carelessness results in fire damage to property of another and also to burning over brush or grass intentionally to clear land without first obtaining a burning permit. The burning permits are obtained from the local fire chiefs or conservation officers.

The permits are not required for simple domestic fires-burning papers, leaves etc.-however, if such domestic fires result in starting a blaze on nearby property, the person who started the original bonfire may be held liable.
