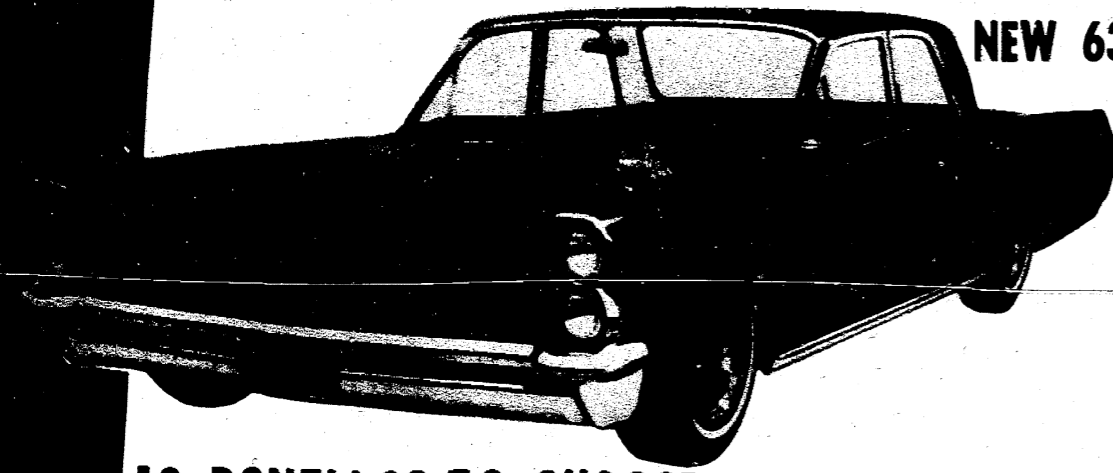

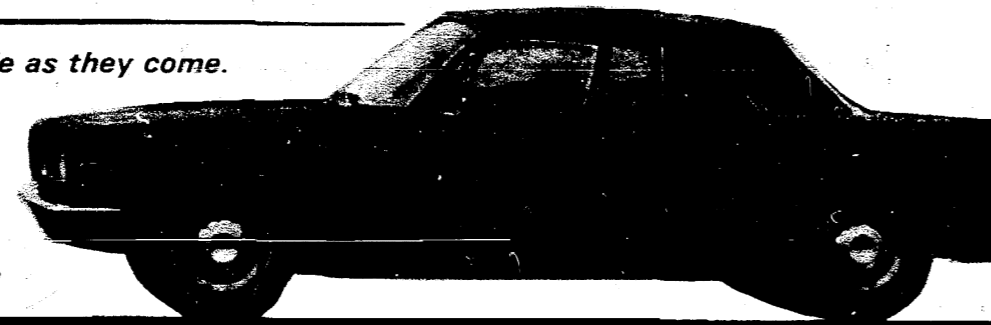

### Steer Penned After 2 Months Freedom

His roaming days are over. The renegade steer who abandoned a life of ease last December 1 for the open spaces is back at the Willard Mann farm at 10950 Chelsea Road. He made his escape from the farm as he was being unloaded.

Farmers in the area had been keeping a close watch on the bum steer for the past week and young Jim Mann, for whom the roamer was bought went back into the fields every week to see if he could find the outlaw.

But for the last week he had been seen or tracked each day as he made his way along the Raisin River up to the Finn Olsen farm field where he enjoyed picking his living for the past two months.

Jesse Walker, a farmer in the area who had been watching the steer enlisted John Rodriguez and his son Roy from Tecumseh to help in the round-up. Rodriguez, a horse trainer, rode his horse and with the help of their very exceptional dog, Walker, young Mann and another man from Tecumseh staged the capture.

The steer had been spending nights in a dense field of underbrush where farmers said he led a very comfortable existence, shielded from wind and snow.

With a lasso, Rodriguez, riding his horse, dropped a noose around the wild critter's neck and after quite a struggle brought him home. The capture took about three hours.

When farmer Walker asked young Mann if he had a place to put the animal, the steer club member said gingerly, "I've had a place to put him for two months. The trainer collected the \$25 reward."

Mr. Mann said that although the steer had been on its own they didn't believe it had lost any weight. It is impossible to tell at this time whether or not they will be able to tame the steer. Thirty-eight steers are being raised by boys and girls in the Manchester area as a steer club project sponsored by the Optimist Club here.

Mrs. John Wiedman will observe her 97th birthday Tuesday, Feb. 12 at her home at 627 West Main St. A family dinner is being planned in her honor.

She enjoys surprisingly good health, is very alert and takes a keen interest in current events.

Born in Freedom township she is the daughter of Daniel and Christina Hieber, and the last of a family of seven children born to them.

She was married to John Wiedman in February 1885 and the couple set up housekeeping in Franklin township where her husband had a 100 acre farm. The couple had eight children; five girls and three boys. They are: Lydia at home; Mrs. Reuben (Martha) Feldkamp, Ann Arbor; Mrs. Aaron (Carrie) Breitenwischer and Mrs. Frank (Alma) Tirb, of Manchester.

