

Swedish Cookies Are Popular

Delicate flavored cookies are a must in many households at Christmas and Swedish cookies are among the most popular. These decorative crisp cookies can be made in various shapes by using different patterns in a cookie press. For more variety,

sprinkle them with colored sugar, frost or decorate with citrons or candied cherries.

Swedish Cookies
3 cups butter
1 1/2 cups sugar
2 eggs beaten
1 cup almonds, blanched and

ground
8 cups sifted all-purpose flour
Cream butter and sugar together. Add eggs, nuts and flour. Mix well. Run through a cookie press. Place on ungreased baking sheet. Bake in moderate oven (350 degrees F.) for about 5-8 minutes or until delicate brown. This recipe makes about 10 dozen or more cookies, depending on size.

3 Holiday 'H's' Can Be Bested

Her recommendation for a holiday without haste—hurry—hustle and with time for hospitality? It takes a little doing and planning, but is well worth the effort. Here are her suggestions:

- ... Stack the pantry shelf with canned meats for sandwiches and nibblings.
- ... Store extra cheese and dips in the refrigerator.
- ... Add extra boxes of fancy crackers to your usual supply.
- ... Bake some plain and fancy cookies and store them in the refrigerator in closed containers.
- ... Make a dessert that you can freeze or store in refrigerator.

The Great Story

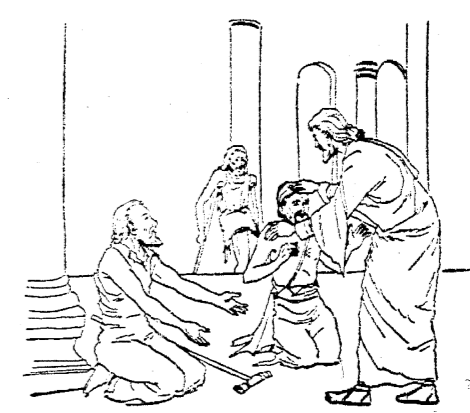

He was born in the simplest of surroundings and led the path as a leader and teacher of men. There had been false prophets and pretenders through the course of time, so the road was not made easy. Through great examples, great teachings, through His great faith and through performance of a few chosen miracles, Jesus Christ gathered about Him true believers, who were to carry the message to the distant corners of every land. "Truly He is the Son of God!"



MANY TIMES in our busy, work-a-day world we hear the cry that "Christmas is too commercial." Certainly, none may deny that there is much that is commercialized. If it is too much, the fault belongs equally to us all. It is not necessary that we work so hard at "keeping up" with the folks across the street or down the block. We need not let our observance of the holiday get out of hand merely because others are unreasonable. Instead, we can work to promote among family and friends a realization of the true and complete meaning of Christmas. If we do this, we place emphasis where it properly belongs. We turn our thoughts and our footsteps to the church by the side of the road; we give thanks that on this day a Saviour was born.

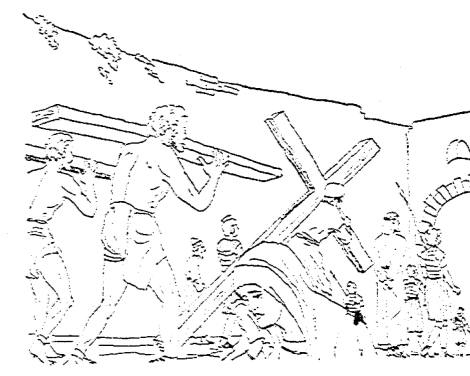
HE CHOSE the quiet, meager atmosphere of a stable. History does not record, but we might safely assume that this stable was not the most pleasant of surroundings. It was a crude shelter for animals and as such certainly not suitable accommodations for human beings. Crowded as Bethlehem was at the time, it is safe to assume that other travelers had turned their backs upon the dank atmosphere of the stable and chose instead the chill of the night air. But the traveler from Galilee was forced to seek some form of shelter for a wife who was with child. Joseph, a carpenter by trade, nonetheless was a proud man. We must wonder how difficult it was for him to be prostrate and accept the fact that poor shelter was better than no shelter at all.



AND EVEN unto this day there are disbelievers. It is true that He came to save all mankind, yet His legacy provides nothing more than opportunity. Each man is granted the right to seek out eternal salvation; but there are no provisions to insure that every individual make the effort. Each man must build his own bridges along the pathway of life. For those who would follow in His footsteps, there is no stronger working tool than faith. During His life upon earth, Jesus Christ many times was beseeched by the sick and the lame and the blind to perform miracles and make them "whole." Time and time again, He would ask one question: "Do you have faith?" When there is faith, and only then, is the miracle possible.



