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## Present Two Programs

At a regular meeting held this past Monday night the School Board discussed school finance in light of what was needed in the area schools.

A discussion was area citizens before the Board meeting was of much help in making this decision.

It was decided that four mills would be requested for one year. This would replace the four mills voted last year. With a reduction in the Pleasant Lake Debt this tax year the total minimum school budget would be .4 of a mill less than this last year.

After considering the minimum operating budget, which cut one and a half teachers and did nothing for improvements, the Board considered the much needed improvements.

It was decided that the libraries' books, classroom maps, globes and reference books were items that were drastically needed if children were to receive adequate training.

For this reason, the Board will present a one mill operating tax on a separate ballot, this money to be earmarked for the items mentioned above.

The Board unanimously approved this request and hopes that the citizens and parents of the district will give full support.

If both the minimum special operating and the one mill are approved the school tax bill would total .6 of a mill more than this year. This would amount to a minimum raise in school taxes of 1.30 per thousand and a maximum in Sharon Township of about 2.00 per thousand.

Treasurer Boutell commented that this is for only one year. If the taxpayers should be asked to approve the same package in future years the tax bill would be only a few cents higher as the Pleasant Lake Debt would be finished.

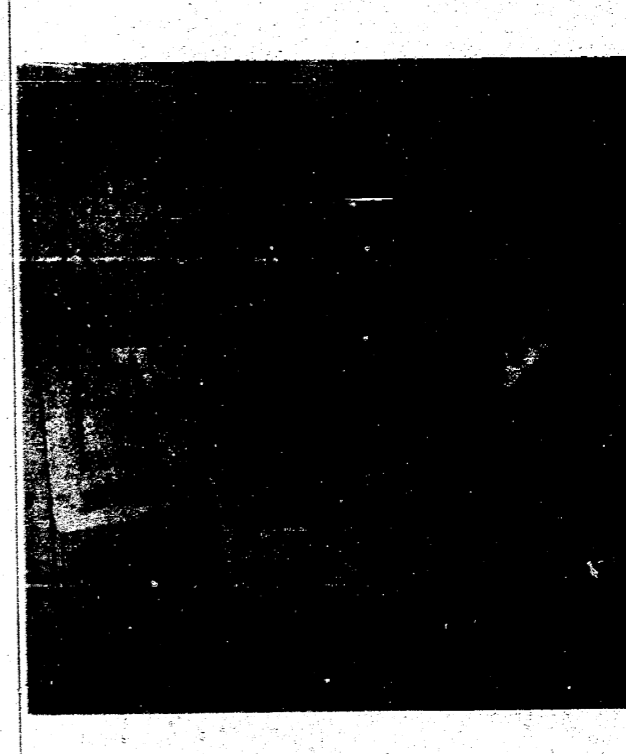

**EMERSON HUTZEL REPORTS ON TRAVELS**

New Orleans March 28, 1963

It was raining as we left St. Louis last Monday, April 25 and it kept it up all forenoon. Stopped at Hayti for lunch, having followed route 61, which we plan to follow all the way through. This route passes through the rich Mississippi Valley in which the chief crops are cotton and soy beans. Both of these crops are now harvested largely by mechanical means, so many of the negro cabins are empty. Except for occasional area which had had heavy rains, the farmers were out with tractor tools tilling and planting their fields.

Occasionally one saw groves of pecans, and orchards of apples, pears and peaches, the later are all in full bloom, as were the dogwood a bit farther down. Forsythia, crocus, jonquils, daffodils, tulips and the ubiquitous dandelion were all in full bloom.

Willow trees were green with foliage, and tulip trees were in bloom. Even the lawn mowers were being put to work.

The southwest corner of Missouri is known as the "Bootheel" because of its shape, and extends down into Arkansas some 150 miles. As we approached Memphis, which is located across the Mississippi in the extreme southwest corner of Tennessee 225 miles distant from St. Louis, Spanish moss began to appear on many trees.

Shortly after leaving Memphis, we entered the state of Mississippi. Here we noted that auto salvage lots were neatly hidden by metal fences. Other states might well follow this practice.

We arrived at Clarksdale, Miss., at 4:30 having driven some 400 miles. The temperature at Memphis was 74 high and 48 low.

On Tuesday, March 26, we got an early start, about 7, and drove to Vicksburg, 150 miles distant, just in time to take the 10 o'clock Chamber of Commerce Tour of the town and the battlefield.

Our guide and driver was a well-informed and pleasant southern lady who had a delightful accent which made "haws tawks" out of horse troughs and legs were designated "lays". In her enthusiasm she stretched a two-hour tour into three hours. Her party of eight included another couple from Michigan, one from Ohio and one from Kentucky. We comfortably filled her station wagon. Things went very smoothly despite the fact that the Yanks outnumbered the Rebels.

Union and Confederate avenues follow actual battle lines. The tour covered 16 miles.

At the suggestion of our guide we had a typical crab meat lunch in a quaint ante bellum restaurant.

Then we continued on route 61 to Mat chez where we intended to visit several pre-war homes, but suitable accommodations were lacking for an overnight stay, so we continued on to Baton Rouge, where we found a delightful motel.

Vicksburg's present population of 30,000 is built on the rugged Walnut Hills at the confluence of the Mississippi and Yazoo Rivers, which were at flood

stage at the time. It is a foremost hardwood market and three huge sawmills may be seen from its heights.

Vicksburg National Military Park contains 1492 acres. The military operations of the 47-day siege of Vicksburg in 1863 can be easily visualized and understood because of the area's unique topography.