Whenever, because of illness or the weather it was necessary to stay at home, my husband would read from the Bible and also give a sermon to the family. The children would much rather get in the buggy or surrey and head for Manchester. I'll never forget the time that our horse

### DOLLAR and SENSE FARMING.

**APPLY LIME SOON.** Take soil tests and get lime down while trucks can still get over the ground. Your crop yields may suffer from soil acidity unless limestone is applied. To get best results from fertilizer, soil pH should be in the range of 6.5 to 7.0. To get as much benefit from the lime this season as possible make sure the limestone isn't too coarse. At least 50% should pass through a 60 mesh screen.

**KEEP POULTRY HOUSE LITTER DRY.** The improper management of poultry litter can result in poor flock performance. Litter is constantly taking on and giving off water. It may come from bird excretions, spillage from fountains, or from condensation from walls and roof. Moisture can be removed from litter by proper ventilation and movement of air through the house. Litter should be deep enough to properly serve as a regulator of the moisture on the floor of the house. For best results it should be about a 4 inch deep.

**BASE GRAIN RATION** for dairy cows on the quality of hay in the snow. There's a big difference in the feed value of hay based on its quality. Feeding tests indicate that it takes more than twice the normal amount of grain when feeding poor quality hay to prevent severe drops in milk flow. If you're running low on hay it will pay you to buy good quality. Generally you can afford to pay up to 2/3 as much for a ton of high quality hay as you pay for a ton of grain.

**SOCIAL SECURITY TAXES ARE UP AGAIN.** This year you must withhold 3.5% per cent of an employee's wages. This amount must be matched by the employer and deposited after a total of \$100 has been collected. Multiply 0.8625 times the employee's wage to get the correct amount to withhold.

### TO BE SCOUT EXECUTIVE IN WASHTENAW COUNTY

The man Portage Trails Council executive Joe A. Juncker is replacing in New Jersey will be coming to Washtenaw county.

Clarence Doud, Union Council Boy Scout executive in Elizabeth, N. J. will become this area's chief Scout executive effective March 1.

The announcement was made by Jack R. Doidge, board president of the Portage Trails Council, which oversees activities of 5,000 youths and 1,800 Scout leaders in Washtenaw and Livingston counties.

Juncker will simultaneously become executive of the Elizabeth organization. Doud, a former Navy lieutenant commander, has been a professional Scout since 1934, serving in five major Scouting posts.

They are Union Council executive, 1957 to present; Jersey City executive, 1950 to 1957; deputy executive of Region II (New York, New Jersey and Puerto Rico), 1945-50; Rutherford N.J., executive, 1936-1942; and assistant Middletown, N.Y., executive, 1934-1936.

Doud was a Navy officer during World War II, serving in communications and with an amphibious unit in the Pacific.

Doidge cited Doud as the person who raised \$150,000 for purchase of land and development of a new summer camp for the Hudson Council in the Jersey City area.

At Rutherford, Doud's work led to tripling of camp attendance in six years, and Doidge said that Doud had a "better than average camping record at Jersey City and Elizabeth."

He said that Doud's record establishes the new executive increased the Scout budget in Rutherford

from \$11,000 to \$38,000 in seven years, hiked the Hudson Council's budget from \$4,400 to \$18,000 in six years and boosted the Union Council's sustaining membership from \$7,600 to \$18,000.

Doud was graduated from the Wharton School of Finance and Commerce, University of Pennsylvania, where he concentrated in industrial management.

well worn prayer book of which she spoke.  
"I was thinking at Christmas time as I looked at the gayly decorated trees of my grandchildren and great-grandchildren that times surely have changed. I have 11 grandchildren and 10 great-grandchildren. I believe that we nearly always had a Christmas tree that was an old German custom. We never hung up our stockings.  
"Stuck candy, apples, different kinds of cookies and...  
"In the summer it seemed I was always getting meals. The men had an early breakfast, then there was a lunch to take to the fields in the mid morning and another in the afternoon. I don't mean a cup of coffee and a cookie either. Something substantial like meat, homemade bread, maybe fresh radishes or pickles—that kind of food. We made pretzels, my own mother made beautiful pretzels for weddings etc. One thing was important, the wood ash had to be very clean for pretzels and when we were burning wood to save ash for lye he had to be careful not to throw just anything in the fire.  
"I always churned and put the butter in 20 pound wooden tubs. If there wouldn't be enough to fill the tub, the butter was put into 2-pound rolls. The butter always bought what ever we needed from the store when we went to town.

was frightened when a grey horse was sleeping along the roadside. Both horses started to run, the surrey tipped over but my husband managed to keep hold of the reins and they didn't run away. No one was hurt. "I always had my own horse and buggy, for there were always things I had to do around the farm. I enjoyed driving them too. My husband never drove a car. The boys did. But John thought they were pretty much of a luxury. "We moved to a farm just south of Manchester in 1902. My daughter Carrie and her husband live there now. When Mr. Wiedman retired in 1920 we moved to our present home. My daughter and I don't need such a large home, 12 rooms, but it has been home for so long. My husband died in 1929."  
Mrs. Wiedman has always been active in the Guild, was one of the Charter members. She had joined as a very young woman. She has been a member of the church here for well over 70 years. She attends Guild and church whenever the weather permits.  
"I always had a mile or more to walk to school when I was young and there wasn't any closing of school because the bus couldn't get through. There wasn't any bus. I had two years of German school and I used to write as well in German as in English—but I can't write in German any more. I do read for quite a while every morning from my prayer book. Ruth Blumenauer is Homemaker of Tomorrow for our school in the 1963 Betty Crocker Search for the American Homemaker of Tomorrow. Having achieved the highest score in a knowledge and attitude test given senior girls December 4, she now is eligible, along with winners in other state high schools, for the title of state Homemaker of Tomorrow.

