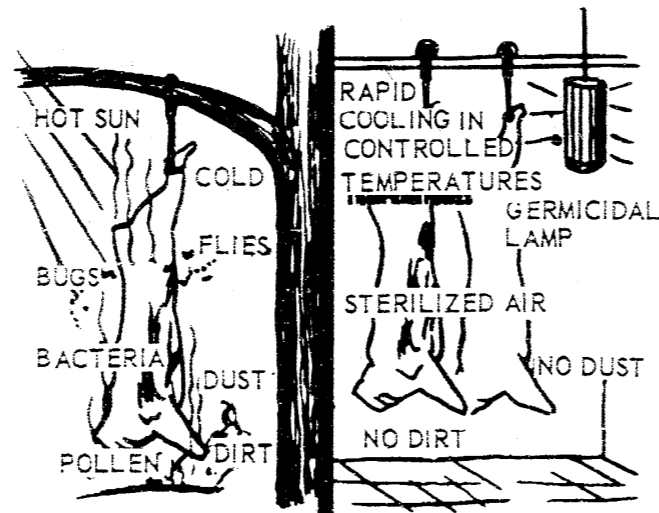

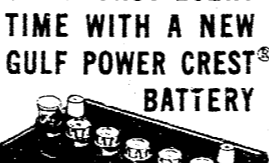

RAIL EXCURSION SET FOR OCT. 7

The steam locomotive, now a memory in most parts of North America, will be the feature of a rail excursion to be operated from Detroit on October 7 by the Michigan Railroad Club.

The rail ramble, featuring team locomotive No. 6167 of the Canadian National Railways, heads out of Detroit for Port Huron under diesel power at 8:15 a.m. Oct. 7. After crossing the border to Sarnia, Ont., by the St. Clair tunnel, the diesel locomotive will be replaced by the steam engine. The Canadian steam locomotive is not licensed to operate over U.S. rail lines.

Ultimate destination of the excursion is Stratford Shakespearean Festival. At Stratford, excursionists will be given a tour of the modern Festival Theatre.

The Canadian portion of the trip will contain several photographic run-pasts for passengers, enabling them to capture on film the glory of the steam locomotive.

Round trip from Detroit is \$12. Children between five and 11 travel at half adult rate. Tickets can be obtained from the Michigan Railroad Club or Grand Trunk Western ticket offices in Detroit.

Control Weeds This Fall

Control weeds this fall, and let Old Man Winter lend a helping hand. Farm specialists at Michigan State University report that farmers can control quackgrass by spraying before mid-October. Yellow rackets and broad-leaved winter annuals can be killed by spraying after one or two good frosts.

The specialists, William Meggett and Milton Erdman, recommend 15 pounds of dalapon per acre to control quack grass. On corn fields, two pounds of amitrole-T or four pounds of atrazine will do the job. Each of these chemicals should be mixed with 30- or 40 gallons of water per acre and sprayed when the quack grass is 4-8 inches tall.

TAX REFUNDS

The treasury has announced that refunds on 1962 personal income taxes may be taken in savings bonds, instead of cash.

The new individual income tax forms for 1962 will include space for the taxpayer to indicate whether his refund should be made payable in series E bonds.

Bonds will be issued in the customary multiples of \$18.75 and sent to the taxpayer with a check for any remaining balance due.

The decision to provide the optional payment of tax refunds in the form of E bonds reflects the favorable responses received from a sample survey of nearly 4,000 taxpayers who received refunds on their payment of 1961 income taxes. The replies indicated a potential demand in the vicinity of one-half billion dollars for savings bonds offered in this way.

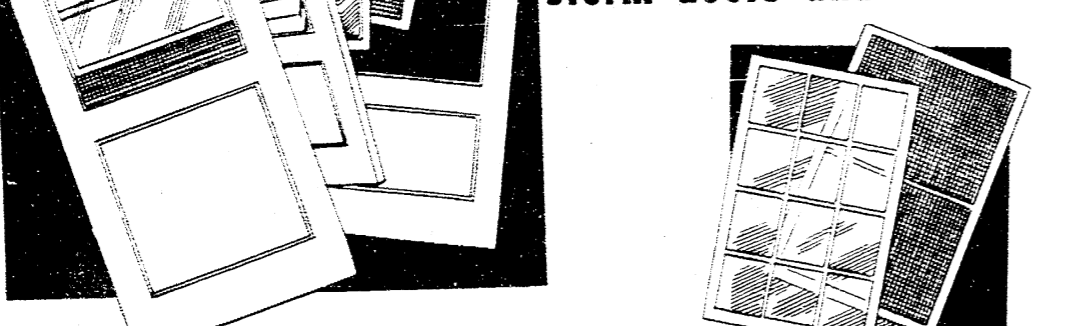

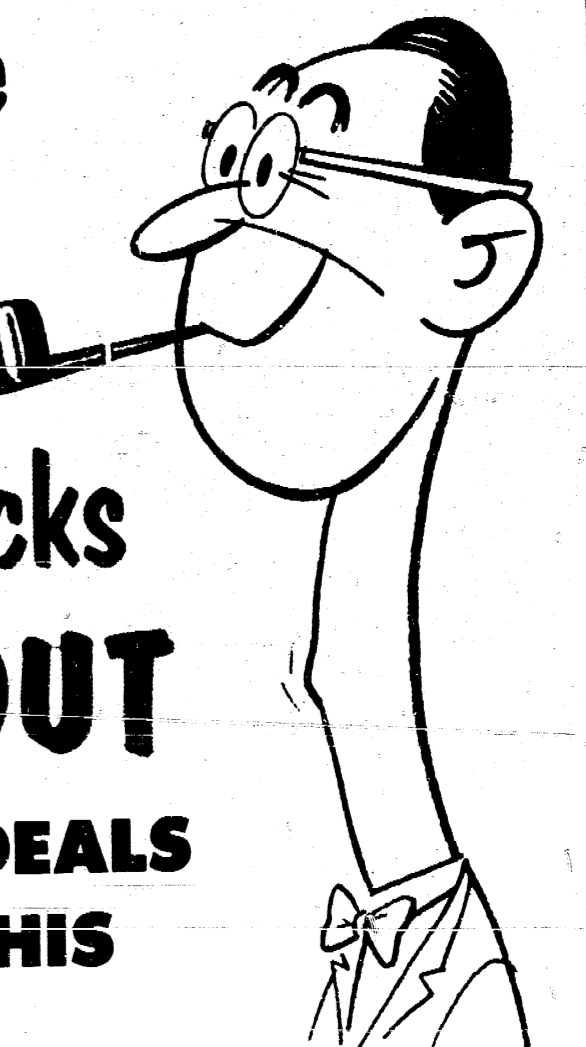

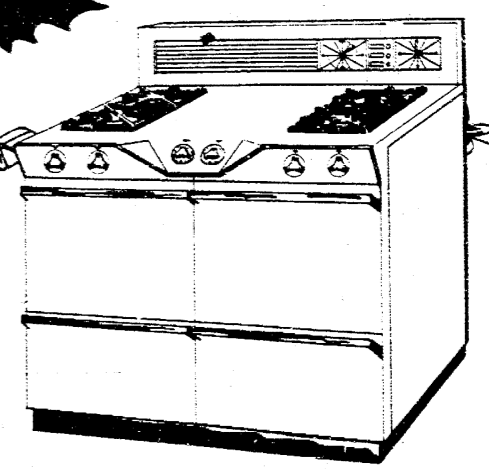