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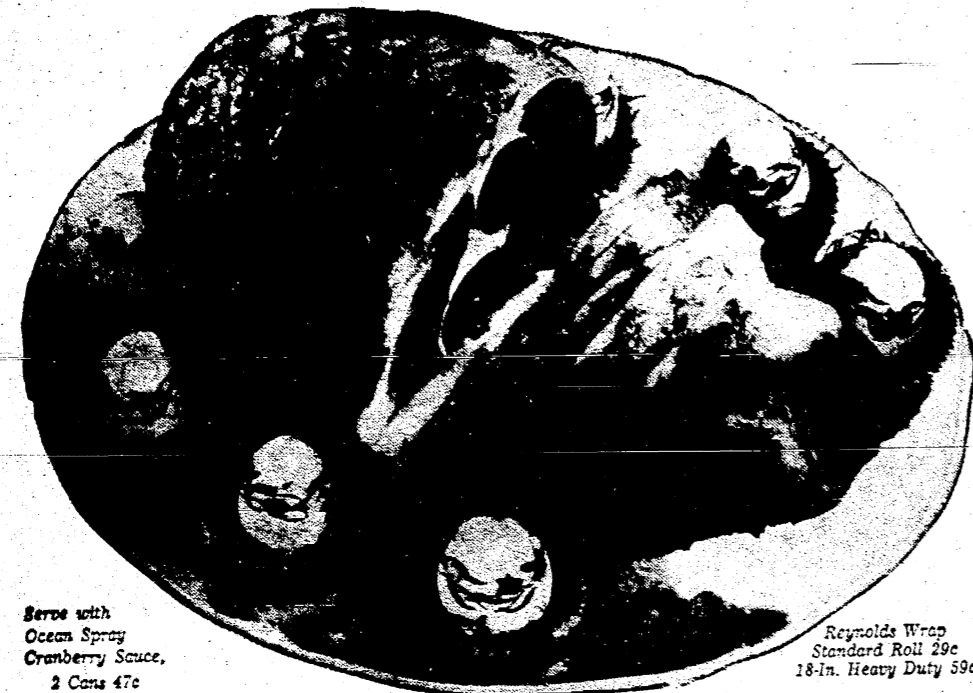

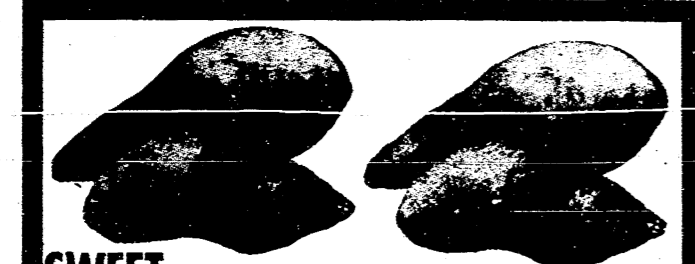

A donor between the 18 and 21 years of age must bring a signed permission slip form a parent or guardian unless he is married or in the armed services. **ROAD WORK PLANS ENTAIL \$409,000**  
Washtenaw County Road Commission has announced that it will begin four construction projects totaling 12.41 miles and expected to cost \$409,000. Completion of the four projects is expected for the summer of 1964.

The new projects are Dixboro Rd. from M-14 to N. Territorial Road, 3.86 miles from plans through graveling at a cost of \$125,000; A State St. extension from US-12 to Bemis Rd., 1.25 miles from plans through asphalt blacktopping, at a cost of \$75,000; Scio Church road from Fletcher road to Parker Rd., 4.6 miles from plans through double seal blacktopping at a cost of \$115,000; and Curtis Road from N. Territorial Road to Six Miles 2.7 miles from plans through double seal blacktopping at a cost of \$94,000. Projects which the commission expects to complete within 1963 are Rawsonville Road, 1.04 miles from I-94 to Textile Road; Hadley road, 3.88 miles from N. Territorial road to the county line; the Dixboro Swamp reclamation; and Geddes Rd., 2.3 miles from Oakway rd. to US-23.

The commission will continue to work on the following projects which were started in 1962: Grass Lake road from M-52 to Sharon Hollow Road; Scio Church road from Zeeb road to I-94; Willow road from road; Whittaker road to Carpenter road, and Zeeb-Joy Road from Huron River Dr. to N. Territorial rd. The Board of Supervisors approved a 1963 budget of \$475,000 for the road commission.

Besides their two daughters their four grandchildren attended the anniversary party. **CHARGED WITH CARELESS USE OF OPEN FIRE**

Conservation Officer Dor Boyer, issued a summons to Mrs. Charles Salyer of M-52 Green Lake as the result of a fire which burned over approximately six acres --three of the acres on state land. Mrs. Salyer was charged with careless use of fire in allowing it to endanger the life or property of others. She had not obtained a burning permit before starting the fire which got out of control and necessitated a call for the Chelsea fire department. She was ordered to pay \$5 fine and \$5 cost.

In setting the "token" amount of fine and costs Justice Rogers made a statement in which he warned that if fire damage continued because of carelessness, he will be obliged to act much more severely in levying penalties. Maximum fines of up to \$100 or 90 days in jail or both such fine and jail sentence are provided by law as penalties at the discretion of the presiding judge.

The penalty applies where carelessness results in fire damage to property of another and also to burning over brush or grass intentionally to clear land without first obtaining a burning permit. The burning permits are obtained from the local fire chiefs or conservation officers. The permits are not required for simple domestic fires-burning papers, leaves etc.-however, if such domestic fires result in starting a blaze on nearby property, the person who started the original bonfire may be held liable.