The state Homemaker of Tomorrow is awarded a \$1,500 scholarship by General Mills sponsor of the program. The runner-up receives a \$500 scholarship. The school of each state Homemaker of Tomorrow is awarded a complete set of Encyclopaedia Britannica.

The state Homemaker of Tomorrow accompanied by her school advisor, also will join with other state winners in an extensive paid education tour of New York City, Washington, D.C., and Colonial Williamsburg, Va., next spring. During the tour, the 1963 All-American Homemaker runners-up will be named.

The Betty Crocker All-American Homemaker of Tomorrow will have her scholarship raised to \$5,000, with second, third and fourth place winners raised to \$3,000, \$2,000, and \$2,000, respectively.

Basis for selection of local and state winners is a test prepared and scored by Science Research Associates, Chicago. Personal observation and interviews are added factors in determining national winners.

The 1963 Betty Crocker Search reached another all-time high in enrollment, with 110,466 girls in 12,961 schools participating. In the program's nine years, nearly three million girls have been enrolled.

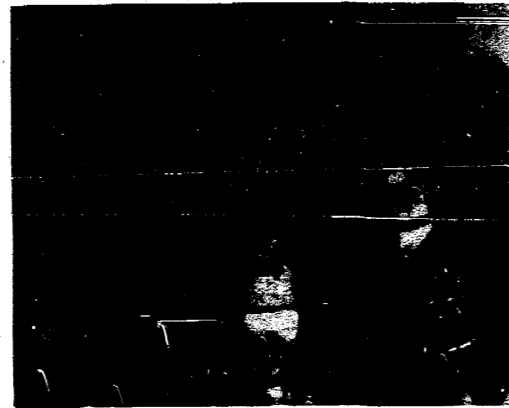

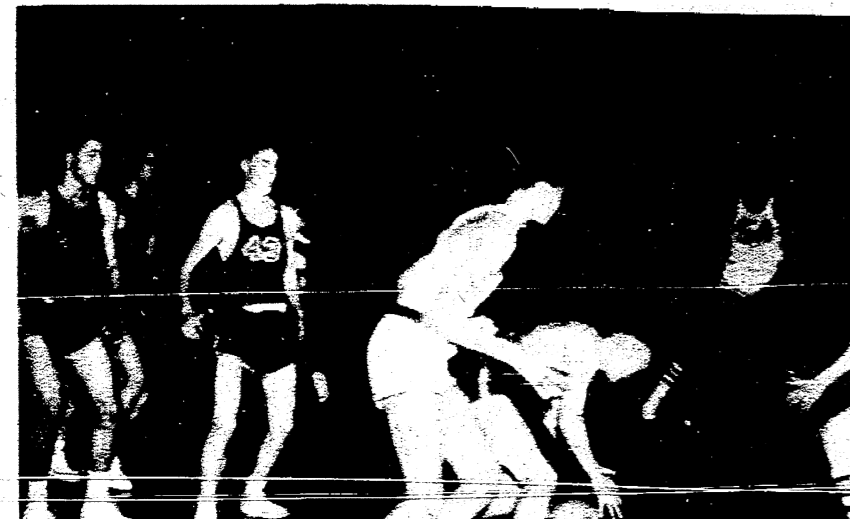

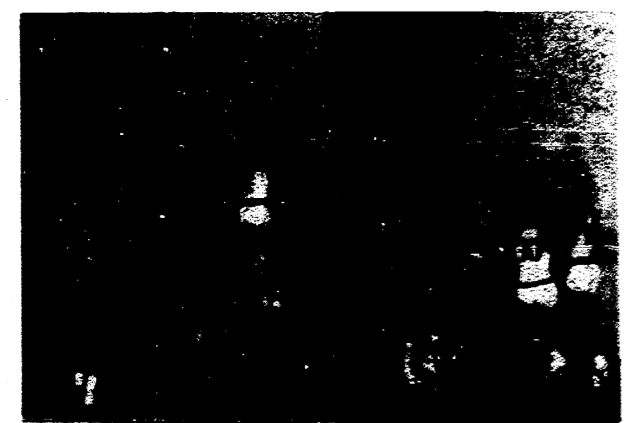

year nightwatchman, Robert Mahrie was paid \$60 a month and William Cash received \$50 for his work as town marshal. Dr. L. C. Kent received \$10 per year for his services.