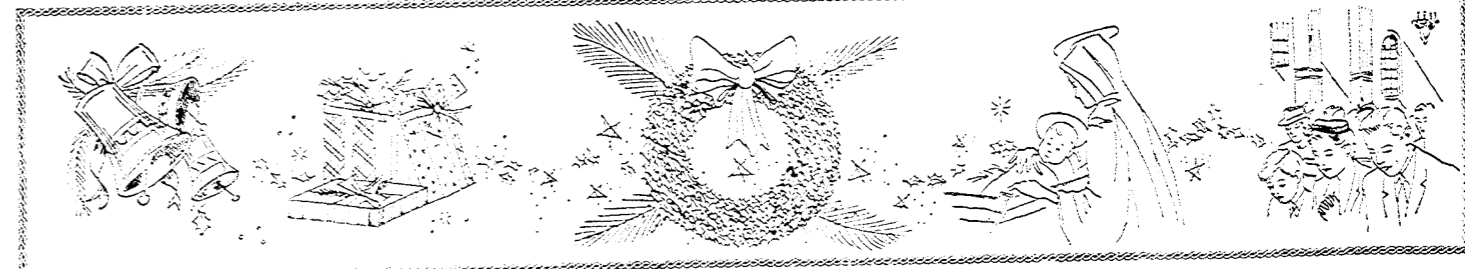
SHEPHERDS came down from the hillside, where an angel had appeared to tell them of the great happening at Bethlehem. Seeing their simple gifts, these humble men came to kneel in the shadows of the quiet stable, side by side with the three kings from the East. As the magic star had guided the kings across many lands, the messenger of God appeared on the near hillside and instructed men of simple faith to come forth and acknowledge the birth of the Saviour. And, this is right, for He is the King of kings and the King of men; He is the King of the near and the King of the far. Generations as yet unborn shall be amazed at the vastness of His kingdom.



RARELY do we find in the writings since that time reference to the fact that the stable was dirty and unclean. Instead, the manger seems that have become so popular depict the stable always clean and beautiful. This is quite proper, for it is all so true that the greatness of the event which took place is such that there is room for no more than beauty in the eyes of the beholder. The previous few years showed in the Miracle of Bethlehem were made to realize the momentous event that clothes and laid in a manger! was such a glorious sight to behold that an ethereal beauty touched the whole surroundings. The dirt, unkept stable, because it was the only shelter available to the weary travelers, was transformed into a holy piece of ground.

THERE IS one most impressive fact to consider when we think about the Story of Christmas. Let us call it the importance—or the sacredness—of truth. It is not surprising that a story so old, so oft-repeated, and many times translated from tongue to tongue continues to remain the same! Centuries of selling and retelling have not altered the simple story of the birth of the Saviour. The customs and traditions associated with the observance of Christmas may change with the times, often differ greatly from one country to another; yet the Story of Christmas is forever the same. It needs no embellishment. In humble surroundings Jesus Christ was born unto the world. Until He died on the Cross of Calvary, His life upon earth was one of humility, faith, obedience and highest example.

SO NOW AGAIN it is the season of Christmas. The Story of Bethlehem will be told and re-told, in mansions and in cabins, by the open fire and in the quiet hush of a child's room. And, certainly, the real meaning of the Christmas Story will touch many hearts for the first time. For as many as believe, there will be special meaning in the merry lights, the bright tinsel, and the outward trappings we have come to know so well—for these shall share in realization and appreciation of the fact that on this day God sent His only Son to save the world.

FORMER MANCHESTER PASTOR DIES

Funeral services for the Rev. Henry S. von Rague, 77, were held Saturday at St. Joseph, Michigan.

The Rev. von Rague was pastor of Emanuel Evangelical and Reformed Church of Manchester for 21 years. He died last week Thursday at St. Joseph.

He was born February 5, 1885 at Quincy, Ill. He attended high school at Belleville, Ill., and studied theology at Edan Seminary in St. Louis, Mo. and at Halle University in Halle, Germany.

He was ordained in 1907 to the ministry. He married Martha Ziegler at Oldenburg, Germany in 1909. She preceded him in death.

He served several pastorates in Germany and the United States before coming to Manchester on June 15, 1929. He retired in December of 1960.

The Rev. von Rague is survived by two sons, Dr. Paul von Rague of Benton Harbor and Louis von Rague of South Bend, Ind., and four granddaughters. He was preceded in death by one son, Capt. Karl von Rague.

An additional short memorial service was incorporated in the regular service at the Emanuel Evangelical and Reformed church on Sunday. Burial was at St. Joseph, Mich.

Members of the Manchester church have started a memorial fund in the Rev. von Rague's name to aid young men and women planning theological studies.

POLICE CHIEF WARNS MOTORISTS

Year-end partying, gaiety and social activity should be tempered with reasonable caution, otherwise they may be unexpectedly tempered with tragedy, Chief of Police, Jules VanDeGinste warned today.

He said that the surest way to put a stop to fun is to have a traffic accident. "What could be worse than to have a family get-together end perhaps in a permanent family separation?" he asked.

New Years holidays are frequently marred by traffic accidents for a number of reasons, he observed.

"First, the fact that families and friends like to get together at times like this means there'll be a lot of traffic on the highways.

"The urge to hold family reunions and parties is so great in most of us that we usually won't let a little thing like a snowstorm stop us. A good car with snow tires and optional safety equipment in good operating condition and ready for use if necessary, windshield wipers checked for adequate pressure and live blade condition; flares, warm clothing, tire chains in the trunk and ready, and sense enough to stop overnight if conditions are too bad."

"Sometimes a man lets the spirit of the occasion get the upper hand," he said. "Surveys show 55 per cent of Christmas season fatal accidents have involved drivers who had been drinking."

The chief said the department doesn't buy the theory that a few under the belt makes a man a better driver. There are a lot of ways to wish people a happy new year and I believe all honest citizens will appreciate what we are trying to do," the chief concluded.
